

On March 20th, one day before the Church began its eighth year on Okinawa, the Nazareth Kindergarten of the Church of S.S. Peter and Paul in Naha graduated its first class. These twenty-two Okinawan children represent the first fruits of a grant from the United Thank Offering which made the building of this school possible. Nazareth Kindergarten which was designed to accommodate eighty children began its second year on April 9th with an overflow enrollment of eighty-six children. The Reverend Richard H. Baker, Vicar of the Church of St. John the Divine, Agana, Guam, has been designated by the Honorable Barrett Lowe, Governor of Guam, as one of the members of the Liberation Day Executive Committee, which is the observance of the liberation of Guam from the Japanese forces on August 1, 1950. On December 8, 1941 (the same day as the attack on Pearl Harbor, but a different dateline) the Japanese attacked Guam.

The annual observance of both of these events is the highlight of civic activities on the Island.

Junior Episcopal Churchmen

The Junior High boys and girls of the church have organized themselves as the Junior Episcopal Churchmen of Hawaii (JECOH) on a Diocesan-wide basis; and it is the hope of the Department of Youth that every parish and mission will do something toward an organized program for this age group.

An Oahu Council of JECOH is now planning for the Summer Conference, June 15-27.

The Summer JECOH Conference at Camp Mokuleia, June 15-27, will be a Conference, not a camp. Each Parish and Mission will be entitled to *four delegates*, preferably 2 boys and 2 girls.

This is a Diocesan Conference and neighboring Island Churches should send delegates if possible. We recognize the expense factor here and hope that Vestries, Guilds, and individuals will help so that every Parish and Mission will be represented.

It is suggested and recommended that each Island organize a JECOH Council to coordinate the work of the Junior Churchmen on the separate islands.

Camp Periods Set


The Diocesan Camp Periods have been announced by the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, Diocesan Chairman for Youth. They will be:

To Join Clergy Staff

The Reverend William Pollock, former rector of St. Peter's Church, Denver, Colorado, arrived on May 1st to start work in the Diocese.

A graduate of Colorado State Teachers College and St. John's Theological College, he served in the Diocese of New Mexico and Virginia before going to Colorado. From 1943 to 1946 he was a Chaplain in the United States Army. He has been rector of St. Peter's Church since 1946.

Mrs. Pollock will come to Hawaii in October. She is remaining in Denver until two of her sons enter college and the third son accepts a position as a teacher in California. We shall look forward to her arrival then.

The Reverend Richard Herbert Humke, curate of Trinity Cathedral, Davenport, Iowa, will arrive in July. He is a graduate of the State University of Iowa and Virginia Theological Seminary. He was ordained in 1956, and has been curate of Trinity Cathedral since then. He is unmarried.

We shall welcome these two men with a very warm Aloha.

Diocese Status

Since we in the Missionary District of Honolulu look hopefully to the day that we may attain Diocesan status, we commend the Missionary District of Arizona for its declaration that it will become a diocese on January 1, 1959.

In the Episcopal Church, a diocese is a self-supporting area, while a missionary district is in part supported by the national Church.

In Memoriam

The Reverend Edmund L. Souder, retired clergyman of this Missionary District, passed away in Alhambra, California, on April 7th, after an extended illness.

He was for many years a priest in China, until forced to leave there because of the Communist occupation of Red China. From there he served in Cincinnati, Ohio. He came to Honolulu in 1945 and served at St. Mary's Mission, then St. Mark's, from 1946 to 1953. He then went to Los Angeles, California and worked until illness forced him into retirement.

It was during his time at St. Mark's Church that the new church building was started and much of the money for its erection was raised. He and Mrs. Souder worked untiringly toward this fund. At the time of its dedication the people of St. Mark's had them return to Honolulu to participate in the service.

The entire Diocese joins in extending deep sympathy to Mrs. Souder and to her family. Mrs. Thomas Jones, a daughter, lives in Honolulu and is a member of the Church of the Holy Nativity.

Furlough Time Again



Accepts Washington Post


The Reverend J. Robert Jones, rector of St. Peter's Parish, Honolulu, has accepted a call to become associate rector of St. Alban's Church, Washington, D.C. He and his family expect to leave the Islands the latter part of June.

While in Virginia Seminary the Rev. Mr. Jones served St. Alban's as lay assistant. He has been in the Islands since 1952, serving first as Vicar of St. James' Mission, Kamuela, Hawaii and as chaplain of the Hawaii Episcopal Academy, now known as the Hawaii Preparatory Academy.

From there he went to St. Andrew's Cathedral as curate before serving briefly at St. George's and St. Timothy's churches. He became rector of St. Peter's Parish in 1956.

He is chairman of the Diocesan Department of Promotion and Vice President of the Honolulu Ministerial Union.

Notes From The Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary

In this day of soul-searching and self-analysis, we find even the Church is not exempt from the trend.

Archbishop William Temple says: "Do not begin ever considering what is wrong with you without first being quite sure your mind is directed towards the glory of God as it has shone forth in Jesus Christ."

With this in mind, one of our windward Woman's Auxiliaries set out on a program of self-analysis of the Auxiliary led by the minister.

Two evenings were set aside for serious contemplation as to the role of the Woman's Auxiliary should and

does play in the life of the Church.

The first program was given over to a hypothetical case of a visitor being present. "Why should this visitor wish to come back to the next Auxiliary meeting?" In other words, why should an Auxiliary continue to exist? Why not close it down! With these rather startling declarations thrown before the women; the Auxiliary was divided into seven groups for exploration of this fantastic idea. After due consideration they reported back the results to be read and tabulated for future thinking and on this note-of-continued-until-next-month serial idea they adjourned.

At the next regular meeting the program continued. The membership was again split up into small groups and asked to discuss these questions:

1. What are the strongest points in our Auxiliary life?

2. What are our weakest points?

3. Complete this sentence— "I wish our Auxiliary would do this

The conclusions were written down and turned over to the local branch's Auxiliary Executive Board for its guidance in working out the Auxiliary over-all program, in the immediate future.

Perhaps each of the local branches might wish to devote a session to this novel idea. You, too, tabulating

your results.

And on the possibility of being accused of being like the old-Saturday-morning-movie-melodrama; we won't report until next month some of these findings. You, too, check your conclusions against this one Auxiliary's efforts; and send your contributions and conclusions to be included.

But as we begin our self-analysis lets keep in mind Archbishop Temple's admonition:

"There are many aids to self-examination. Some of them are excellent, but some are quite dreadfully bad. I want to suggest how you may know which are the bad ones. If they confront you with a series of questions, all referring to actions, they are bad, because our self-examination must not mainly refer to actions... Let your self-examination, as far as possible, concern motives. Confront yourself with the Christian character as it is set out in the Beatitudes or in St. Paul's articulation of the Fruit of the Spirit or with some other analysis of the mind of Christ. See how far your character corresponds with this, as exhibited in your actions, feelings, plans and hopes."

Sister Clara Dies In Glendale, Ohio

Sister Clara Elizabeth, of the Community of the Transfiguration, died at the Mother House in Glendale, Ohio, on April 9th after an illness of some duration.

She was Sister Superior at St. Andrew's Priory from about 1930 to 1938, during which time the Restarick Hall wing of the main building was constructed and the six classrooms of Sellon Hall were built. During this period of the time the enrollment of the school increased substantially, and the curriculum was broadened.

Her memory will be held dear by many who were students at the Priory during the time of her leadership.
