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

Bishop And Mrs. Kennedy Leave On Extended Trip

Bishop and Mrs. Kennedy left on May 29th for a visitation of the Bishop's jurisdiction in the Pacific, before traveling on around the world to the Lambeth Conference, which is to be held in London, July 3rd to August 11th.

Their first stop will be Wake Island, where the Bishop will have a service of Holy Communion while the plane is being refueled. A very busy schedule has been arranged for him on Guam, including the baptism of the new son of the Rev. and Mrs. Richard Baker.

From Guam they will go to Manila for two days, then on to Taiwan, where they will visit our work. From there they go to Okinawa. The new All Souls Church, for the American congregation, will be dedicated by the Bishop. The Reverend Paul Nakamura, deacon, will be ordained to the Priesthood by the Bishop on June 11th.

They will spend a few days in Japan, where the Bishop will confer with Episcopal Chaplains and conduct services for them. From there they will go on around the world.

The Bishop will return to Honolulu September 2nd. He will leave again for General Convention on September 24th. Mrs. Kennedy will remain on the mainland and join the Bishop and then they will go to Miami Beach for General Convention. They will return to Honolulu on November 1st.

Lambeth Conference Of 1958

*by The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill,
Presiding Bishop of The Protestant Episcopal Church
in The United States of America*

We in the United States are looking forward greatly to the Lambeth Conference. There is the happy prospect of greeting old and new friends. All of us are deeply grateful for the generous hospitality of Archbishop and Mrs. Fisher.

The agenda at first glance seems to be made up of hardy perennials. But inevitably this must be so. These are basic problems and as such they remain from decade to decade. But new conditions and situations are constantly arising which in reality fill these classic subjects with contemporary meaning and relevance.

Biblical study is of importance in relation to the Faith and Order Movement with especial reference to the nature and the renewal of the Church. In this country, for a variety of reasons, there has been a resurgence of Biblical Fundamentalism. Since 1948 there have been important developments in the area of Christian Unity. It is vitally necessary that all parts of our Communion should be kept informed. Since the last Lambeth Conference the World Council of Churches has come into being. What ten years ago was an ideal has become a reality. I rejoice that a section on Ecumenical Relations has been placed on the agenda.

With the rapid changes in the world today, it is imperative that there be greater understanding of our task best described as the mission of the Church. As the world has lessened in size due to the rapidity of transportation, while it is the genius of our Communion that we are independent, a new understanding has come that we are members one of another. An over-all strategy is no doubt impractical for a variety of reasons, but at least we should have a continuous inter-change of information that we may evaluate our own programs the better.

International and racial tensions unfortunately have not lessened this past decade. In many places, including this country, there are difficult problems to be faced. We have found statements of previous Lambeth Conferences to be most helpful in bringing to bear upon specific situations the judgment of the Bishops of the entire Anglican Communion. When one thinks of the threat of nuclear energy, the status of the so-called "Cold War", it is clear that in the international field, we can well pray to God for wisdom.

So we in the United States look forward to Lambeth because we are confident that this fellowship with our brethren throughout the world will be a source of inspiration and of strength.

Visitors In Honolulu

The Rt. Rev. John Frewer, Bishop of Northwest Australia, stopped in Honolulu over night on his way to Lambeth, as did the Rt. Rev. and Mrs. Thomas T. Reed, of Adelaide, Australia. The Rt. Rev. John Daly, of Korea, spent three days in the Islands before starting on a speaking tour of the mainland before going to Lambeth. The Rt. Rev. Paul Yosuo Kurose, Bishop of Mid-Japan, spent a day and night in Honolulu and the Rt. Rev. and Mrs. J. Stanley Kempthorne, of Suva, Fiji, spent three days in Honolulu enroute to the Lambeth Conference.

The Reverend and Mrs. Joseph M. Kitagawa, both professors at the University of Chicago, and he in the Divinity School of the University, spent a week in Honolulu enroute to Japan and around the world, where they are to spend a year in studying the different religions in other countries. They plan to write some books on this when they complete their tour.

New Buildings Being Erected

This summer will be a busy time for the beginning and completion of many building projects. The places that will be completed will be St. Andrew's Cathedral extension, St. Elizabeth's rectory and educational building and parish hall. Work will start on St. Mary's Parish Hall, Calvary Church building, an educational building for Epiphany Church, as well as to enlarge the church. A chapel will be built for St. Barnabas' Mission.

Gifts To The Diocese

The Executive Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of National Council has granted from the United Thank Offering \$10,000 to Canterbury House at the University of Hawaii, which is our student center. This will enable us to replace the present termite ridden building.

Under the direction of Canon Norman Ault considerable work, including repairs and new construction has been accomplished in the past two months. The students at the center have met each Saturday to paint, repair furniture, build a fence, and to make many improvements on the interior of the main building. A new lanai (porch) has also been built.

The Reverend Richard Humke, who will arrive in early July, will be in charge of the work with University students and Canterbury House. He will come to us from Trinity Cathedral, Davenport, Iowa.

Gifts have also been received from National Council. St. Timothy's Church, Aiea, has been granted \$15,000 toward the purchase of a rectory. The congregation will assume a debt of \$11,000 to make this purchase.

