



## CONVOCATION HIGHLIGHTS

The Right Reverend William Fisher Lewis, S.T.D., Bishop of Nevada, and his very charming wife, added much to our 55th Annual Convocation by their presence. Every talk given by Bishop Lewis was just what was needed for the particular occasion, and all who attended the meetings felt stimulated and rewarded for hearing him.

#### Youth Conference

The Youth Banquet at the Reef Hotel had about 400 in attendance and the Conference at Mokuleia, on Saturday, was the best attended of any of our Youth Conferences. It was a red letter program for the young people. The banquet was a delightful occasion and was followed by dancing. New officers elected were: President, Arthur Isoshima; Vice President, Deanna Bing; Recording Secretary, Elizabeth Yatagai; Corresponding Secretary, Nina Brown and Treasurer, Norman Shigemura.

The Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, Diocesan Chairman for Youth Work, and his committee are to be commended for the wonderful conference this year.

#### Opening Service

The Opening Service of Convocation was colorful with the choirs on Oahu, the clergy, bishops and lay readers in procession. In the Bishop's Annual Address he

placed before the congregations five objectives for 1957:

- 1. The Laymen's Offering to eliminate the Mokuleia Dormitory debt of \$12,000. Every man on Oahu to give \$5.00 or more, and thus eliminate special benefit programs and food sales, which cost each person more, but the net income is less than such an offering would bring.
- Every parish and mission to have some interest outside of themselves to support and study, to keep from becoming ingrown. It may be another work or mission in the Diocese or something abroad.
- Schools of Prayer and Teaching Missions. Every island, every congregation, and every man and woman, participating, will bring new spiritual life and vigor to our District.
- 4. A re-vitalized Laymen's Organization in each congregation. We have much skilled man-power in our church going unused because no program, no work, no need seems to call them to use their talents in the service of Christ and His Church.
- 5. A well organized plan to bring non-Church people to baptism and confirmation. Every enterprise religious or secular must grow in numbers and

strength. To invest \$8,000 each year in a work where only 4 were baptized and 3 confirmed makes Episcopalians come at a very high price.

Reception for Guests of Convocation

Bishop and Mrs. Lewis were honored at a reception held in Davies Hall following the Opening Service. The women of St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, and St. Timothy's Church, Aiea, were in charge of the reception, which was beautifully arranged.

Business of Convocation

Important phases of the business of Convocation were the passing of certain revisions of our Canons, submitted to Convocation by our Vice-Chancellor and Chairman of the Committee on Canons, Mr. James Tabor, and the election of the Board of Directors: Mr. Arthur G. Smith, Mr. Herman V. von Holt, The Very Reverend James S. Cox, The Rev. John J. Morrett, Mr. Carter Galt, Mr. R'chard C. Ching, and Mr. William Crittenden. The following laymen were elected members of the St. Andrew's Cathedral Chapter: Mr. K. L. Ching, Mr. Samuel Chu, Mr. William Jenkins, and Mr. Charles E. Stone, Jr.

An expression of gratitude was extended to Mrs. Raymond K. Hoefener for giving her services as recording secretary for Convocation, and for the many hours of service donated to the diocese prior to Convocation in preparation for it.

Greetings were sent to the Convocation by the Rev. Canon William C. Heffner and the missions in Okinawa, the Rev. John R. Caton and the missions in Taiwan, and the Rt. Rev. Richard A. Kirchhoffer, Bishop of Indianapolis.

Iolani Dedication Service

At 2:30 P.M., the day of Convocation, the first unit of the Elementary School — the kindergarten building — was dedicated by the Bishop. This was an important event for Iolani School. Our delegates were also given an opportunity to see the new St. Andrew's Priory classroom building now under construction.

Diocesan Banquet

Over 600 attended the Diocesan Banquet at the Reef Hotel. The occasion was enhanced by our honored guests and by military and civic leaders who were invited as guests. Dean Cox, of St. Andrew's Cathedral, was a masterful toastmaster—adding wit and humor to the evening. Bishop Lewis' address was excellent.

Mrs. Homer (Flora) Hayes and a group of singers from the Hawaiian Congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral, St. Mark's Mission and St. Clement's Church, added a delightful side to the evening by singing and dancing as only our Hawaiians can.

Mrs. Harry Feikert, of St. Timothy's Church, made and gave the beautiful orchid corsages for the guests at the Speakers' Table and the lei presented to Bishop Lewis.

#### TO LEAVE FOR THE FAR EAST

The Bishop will leave on his annual trip to the Far East on March 14th and will be gone for six weeks, returning April 27th. He will visit Wake, Guam, Manila, Hong Kong, Formosa, Okinawa, Korea and Japan. He will be in Korea with our Armed Forces during Holy Week and for Easter.

