

The Reverend Richard Aiken Starts Work

The Reverend Richard Lloyd Aiken and his wife arrived on the Lurline, July 29th, to start his work as Assistant Vicar of Holy Nativity Church, Aina Haina, and to plan for future work in the Portlock area, of which he will be in charge.

The Rev. Mr. Aiken was met at the ship by a host of new friends and many he had made in Hawaii for the first time in 1950, at which time he came to try his vocation for the ministry.

A student of Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut, where he was an outstanding football player and member of Alpha Delta Phi Fraternity, he felt that he wished to go into a mission field to determine whether he was really called to his intended profession. He first served under the Reverend Paul R. Savanack at Christ Church, Kilauea, Kauai, and from there went to the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, Kamuela, to teach, to direct athletics and to assist in St. James' Mission. He also helped with the summer camps at Mokuleia.

After a year and a half in Hawaii he returned to Trinity College to finish his work. Following graduation he entered Virginia Theological Seminary. In November 1955 he married Miss Carole Chapin.

He was ordained to the Diaconate on June 1st by the Rt Rev. Frederick D. Goodwin, Bishop of Virginia, acting for Bishop Kennedy, in the Seminary Chapel.

We are more than happy to have him with us again, since we feel that he will make a great contribution to our work in Hawaii. We welcome the Aikens into our Diocesan Family with a very fond Aloha.

Appointed Diocesan Treasurer

Mr. Henry Francis Budd, who has been Treasurer for the National Council in Tokyo, Japan, for the past seven years, arrived with his wife and daughters, Patricia, age sixteen, and Susan age ten, on September 1st. He has been appointed by National Council to be Treasurer of the Missionary District of Honolulu.

Because of reasons of health, Mr. Robert McCuaig has been unable to do this work. Canon Paul R. Savanack will continue as Administrative Assistant, but Mr. Budd will be Treasurer of the Diocese.

Mr. Budd has been with the Finance Department of National Council for many years and comes to us with considerable experience gained when he was employed by the National Council at 281 Fourth Avenue, New York. He also served as Treasurer in the Overseas Mission fields in China and Japan. He is well known to many of our clergy and lay people in Hawaii, so comes to us not as a stranger, but as a friend. We welcome the Budd family to Hawaii with our very warm Aloha. Their living quarters have not as yet been determined.

Returns To The Mainland

The Reverend Harry S. Finkenstaedt, who has been in charge of the American congregation, All Souls Mission. Machinato, Okinawa, passed through Honolulu for a brief time, August 1st. He left immediately for Hyannis Port, Cape Cod, Massachusetts for a visit with his family. He does not plan to return to Okinawa following his furlough.

Before his departure from Okinawa he was given a party of appreciation by his congregation. They will miss him in Okinawa. We are deeply grateful for the years that he has given to our work there and wish him God's richest blessings in any new work that he undertakes.



Other memorials and gifts dedicated at the service were:


The Bishop's Throne — given by Mrs. Conrad Kaufman in memory of her husband.

The Reverend Robert H. Challinor Accepts Call







Dr. Nishi To Iolani Post

The Rev. Shunji Forrest Nishi, dean of Tokyo's Central Theological college, arrived July 15th, to be chaplain and head of the department of sacred studies at Iolani school.

A native of California, Dr. Nishi has been dean of the Tokyo college since 1951. He also served there as professor of systematic theology, and lectured in apologetics and the New Testament.

He is a graduate of the University of California at Los Angeles and received his BD in 1943 at the Episcopal Theological school, Cambridge, Mass. He holds the degree of doctor of philosophy for graduate study at Columbia university and the Union Theological Seminary in New York City.

The Rev. Dr. Nishi also has studied at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, Calif.; at Harvard university, and the University of London.

He was ordained deacon in 1943, and priest in 1944 in the Diocese of Los Angeles.

His wife, Marian, has a degree from Radcliffe college, Cambridge, Mass.