National Council has appropriated \$5,000 to assist in the renovation of Canterbury House.

A gift of \$2,000 has come through National Council to replace the termite ridden floor in the Armed Forces Center.

We are most grateful for these gifts. The whole

Diocese wishes to express thanks to the United Thank Offering and National Council for this wonderful assistance.

St. George's Church, Pearl Harbor, received an anonymous gift through a friend of the Rev. Robert Sheeran, of \$15,000 toward a new educational building. This is a wonderful gift for this church.

Ordinations To The Diaconate

Mr. Norio Sasaki, who graduates from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, California, in early June will be ordained to the Diaconate by the Rt. Rev. Henry W. Hobson, Bishop of Southern Ohio, in Cincinnati, June 10th. Bishop Hobson will act for Bishop Kennedy. Mr. Jefferson Stephens, also a graduate of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, will be ordained deacon on the same day, by Bishop Eric Bloy, in Los Angeles. Mr. Thomas Hughes, who graduates from Bexley Hall, Gambier, Ohio, will be ordained to the Diaconate by Bishop Hobson. On June 11th Bishop Kennedy will ordain to the Priesthood the Rev. Paul Nakamura, of Okinawa.

Registrations For Camp

The Rev. Paul M. Wheeler has reported that the registration for the camp periods are coming in rapidly. We would urge parents to get their children registered as soon as possible, so that they will not be disappointed.


The camps are a wonderful opportunity for youngsters to share in fellowship, sports, and instruction.


St. Mary's Church To Have A New Look

You should see the grounds at St. Mary's Church, Honolulu, and then make a journey out there around the latter part of August. It is certainly taking on a new look at 2060 South King Street! The old ramshackle building that used to be the Children's Home, then a rooming place for men, has been taken down. Restarick Hall also succumbed to the termites and was razed. The Church building itself has been moved to another portion of the property. The ground has been filled in, so that rains will not make it a mud pie haven.

Work has now started on the erection of a new parish hall. When this is completed, St. Mary's Church will be an attractive addition to the Diocesan property. The Rev. Canon Paul R. Savanack, who is assisting at St. Mary's until a newly appointed Vicar arrives, has been in charge of the plans for the new building.

Christian Education Notes

With the growing conviction that methods of teaching in Christian Education must be revamped in order to meet the needs of children and young people of today, our parishes are faced with the problem of providing leadership for such a venture.

Our National Council is doing its utmost to provide all the assistance possible by way of mimeographed material, bibliographies, leadership training guides, work shops, conferences, institutes, and the Training Program for Parish Assistants. There are not enough people available who have had graduate training at a divinity school or other preparation for this work so that Christian Education in most parishes is directed by a clergyman assisted by concerned but admittedly untrained volunteer leaders.

It is not so simple for us who live in the Islands to attend courses given on the mainland. For this reason it seems doubly important that we take advantage of the two day visit of seven members of the staff at the National Council:

The Rev. A. Donald Davies, head of the Adult Division

The Rev. Elsom Eldridge, head of the Leadership Training Division

The Rev. John Midworth, head of the Laboratory Project

The Rev. Alfred Persons, Associate, Leadership Training Division

The Rev. Frank Voeleker, head of Unit of Evaluation

The Rev. A. Malcom MacMillan, Rector, St. John's, Sharon, Pennsylvania

These leaders will stop over in Honolulu June 16 and 17 on their way to Australia. They are persons who have been carefully chosen for their understanding of teacher-student relationships and the dynamics of working with groups. Much information can be absorbed in a few days; the result of long periods of study and research.

It is hoped that each parish or mission will send at least one delegate to the conferences. One person can relay the information to the teaching staff and this becomes good leadership training.

Woman's Auxiliary Notes

If you did not read the Woman's Auxiliary Notes from the Hawaiian Church Chronicle April 1958 then this report will make little or no sense. In review: One windward Woman's Auxiliary devoted two general meetings trying to pinpoint the lassitude that seems so prevalent in most Woman's Auxiliaries these days:

These are the conclusions that were drawn after two evenings of sincere attempt to glean the very most from the proposed Auxiliary program:

Question No. I

What are the strongest points of our Auxiliary?

1. No fear of hard work.
2. Good spirit of fellowship within the group.

3. Widely varied pattern of activity and program.
4. Friendly to newcomers—the group has a plan for making the welcome explicit.
5. Have had good leadership.

Question No. II

What are our weakest points?

1. Have been too parish-centered in our concern.
2. Too little worship and study at the meetings.
3. Don't seem to get through to the larger group of women in the congregations, as evidenced by attendance.
4. Hard to get women to assume responsibility.

Question No. III

"I wish our Auxiliary would do this . . ."

1. Devise a plan for the active to bring the inactive to church and meetings.
2. Set up a visitor's desk at the door of church Sundays.
3. Provide both evening and morning meetings.
4. Sponsor some kind of neighborhood cells for fellowship and study.
5. Excuse the person who suggests a good idea from having to chair the committee that brings it off.
6. Put more business into the Executive Committee meeting and thus have less business at the general meetings.
7. Work up some kind of 'car pool' system to help with transportation for the members without transportation.
