



55th Annual Convocation Program

Guest of Convocation

The guest of our 55th Annual Convocation, which will be held at St. Andrew's Cathedral February 8-14, will be the Right Reverend William Fisher Lewis, S. T. D., Missionary Bishop of Nevada. He is a noted speaker in the Church and at the last General Convention with the Department of Youth. Mrs. Fisher will accompany him.

Attendance Urged

Although each parish and mission is represented at Convocation by a delegate and alternate, our members are cordially urged to attend all sessions of Convocation. This is one time when our people can see our Church at work. After the thrilling experience of General Convention in our midst, we should be even more eager to see our own diocese at work, since we are a part of this greater body.

Youth Conference

The Annual Youth Conference will be held prior to the opening of Convocation. The opening event of the conference will be a banquet at the Reef Hotel, Friday, February 8th, at 6:00 p.m. Bishop Lewis will address the young people at this time. On Saturday, February 9th, the young people will go to our Conference Center at Mokuleia for an all day session. This will start with a Holy Communion service at 7:30 a.m. The Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, Rector of St. Clement's Church and Chairman of our Diocesan work with Youth, will be the Celebrant. He will be assisted by the Rev. Messrs: E. Lani Hanchett, Robert Sheeran and Richard L. Aiken.

The keynote Conference leader will be the Rev. Alfred C. Krader, Vicar of St. John's Church, Eleele, Kauai. Leading the discussions will be the Rev. Messrs: Norman C. Ault, Morimasa Kaneshiro, Chester G. Minton and E Lani Hanchett. The theme of the Conference will be "Power to Witness."

Opening Service

The Opening Service of Convocation will be held on Sunday, February 10th, at St. Andrew's Cathedral, at 7:30 p.m. This is a service of great color and inspiration. It is our hope that our people will set aside other things that they may attend this service.

The choirs of our Oahu churches will be in procession, as will the clergy of all our Islands, our Lay Readers and Bishops. The choirs will be under the direction of Mr.

William Thaanum, Organist and Choirmaster of St. Andrew's Cathedral.

This is the time when the Bishop delivers his annual address, including in it the achievements of the year and the aspirations for the year ahead.

The Very Rev. James S. Cox, Dean of the Cathedral, will be in charge of the service. He will be assisted by the Rev. William R. Grosh and the Rev. Gerald G. Gifford, II. Participating in the service will be the Rev. Messrs: Richard L. Aiken, Shunji F. Nishi, Ph.D., Gerald P. Loweth, and the Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack. The Rev. G. P. Mellick Belshaw will read the Necrology and the Rev. Canon Wai On Shim will be the Bishop's Chaplain.

Reception Honoring Bishop Lewis

A reception will be held in the Cathedral grounds immediately following the Opening Service so that our people may have an opportunity to meet our guest of Convocation, Bishop Lewis. The Woman's Auxilaries of St. Stephen's and St. Timothy's Churches will be in charge of arrangements for this.

Business of Convocation

The business of Convocation will take place on Monday morning, starting with a service of Holy Communion at 8:00 a.m., in the Cathedral. The Bishop will be Celebrant. He will be assisted by the Very Rev. James S. Cox, the Ven Norman R. Alter and the Rev. Messrs: Paul Kim, David P. Coon, and John J. Morrett.

The St. Andrew's Priory Choir, under the direction of Sister Evelyn Ancilla, will sing for this service.

Breakfast will be served at St. Peter's Parish Hall. The Auxiliaries of Christopher's and Calvary Church will be in charge. St. Peter's Woman's Auxiliary will be in charge of table arrangements.

The Bishop will preside at the business session, which will open at 9:15 a.m. Bishop Lewis will bring greetings to the Convocation. The Rev. Chester G. Minton will read the Noon Day Prayers.





The Marines Help in Okinawa

The Church in Okinawa is greatly indebted to the 3rd Marine Division for all of the work that they have done in helping clear the land for the building of our new church, All Souls Church.

Major General Alan Shapley has been instrumental in seeing that this work was accomplished through the Third Marine Engineer Battalion. Many of his officers and men shared in the accomplishment of the task.

The Bishop has written to General R. McC Pate, Commandant of the United States Corps, thanking him for the help that has been given to us.

