

Accepts Call to New Hampshire



Ordained in Okinawa

The Reverend John R. Caton, in charge of our work in Taiwan, writes the following account of the ordination to the priesthood of the Reverend Richard S. K. Yoh.

"Certainly the most momentous news for the present is that we finally have a Chinese priest. Our new priest is the Reverend Richard S. K. Yoh, formerly a banker in Shanghai, and for awhile Treasurer of the American Church Mission there.

Several out-of-the-ordinary features were a part of the ordination service, which took place on November 18th at the Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, in Naha, Okinawa. The Rt. Rev. John N. Okubo, Bishop of North Kanto Diocese in Japan, who was making a visitation in Okinawa for the Bishop of Honolulu, ordained and was celebrant. He used Japanese throughout the service. The sermon was preached in English by the Reverend William A. Hio, Priest-incharge of St. John's Church, Nago, Okinawa (where, incidentally, yours truly was Chaplain of the 87th Field Hospital for a time during the Battle of Okinawa.)

When Bishop Okubo examined the Ordinand the words were translated into English as written in the American Book of Common Prayer by the Rev. Canon William C. Heffner, in charge of the Okinawa Episcopal Missions. Greek was the other language used, since the members of the Church in Okinawa sing the

Kyrie in that language. Thus, three languages were used in the service; none of which was Chinese.

Another interesting aspect of the ordination was in the composition of the group of priests who assisted in the service and joined Bishop Okubo in the Laying on of Hands. There were all the priests of the Church in Okinawa–four Caucasian and two Japanese, and the Priest-in-charge from Taiwan, Free China. Two of the priests in Okinawa, the Reverends Lloyd and Peyton Craighill, are the sons of the Rt. Rev. Lloyd E. Craighill, Retired Missionary Bishop of Anking, China.

The congregation was composed of Americans, Okinawans, Japanese and Chinese. One of the Chinese, on a special government mission in Okinawa, was a classmate of Richard's at Soochow Academy. Quite by accident he and Richard met the day before after not having seen each other for almost thirty years.

Thus, we have gained a priest, and when I tell you how it all happened I have to tell it slowly to keep from tripping. You see, it was this way: The Rev. Richard S. K. Yoh was ordained Deacon in Hong Kong by the Rt. Rev. Roland O. Hall, Bishop of Hong Kong (an English Bishop) for the Rt. Rev. Harry S. Kennedy, Bishop of Honolulu (an American Bishop) for the Taiwan Sheng Kung Hui (a Chinese Church), May 27, 1956.

Four Ordained Priests in December

December 7th, at St. John's Church, Kula, Maui, was the date set for the ordination of the Reverend Donald Lewis Terry to the priesthood. He was presented by the Ven. Claude F. DuTeil. The Bishop ordained him and preached the Ordination Sermon. The Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack and the Rev. C. Fletcher Howe also assisted with the service.

Following the service a dinner honoring the Ordinand was served in the Parish Hall.

The Reverend George Fujio Hayashi was ordained to the priesthood by the Bishop on December 15th at Holy Apostles Church, Hilo, Hawaii. He is the Vicar of St. James' Mission, Kamuela, Hawaii.

The Preface to the Ordinal was read by the Rev. Stephen E. T. Kim, of St. Columba's Church, Paauilo; the Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack preached the sermon. The Reverend Richard L. Aiken, of Holy Nativity Church, Aina Haina, presented the Ordinand. He was a fellow seminarian with the Rev. Mr. Hayashi, although he graduated in the class ahead of him. The Rev. William Smythe, of Christ Church, Kealakekua, read the Litany. The Epistle was read by the Ven. Gerald P. Loweth, of Holy Apostles' Church and the Gospel by the Rev. Canon Samuel Van Culin, Jr.,

of St. Andrew's Cathedral, also a fellow seminarian of the Ordinand. Chaplain to the Bishop was the Rev. Morimasa Kaneshiro, Vicar of the Kohala Missions.

