

Elected Presiding Bishop


Bishop Arthur C. Lichtenberger of Missouri was elected Presiding Bishop on October 11th, following a Corporate Communion service of the Bishops at All Souls Church, Miami Beach.

The new Presiding Bishop, who has succeeded Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill, was born in Oshkosh, Wisconsin in 1900. He is a graduate of the Episcopal Theological School in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in the class of 1925, and later did graduate work at the General Theological Seminary.

Following his ordination he went to China as a missionary, teaching at St. Paul's Divinity School in Wuchang. He was rector of Grace Church, Cincinnati from 1928 to 1933, leaving there to become rector of St. Paul's, Brookline, Mass. He then went to Newark, New Jersey, as Dean of Trinity Cathedral.

Bishop Lichtenberger has had considerable teaching experience, being lecturer on pastoral care at Cambridge while in Brookline, and leaving his deanship in Newark in 1948 to become professor of pastoral theology at General Seminary.

He was elected Bishop Coadjutor of Missouri in

1951 and became diocesan the following year, upon the retirement of Bishop Scarlett.

He was one of the team to visit the Church of South India by appointment of Bishop Sherrill and has been a staunch advocate of intercommunion with that Church. At present he is the chairman of the Commission on Theological Education.

His wife is the former Florence Tate, daughter of a clergyman, and they have a son who is a businessman.

Christ in Christmas Program

The General Convention of our Church is calling upon all Dioceses, Parishes, Missions and individuals to make a special effort to restore Christ to the rightful place that He should hold in our Christmas observances.

Our clergy will cooperate with other ministers in Hawaii to try to overcome the pagan celebrations and over commercialization that has crowded Christ out of the celebration of His Nativity.

Many suggestions will be made as to what one may do as his share in this program—religious Christmas cards—urging radio broadcasters to refrain from playing sacred carols so long before Christmas, have a Christmas service in the home on Christmas Eve, Church bulletin announcements—conversations with friends—Church programs—radio appeals—letters to business firms, asking their cooperation—religious posters—essay contests in the Church Schools—Bible readings. There are other ways you may think of in which you may share in this Christian observance of Christmas.

It is not too soon to start our campaign. CHRIST-MAS IS CHRIST'S BIRTHDAY.



Lt. Gen. V. E. Megee, Commanding General Fleet Marine Force of the Pacific, gave a most inspiring and moving address.


Visits Honolulu

Overseas Department meeting at General Convention.


Laymen to Hold Dinner Meeting

Youth Center Dedicated

Sunday, November 23rd, the Bishop dedicated the beautiful new Youth Center at Holy Nativity Church. He was assisted by the Reverend John J. Morrett, Vicar of the Church, and the Reverend Richard L. Aiken, who is Director of the youth work at Holy Nativity Church.

This new \$166,000 structure can be converted quickly into an impressive place of worship. On a stage is a huge Italian Mosaic mural containing 50,000 pieces of tile and a three-dimensional gold cross superimposed upon a background of the symhols of the Christian faith. The mural was designed by Mrs. Thomas (Winifred) Waddoups as a memorial to Jeanne Jermann.

The firm of Lemmon, Freeth, Haines and Jones drew plans for the Center. At least 800 persons can be seated in the Center, which also has a kitchen, craft room, scout room, office and dressing rooms. This new building will be an attractive addition to our Church property, but will also serve the community of Aina Haina, as well.

Sixty-two young people were confirmed at this service, which was most impressive.

Ordinations to be Held

Three of our clergy will be ordained to the Priesthood by the Bishop in early December. On Maui, the Reverend Jefferson Stephens will be ordained in St. John's Church, Kula, on December 7th. The Reverend Canon Charles T. Crane, of St. Andrew's Cathedral, will preach the sermon. The Rev. Canon Wai On Shim, of St. Elizabeth's Church, Honolulu, and the Rev. Canon Norman C. Ault, of the Cathedral, will also assist with the service, as will the clergy on Maui, the Ven E. Lani Hanchett and the Rev. J. William Anderson, and the Rev.Masao Fujita, of Molokai.