All Soul's Church was organized on August 29th, 1954, dedicated to all who fought and died in the Battle of Okinawa, World War II, in 1945. Its location on a bluff overlooking the China Sea to the west and facing Hacksaw Ridge to the east, scene of the bitterest fighing of the campaign, is therefore significantly appropriate. The Church has obtained building funds by appeals to the National Council, by donations from sponsoring churches in the United States and by its own fund-raising activities in Okinawa. Design of the structures, the selection of a site, and utilities began in August of 1956.

Canon William Heffner writes: "Not the least of the contributions to the building has been the interest of General Lemuel Shepherd, former Commandant of the Marine Corps, and various Commanding Generals of the Third Marine Division — General Eranshaw, General Wornham, Genarl Krulak, and General Shapley. This support has been material as well as moral."

Of great help in this project has been Colonel Hamilton W. Fish, who is now Warden of the Bishop's Committee. He is doing a great work for us. He will be

Awarded Distinguished Service Cross

Mrs. Robert (Mary von Holt) White was awarded the Bishop's Distinguished Service Cross at the Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's Cathedral Parish, January 14th. The Bishop gave this to her at that time because she is leaving shortly for New Zealand and Australia for an extended vacation. She has been a devoted member of the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary Board for many years, serving the past ten years as treasurer. She has always served graciously and well in the Diocese and richly deserves the honor accorded her by the Bishop. We congratulate her upon this distinction.

Record Confirmations

The year 1956 had the largest number of confirmations in the history of the Missionary District. This was no doubt due to the impact of General Convention in the life and work of the Church in Hawaii.

In the Hawaiian Islands we had 839 confirmations. In Okinawa there were 119 and in Formosa 264.

St. Andrew's Cathedral had 106 confirmations — the largest number in the history of the Cathedral, and the first time any congregation has had more than 100 confirmations in a single year.

Another point of interest is that we have 8 clergy who are retired receiving pensions amounting to \$11,327.28 per year and 6 widows of clergy who are receiving \$4,207.56, making a total of \$15,534.84.

remembered by many in the Diocese for the work he did as a layman in World War II, when he was stationed on the Island of Kauai and assisted as Lay Reader at St. John's Church, Eleele.

Cathedral Extension Plan

Ninety-five years ago when Bishop Staley arrived in Honolulu to begin his Episcopate he found a little house of worship built for him on the corner of Nuuanu Avenue and Kuakini Street. That was the beginning of the Honolulu Cathedral. Four years later a pro-Cathedral was built on the present property at Emma Square, and on March 5, 1867 King Kamehameha V laid the cornerstone of the present Cathedral Church building. Work progressed slowly at St. Andrew's, the Choir and part of the Nave were completed in the eighties, additions were made around the turn of the Century and brought to the present point of building in 1908.

Ninety-five years is a long time by some standards, but not for a Cathedral. In Europe it is the exceptional Cathedral that was built in less than a hundred years, possibly none with the exception of Truro, Liverpool, and the new Coventry. Nevertheless ninety-five years has been a long time to wait for some who have desired the completion of the Honolulu Cathedral. Now we shall wait no longer. The long dream is nearly over and we are about to waken to the reality of the dream's beautiful fulfillment. Immediately following Convocation a campaign will be undertaken at the Cathedral to raise the funds necessary to complete the Cathedral in the proportions conceived by the original London architects of the last century, and in the same French Gothic spirit. There will be added a beautiful facade of glass and bronze, a new pipe organ to replace the old termite eaten one, and over all will be thrown a new steel and plaster roof.

The roof is really the beginning point of this great Cathedral building effort. When all is said and done the figure that stands out in our Cathedral effort is the soft, white eliptoid of a termite. When we replaced the old termite ridden pews and did over the old Chancel, we of course made a rather thorough examination of the Cathedral thinking that we might do some necessary patching while we had so many workmen about. Lo, and alas! termites in the roof. Great gouts had been chewed out of supporting beams and trusses. The architect and engineers said: "you will have to put a new roof on. This one is safe for about two years."


"How much will it cost," we asked.

"Oh, about \$100,000.00," they said.

"Oh," we said.

Opinion began to form at that juncture. Why not put in the new organ, if we were going to have to find all that money? Yes, and why not put on a new front, the old one is about to fall down anyway. Yes, but if you are going that far why not complete the Cathedral to its proper proportions and, so, take care of the congregations that cannot now be accommodated.

So we began to study the problem. A Building Committee headed by Mrs. Walter Dillingham began to

While on Okinawa he had 39 confirmations.

Bishop Kurose is the newest bishop of the Japanese Church and was consecrated last February.

