

A Bus for The Leper Colony on Okinawa

On the Bishop's recent visit to the Leper Colony, Airaku-en, Okinawa, he learned of the need for a bus that could be used to take the leper people on sightseeing trips into the city of Naha and the country side.

Many of these people have been in the Colony for over thirty years — some of the children and young people have never been outside of the Colony and know nothing but the drab life of a leper.

It is permissible to take them for drives through the city, but it is most difficult to find transportation. If they had their own bus, regular tours could be arranged to bring a little joy and light into their lonely lives.

The Bishop hopes through Auxiliaries and friends in the Islands and on the mainland to get enough gifts to purchase one or two second-hand busses for them. Any organization or individual interested in contributing toward this project may send the gifts to Bishop Kennedy.


The crozier will remain in Taiwan for future use.




Gordon Chang and Herbert Chung both Church members from Honolulu, greet the Bishop in Korea.

Territorial EYCC is Holding A Conference at Mokuleia, June 16-21

The Territorial Episcopal Young Churchmen's Council, conducted by the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, is holding a conference at Mokuleia beginning at 4 p.m., Sunday, June 16, through 12:30, Friday, June 21. Registration is \$15 per person to provide room and meals; preregistration is \$5 which must be paid no later than June 10. Outer-island personnel will be met at the Honolulu Airport and transportation provided to and from Mokuleia.

The purpose of this conference is to study the Episcopal Young Churchmen's notebook. By discussing this material expressing opinions and exchanging ideas, they wish to form improved plans and devise better methods which may be incorporated in the individual groups to motivate them into more active and effective organizations.

At this conference there will be present four delegates, two boys and two girls, above the age of 14, representing the young people of the churches in the Territory.

On Thursday, June 20th, from 1:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. there will be a session for clergy and advisors, \$1.00 each, and at this time the National Council's Young Peoples Notebook will be presented.

Whitsunday, June 9th, is the date for the Episcopate Endowment Offering. This offering is set by Canon of the Diocese and is for the purpose of creating a fund that will enable us to look toward self-support and becoming a Diocese, rather than a Missionary District. The Bishop's Fifth Objective for 1957

Bishop Kennedy, in his address to Convocation, set forth five objectives for the Diocese in 1957, of which the last one was that in every congregation there be a well organized plan to bring non-Church people to baptism and confirmation. The objective can be accomplished if every single Episcopalian participates.

The committee plans for an intensive personal personto-person evangelistic effort from August to Advent, Sunday, in December. Thus the period of the Preaching Missions will be a means of introducing others to the Episcopal Church.

The heart of our endeavor will be "Each One Bring One". Some will bring more than one to baptism and confirmation. The report to Bishop Kennedy will be given in every Church on Advent Sunday.

Complete details will be in the hands of the clergy by August 1st. Meanwhile, lay people should start now to decide upon their candidates who will be their own personal responsibility to enroll.

The method of enrollment will be a three-way enrollment card. One card will be for the individual to keep, giving the name of his or her candidate. The second card will be given to the candidate, stating his or her interest in knowing about the Episcopal Church. The third card will be a report to Bishop Kennedy for Advent Sunday when the individual will tell the Bishop the results of his or her missionary endeavor to bring his or her candidate to baptism and confirmation.

The Committee will prepare special bulletins, brochure, posters, and newspaper publicity. But it must be remembered the success of this 5th objective will rest upon each and every Episcopalian in the Hawaiian Islands. This means Laymen's League, Woman's Auxiliaries, Sunday Schools and Day Schools.

New Appointments in Hawaii

The Diocesan Family is to see many new faces with the coming of June and July. Three of our Candidates for Holy Orders, now in Seminary, will graduate and be ordained to the Diaconate before their arrival in Hawaii: Charles Tarleton Crane, Masao Fujita, now at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, and George Hayashi, who is at Virginia Theological Seminary. Mr. Crane and Mr. Fujita will be ordained at St. John's Cathedral, Spokane, Washington, on June 23 by the Rt. Rev. Russell B. Hubbard acting for the Bishop. Mr. Hayashi will be ordained on June 15th by the Rt. Rev. Charles L. Street, acting for the Bishop, in the Cathedral Church of St. James, Chicago, Illinois.

Upon ordination the Rev. Mr. Crane will be assigned to the staff at St. Andrew's Cathedral in charge of the Department of Christian Education. He, his wife, Diane, and daughter, Jennifer, will arrive on July 5th aboard the Lurline.

Mr. Crane was born in Honolulu April 11 1928, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra J. Crane and grandson of Charles S. Crane, former Mayor of Honloulu, and A. H. Tarleton. He attended Punahou and graduated from Maui High School in 1946. He graduated from the University of Iowa in 1951 with a degree in mechanical engineering. He served in the Korean War as a Second Lieutenant in the Army Corps of Engineers. After his service he returned to Maui and was employed as an engineer with the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company, until his decision to enter divinity school.

Following ordination the Rev. Mr. Fujita will go to Grace Church, Molokai. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Asayo Fujita, Eleele, Kauai. A graduate of Daniel Baker College, Brownwood, Texas, he served in Korea after two years in seminary and returned to complete his work following this period. He assisted with work at Holy Trinity Church and our summer camps last year during the interim from his release from Service and entering seminary. He will arrive in Honolulu on June 27th.

The Rev. Mr. Hayashi was born in Los Angeles, California, June 20, 1919, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Toshiji Hayashi, both of whom are deceased. He spent some of his boyhood in Japan, with relatives, and San Francisco Junior College from 1939-1941. He graduated from Roosevelt College, Chicago, Illinois, in 1954, following which he entered Virginia Seminary. He will be assigned to St. James' Mission, Kamuela, Hawaii.


Canon Savanack is still carrying on his duties as Administrative Assistant.

To Go on Furlough



St. Christopher's, Kailua, Starts Building Program

St. Christopher's Church in Kailua has grown to such an extent in its short span of 12 years that it was necessary to build an addition to the church facilities in all departments. As a result ground was broken on Sunday, April 14th, for a new educational building, an addition of 100 seats in the church edifice, and a new parking lot.

Participating in the ceremony, with the Rev. Chester G. Minton, Rector, officiating, were the heads of all activities of St. Christophers, and several of the original founders. Mrs. John W. Searle turned the first shovel of earth, followed by Mrs. Roy E. Devereaux and Mrs. Daisy McKeague, and heads of St. Christopher's organizations.

The contractor is T. Takahashi, Ltd., and building will start immediately. The architect is Edwin L. Bauer. The cost will be between ninety and one hundred thousand dollars.

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