In addition to taking confirmations for our churches, he will minister to the Episcopal Chaplains in the Far Pacific and will confer with military and Church officials.

THE LONG WAY

TO

MASTER YOUR MIND Think less about the present and more about the future. Think less about yourself and more about God (and others); think less about the dust in your house and more about the dust on your soul; think less about the beauty (or lack of it!) on your face and more about the ugliness of your soul. Make up your mind what you want to be - the richest man in the grave yard, or the poorest saint in Heaven.

TO

MASTER YOUR TIME If you don't go to Church at all, start going; if you go now and then, go every Sunday; if you go every Sunday, then go twice on Sundays. You can go any day of the week, morning or evening, too! And don't forget your prayers - morning, noon and night - and grace at meals. You have time . . . use it! If you haven't time, you are just the one who should take time to observe Lent!

#### MASTER YOUR BODY Stop eating so much candy, mashed potatoes,

roast beef, etc.; and stop drinking so much liquor, beer, cokes and even coffee. When you say "NO"! to that extra piece of pie or that third cup of coffee, your stomach won't cry out, "The throat's been cut!" TO You'll simply be telling your stomach that the throat can be cut! and that YOU can do it. Are you so weak that your body can tell YOU what to do - against your better judgment?

#### MASTER YOUR WILL Plan to do the right thing and then DO is

TO

-MAKE yourself do it! Don't just think about getting up out of your nice warm bed and stumbling off to Church; GET UP and GO! You get up and go to work don't you? Don't just think about saying your prayers; SAY them! Don't just think about being kind; BE kind! Don't just think about turning over a new leaf; TURN IT OVER! If you can't do what YOU will to do, then maybe Satan's got you already.

TO

MASTER YOUR SELF Remember that in spite of all nice things people say about you or what nice things you think about yourself, you are only a tiny little speck on a second-rate planet, and you can move about and do a few things. When you were PUT here, you were given the power to will; and you can WILL to serve your weaknesses, or you can WILL to master your weaknesses and make them serve you.

SERVE THE MASTER Whether you want to think so or not, you were put here for the one purpose only that is, obviously enough, to SERVE GOD Why do you think Christ allowed HIM-SELF to be mocked and tortured and nailed to a Cross? Do you think that He died to make us free, just to serve ourselves? He came to free us FROM OURSELVES, so that we COULD serve God. Didn't He mean, "Thy Will CAN be done ON EARTH as it is in Heaven?"

# Moving Picture Machine for Leper Colony

Last year, when the Bishop made his annual visitation to the Leper Colony at Airaku-en, Okinawa, the people in the colony expressed a desire to have a moving picture machine so that they might have some means of recreation. This looked like quite an order, but there always seems to be some way to meet such requests.

The Rt. Rev. Henry I. Loutitt, Bishop of the Diocese of South Florida, had visited Okinawa and the Leper Colony a few years ago, and has shown a great interest in the work there. When he heard of the Bishop's desire to help these people, he interested his Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary in this project. They worked with Bishop Kennedy in providing this and gave the machine as their gift. The young people of the Diocese of South Florida paid for the transportation of the machine from New York to Okinawa.

Recently Canon Willian C. Heffner dedicated the machine and had a service of thanksgiving for the people in the Colony. He said that it was a real thrill to see the joy of these people when the machine was given to them. It will mean far more to our good friends in the Leper Colony than we can appreciate. We are deeply indebted to the Woman's Auxiliary and young people of the Diocese of South Florida, as well as to Bishop Loutitt, for this generous and wonderful gift.


#### St. Elizabeth's Parish to Build New Rectory and Parish Hall


The Rev. Paul M. Wheeler spoke to the men at the breakfast on the responsibilities of a layman. The service and breakfast was very well attended.

#### Cross Awards

At Convocation time it is the pleasure of the Bishop to award the Distinguished Service Cross of the Diocese to those he considers have done outstanding work. This year the Ven Norman R. Alter, Archdeacon of the Island of Kauai and Vicar of All Saints Church, Kapaa, was given a cross for his outstanding service to the Diocese. Deaconess Sarah F. Swinburne, of St. Mary's Mission, Honolulu, was also given a cross, and Miss Margaret K. Monteiro, a teacher at St. Andrew's Priory and a Counselor of our summer camps, was also honored. She will retire as a missionary of the Overseas Department in June.

Of great joy to everyone was the surprise award made by The Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack, on behalf of the people of the Diocese, of the Distinguished Service Cross. This was given to the wife of our Bishop, Katharine Kittle Kennedy, for the tremendous contribution she has made to the Diocese through her devotion and influence. It was given to her that she might have tangible evidence of the affection and esteem with which she is regarded by her Church family.