The Rev. Norio Sasaki, Vicar of St. John's Church, Eleele, Kauai, and the Reverend Thomas D. Hughes, of Christ Church, Kilauea, will be ordained on December 10th, at St. John's Church. Assisting clergy will be the Rev. Richard H. Humke, of Honolulu, and the Ven Norman R. Alter.

Appointed Honorary Canon of St. Andrew's Cathedral



Appointed Head of Promotion and Publicity



Bishop Sherrill Takes New Post

Geneva, Switzerland—The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, who stepped down on November 15, 1958, after eleven years as Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in the USA, has been appointed chairman of a committee to raise \$2,500,000 for new headquarters of the World Council of Churches in Geneva.

Plans for the new headquarters call for construction of a 236-room initial unit on a site near the United Nations and other international centers here, to be completed by the end of 1961.

Archbishop Mowll, of Australia, Called by Death

His many friends in Honolulu are saddened by the news of the death of Dr. H. W. K. Mowll, the Primate of Australia and Archbishop of Sydney, who died October 27th at Sydney. His loss is mourned by Church and State leaders throughout Australia and the world.

Bishop Mowll, who was with us for the celebration of our 50th-90th Anniversary and who came through Honolulu on several occasions endeared himself to many. The Governor General of Sydney, Sir William Slim, said of him, "Dr. Mowll gave an outstanding example of Christian life and completely unselfish devotion to his Church and to his country. Both will miss his strong and fearless Christian leadership.

The Prime Minister of Australia, Mr. Menzies, described him as a great Christian leader who will leave his mark on the Church and community. "Underneath his apparently placid exterior he contained very strong emotions and a burning missionary zeal which took him into China many years ago, enriched his experience and finally fashioned his evangelical character."

He had been in ill health since his wife died last December and was admitted to the hospital after a heart attack.

Born in Dover, Kent, he spent most of his life outside England. He had been Archbishop of Sydney since 1933 and Primate.

Writing Story of His Life

Keiya Aoki, our Lay Reader at the Leper Colony in Airaku-en, Okinawa, is soon to have the story of his life printed. It will make a fascinating story for all to read.

Airaku-en, although a government leprosarium, has its roots in Christian soil. Mr. Aoki was told that he had leprosy when he was 17 years of age. He found his way into an Anglican missionary hospital, where a Miss Hannah Riddel was working with lepers of the Kumamoto Leper Colony in Kyushu, Japan. She did much to influence the life of this young man, for it was through her training that he became a Christian.

He then wanted to become a missionary to his people on Okinawa, having heard that they suffered so greatly there. Miss Riddel gathered money from various sources in the Church and sent Mr. Aoki to the Ryukyu Islands. Although she is now dead, her influence lives as Mr. Aoki continues the work she inspired him to do.

He landed on the Island of Ie (Ie Jima, where Ernie Pyle was killed during World War II) just off the tip of the Motobu Peninsula on March 2, 1927. From there he went to the Island of Okinawa and eventually bought land on the Island of Yagagi. It was (Continued on page 8)

a spot by the sea, quiet and remote, and seemed ideal for his purposes. Gradually he collected a small group of lepers until by 1926 there were forty-two in all. As a lay reader of the Episcopal Church, he was their spiritual father. He conducted their Sunday services, prepared them for baptism, prayed for them when they became sick, buried them when they died.

In 1938 the Japanese government formally took over the work started by this good man. The Japanese Imperial family, especially the Dowager Empress, became very much interested in the Colony. In October 1944 and in March 1955 Allied planes were sent in to bomb Okinawa.

With this the Colony was for the most part wiped out. Fortunately there were few deaths from the bombing attacks. The lepers had carved holes in the hills that encircle the Colony, which furnished shelter during the bombing raids and following, until the Colony was again re-built during the occupation.

When Mr. Aoki was sent to Okinawa, it was with the promise that a priest would be sent to minister to them. It was not until 1951 when our Church sent the Rev. Messrs Norman B. Godfrey and William C. Heffner to minister to the Okinawans that this promise was fulfilled. Mr. Aoki's prayer had been answered. He is still serving his people as a Lay Reader. We shall all look forward to the publication of his book.