Give us, we pray, the power to discern clearly right from wrong and allow all our words and actions to be governed thereby and by the laws of the land.


Especially we pray that our concern shall be for all the people, regardless of station, race or calling.

Robert McCuaig

The Diocesan Office has been saddened in the death of Mr. Robert McCuaig, who has been with us as Accountant and Bookkeeper since January, 1956. He had endeared himself to the Diocesan Staff and to those in the Diocese, who worked with him. He was a man of high integrity and sincere purpose.

Theological Education Sunday


Let us keep our theological seminary students very much in mind on Sunday, January 27th, when we make an offering for their work. This is the Sunday set aside by the Presiding Bishop to remember their work and give them the support they so greatly need.

At Virginia Theological Seminary we have Mr. George Hayashi, who will graduate in June, and Mr. Ivor Torgerson, who is taking his first year at the seminary. The Church Divinity School of the Pacific will graduate Mr. Charles Crane and Mr. Masao Fujita in June. Mr. Norio Sasaki is a middler at the seminary and Mr. Roger Melrose is having his first year there.

These men are all making many sacrifices that they may return to this mission field and extend our work. They will need our prayers and assistance to see them through seminary.

Our Church faces a shortage of priests, so we must see that stress is placed on the importance of the success of Theological Sunday, the day on which attention of Episcopalians is focused towards our twelve seminaries in the United States. All the clergy know that there is no provision for theological education in the Church's national budget. If churches would make provision in their budgets to lend some support to seminaries it would eventually place them on the basis where they could be served adequately.

Presiding Bishop Sherrill has said in designating this Sunday: "The future of the Church depends to the greatest extent upon the quality of the clergy of the Church. This fact points directly, of course, to our Seminaries, for in them our clergy are trained. Let us see, therefore, that our Seminaries are so equipped in personnel and in facilities, that this vital task may be performed."

Iolani School Raises \$83,000 in Fund Drive

Iolani School parents have raised \$83,000 in the school's \$250,000 building campaign.

The total contribution will be matched by another group, according to the Reverend Canon Frederick A. McDonald, head of the school. He said he could not disclose the name of the group.

The building program includes a Primary Center, already under construction, and a \$200,000 Student Center.

The Primary Center is expected to be completed within a month. It will include a kindergarten room and two first grade rooms.

Primary youngsters now are attending classes in old army buildings on the school campus.

Canon McDonald says no target date has been set for ground-breaking for the Student Center, although the school hopes to build it this year.

The Student Center also will replace an inadequate old army building.

Parents have raised the building fund largely by pledges.

However, the students also are doing their share, he added.

He said the Hi-Y Association at Iolani is washing and polishing cars to raise money and residents may obtain car-washers by calling Ray Masuda, president of the senior class, at the school.

conceive plans and ascertain costs. No committee every worked harder. At last plans were approved and costs were pinpointed: roof, \$100,000.00; organ, \$50,000.00 extension of Cathedral two bays and porch, \$150,000.00; wiring ventilation, etc., \$40,000.00; new facade including stained glass window, \$60,000.00 total \$400,000.00. The problem was then turned over to the Cathedral Building—Finance Committee headed by its co-chairmen Mrs. Mary K. Robinson and Mr. Harold Dahlquist. Their solution—will soon be spread before us all. We expect to raise the needed sum of money in February, we hope to begin work on the completion of the Cathedral in March, and we hope to hold services in the completed Cathedral by Christmas of this year.

You can see by the beautiful cover picture in this issue of the *Hawaiian Church Chronicle* something of the dramatic concept of the new Cathedral. The center portion of the facade is in reality a great stained glass window twenty-four feet wide and fifty feet high, giving a surface area of over one thousand square feet introducing into the Cathedral the gorgeous color which will give us one of the most richly satisfying experiences imaginable.

In raising the funds necessary to building, we are not going outside of the regular Cathedral supporters in our campaign. This does not mean that we will not welcome gifts from whatever quarter they may come. It is only that we do not wish to place a burden on the parishes and missions of the District. We are sure that Cathedral friends will rally around and help us rise up and build.

Dean's Son Honored

Brice Cox, a student of Punahou School and son of the Very Rev. and Mrs. James S. Cox, of St. Andrew's Cathedral, was one of ten Island students selected as finalists in a nation-wide contest for university and college scholarships. The announcement of this honor was made by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, Evanston, Illinois. The ten are among 7,500 finalists picked from 162,000 selected students throughout the country.