A dinner honoring the Ordinand was served following the service.

On December 23rd, at St. Andrew's Cathedral, the Reverend Charles Tarleton Crane, of the Cathedral, and the Rev. Masao Fujita, of Grace Church, Molokai, was ordained to the priesthood by the Bishop. The service was held at 10:30 a.m.

Preface to the Ordinal was read by the Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack. The Reverend Shelton Hale Bishop preached the sermon. The Rev. Mr. Crane was presented by the Very Reverend James S. Cox; the Rev. Masao Fujita by the Ven. Claude F. DuTeil. Litanist was the Rev. Canon Norman C. Ault; Epistler, the Rev. W. Edwin Bonsey, Jr.; Gospeler, the Rev. Lawrence H. Ozaki; Master of Ceremonies, the Rev. Canon Samuel Van Culin, Jr. Chaplain to the Bishop was the Rev. Canon Wai On Shim. Assisting with administering the Holy Communion was the Rev. Canon Frederick A. McDonald.

A luncheon honored the Ordinands following the service.

Acolyte Festival

The Acolytes of all churches on Oahu held a special service in St. Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday, December 8th, at 7:30 p.m. It was a most inspiring service with the procession of 150 Alcolytes. The Reverend Richard L. Aiken, of the Church of the Holy Nativity, preached. Norman Westley, of St. Clement's Church, was Chairman of the Committee for the service. The Rev. Canon Norman C. Ault was the Advisor, and the Oahu Youth Council sponsored the service.




The children of the Leper Colony, Airaku-en, Okinawa, cheer as they see their new bus.

Leper Colony Receives Buses

Through the combined efforts of the Bishop of Connecticut, the Navy, and the Church in Okinawa, the Leper Colony at Airaku-en is now in possession of a bus to take the people on sightseeing tours. The Reverend Luke Kimoto, in charge of the work with our lepers on Okinawa, accompanied the children of the Colony on their first sightseeing trip in the rebuilt bus. They were given candy by the Church on their return to the Colony.

The Diocese of Southern Ohio has sent the Bishop money to purchase another bus for the Colony. The Navy officials became so interested in this project, sponsored by the Bishop and Canon Heffner, that they have also donated a bus to the Colony. We hope to get three or four buses so that all of the people can be given an opportunity to take tours around the Island

It is indeed a ray of sunshine for the people. Some, born in the Colony, had never been outside its walls; one woman had not been out for over thirty-two years.

The Reverend Richard H. Baker, Vicar, reports that the typhoon did not damage them in any way, other than to leave them without electricity and to deluge them with heavy winds and rain.

Iolani Boy Chosen Outstanding Juvenile Citizen

Iolani's James Manke, senior, was chosen the outstanding juvenile citizen of the islands by the Optimists Clubs of Hawaii, working in conjunction with the Honolulu Advertiser's Community Service Department. Jim was nominated by classmate Alan Moo in a letter entered in the "Outstanding Teenager Contest", which was carried by the Advertiser.

Both Alan and Jim received \$25 savings bonds. Alan commented, "It was a great honor to have had my letter chosen as the winning one; but I feel that if anyone deserved this award, Jim Manke certainly did." Said Manke about the presentation "It was a great thrill to be selected, and I owe a great deal to Alan; after all, it was he who wrote the letter."

The letter spoke of how Jim overcame his self-consciousness after having been severely burned, scarred, and physically handicapped in an accidental phosphorous shell explosion four years ago, to become Iolani's present Student Body President. He was confined to the hospital for more than 12 weeks, but Jim returned to school and became an honor student. He now ranks 6th in his class of 91.

Last year Jim served as class treasurer and was also the recipient of the Harvard Prize Book, awarded to the "outstanding junior of the year" by the Harvard Club in Hawaii.

Jim's father, Mr. Karl Manke, is agricultural superintendent for Hawaiian Pine in Wahiawa; Alan's father, Mr. Jen Fui Moo, is senior vice-president of the American Security Bank.