The Nishis have three children: Barbara Adelaide 4, Eleaner Forrest 2, and John Christopher, nine months.

Central Theological College, Tokyo, Professor Our Guest

The Reverend Raymond Hammer, DD, professor of New Testament at Central Theological College, Tokyo, Japan since 1950, spent ten days in Hawaii enroute back to Japan after a six months' missionary speaking tour of England and the mainland. While in Honolulu he was guest preacher at St. Peter's Church and St. Andrew's Cathedral, Honolulu.

Dr. Hammer's trip was sponsored by the Overseas Department of National Council and the Church Missionary Society of the Anglican Church. His wife and two children will join him in Tokyo after a further stay in England.

Clergy Conference

The clergy on all the islands will gather at our Conference Center at Mokuleia on the afternoon of Sunday, September 16th, and will continue in session until Wednesday noon, September 19th. Leader for the Conference will be the Reverend Massey H. Shepherd, Jr., PhD, STD, from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, California.

Dr. Shepherd is one of the most outstanding instructors in our theological seminaries, having taught Church History at the Episcopal Theological Seminary from 1940 to 1954. Since then he has been at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. He has also been a visiting lecturer at the University of the South, at Berkeley and other Theological seminaries. He is a member of the Standing Liturgical Commission and an author of great repute.

We feel most fortunate to have him come to Hawaii to be with our clergy.

Woman's Auxiliary Training Conference

The Reverend Paul M. Wheeler will lead a two-day conference for representatives of the Woman's Auxiliaries of the Diocese, at Mokuleia, October 19th and 20th. He will give the women the benefit of the Church and Group Life Laboratory he attended in May, in California, which was conducted by representatives of National Council. Diocesan Church Periodical Club At Work



New Building Projects


Several new constructions are under way in the Diocese. New rectories for St. George's Chapel, Pearl Harbor, and for Calvary Church, Kaneohe, are fast being completed. Calvary Church is also having a parish hall built which will temporarily serve as a chapel as well, until the building of their new church.

St. Andrew's Priory has torn down some old classrooms that had been condemned, where we had the
General Convention offices, to make way for a new
building that will have classrooms and science laboratories.
The second floor of the building will have four classrooms,
the first floor will have the laboratories and a classroom
between them, so that the classroom can be used in conjunction with either laboratory. Construction of this
cannot begin until more funds are available to start the
work.

On Chain Letters

Well, it got too windy for me on the beach yesterday so I moved back downtown. There was a big pile of mail waiting for me.

One of the envelopes contained a "Good Luck Prayer."

I have received about three different copies of the same prayer during the past few years. Each time I get a little more angry.

Here's how it reads:

"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart. Lean not on thine own understanding. In all ways acknowledge Him and He will direct thy path.

"This prayer has been sent out to you for good luck. It has been around the world four times, and the one who breaks it has bad luck.

"The original came from the Netherlands. The luck of it has been sent to you. You are to have good luck four days after receiving it. This is no joke. You will receive it by mail.


"Please copy this and see what happens four days after receiving it. Do not send money and please do not keep this copy. Just send this copy and four others to someone you wish good luck. It must leave your hands within 24 hours after receiving it.

"This good luck prayer has been around the world four times by United States officers. General Atkins received \$17,000 three days after receiving it.

"General Patton received \$8,000 but lost it because he broke the chain. Please send this and see what happens four days after you receive this copy.

"Insert your name at the bottom of the list and remove the top name."

persons who, apparently, have sent the prayer on its way, hoping for a cash dividend from the Lord within four days.

I am not what you would call an overly religious person but this sort of thing turns my stomach.

It's bad enough the scripture has been degraded to the level of chain letters. The philosophy behind it is even worse.

Something like:

Trust in the Lord and He will make you a million bucks. In all ways acknowledge Him and drive a brand new car every year.

Good luck or not, they go into my waste basket.




