New Episcopal Clergy Assignments

On June 16th the Rev. Thomas F. Masson, former Assistant Curate at Christ Church, Grosse Pointe, Michigan, arrived with his wife and three small children to start his work as Vicar of Holy Innocents Church, Lahaina, Maui. He conducted his first services on Sunday, June 28th.

The Rev. Mr. Masson was born in Windsor, Ontario, Canada. He was ordained Deacon on June 8th, 1952, and until 1956 had churches in Ontario. He received his A.B. degree from Wayne University, Detroit; and graduate work at Huron College, London, Ontario, the University of Western Ontario, and the University of Maine, Bethel, Me.

The Rev. Mr. Masson is succeeding the Rev. E. Lani Hanchett, who will become Vicar of St. George's Church, Pearl Harbor.

The Reverend Iver J. Torgerson, Jr., his wife, son and daughter will arrive the early part of July. He graduated from Virginia Theological Seminary in June and was ordained to the Diaconate on April 25th, in the Seminary Chapel, by the Rt. Rev. Arnold M. Lewis, acting for Bishop Kennedy.

The Rev. Mr. Torgerson was a member of The Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui before entering Seminary.

He will be one of the directors of the Episcopal Church Camp at Mokuleia during July and August. Following camp he will become Associate Rector of St. Christopher's Church, Kailua. The Rev. Claude F. Du Teil, Rector of St. Christopher's Church sponsored him during his seminary training.

The Reverend Roger Madden Melrose, his wife

and three sons will arrive in early July to start their work at St. John's-by-the-Sea Mission, Kahaluu. He will succeed the Rev. Kenneth T. Cosbey, who will become a chaplain and Vicar of St. Alban's Chapel, Iolani School.

The Rev. Mr. Melrose was born in Seattle, Washington, receiving his early education there. He received his B.A. degree from Washington State and his Masters in Forestry from Yale University. He graduated from The Church Divinity School of the Pacific on June 4th and was ordained to the Diaconate on June 5th, at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Hood River, Oregon, by the Rt. Rev. Lane W. Barton, Bishop of Eastern Oregon, acting for Bishop Kennedy. The Rev. Mr. Melrose served as Junior Warden of this church before entering seminary, and Superintendent of the Sunday School. He was then West Coast Sales Manager of the Hind Lumber Company.

During World War II he was a Lieutenant in the United States Navy, serving some of his time in Pearl Harbor. He married Miss Charlotte Anne Miller, daughter of Mrs. Kenneth O. Miller, Parish Secretary at St. Andrew's Cathedral, and the late Reverend Kenneth O. Miller.

They have three sons, Kenneth, Jeffery and David.

The Reverend George H. Quarterman, Jr., and his wife arrived on June 30th to become Curate of St. Andrew's Cathedral. He is the son of Bishop Quarterman, of the Diocese of Northwest Texas, and was ordained to the Diaconate by his father in St. Andrew's Cathedral, Amarillo, on June 21st.

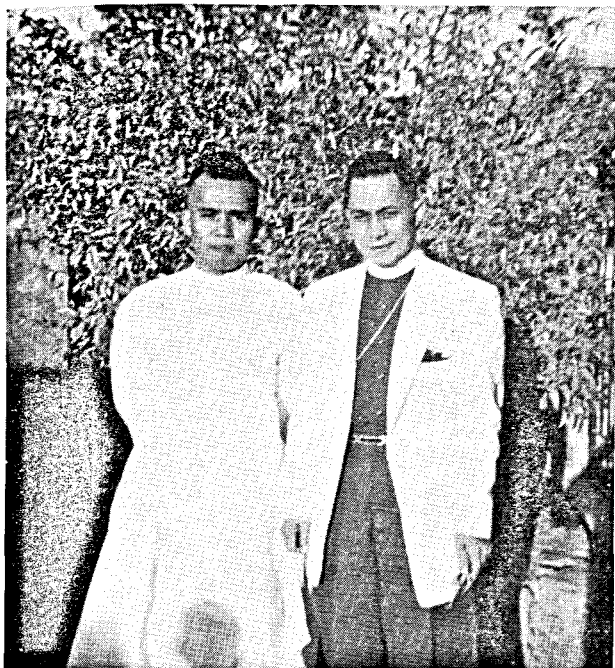

He is a graduate of Lehigh University and General Theological Seminary, New York. He was ordained in 1939. He has had churches in Philadelphia, Washington, D.C. and Rhode Island. His assignment has not been made.

Miss An-veng Loh, who has been Director of Christian Education for the Diocese of Eau Claire, is to go to Taiwan this summer to assist with the work there. She was born in China, but had to leave there during the war. She attended St. Margaret's House, Berkeley, California from 1949-1951. Following her graduation she served at St. Paul's Church, Elka, Nevada as Field Worker, from 1951-1955. Since 1955 she has been Director of Christian Education at Eau Claire. She comes with high recommendations by all who know her. She will stop in Honolulu enroute to Taiwan.

Miss Lucie Cheng, of Taipei, Taiwan, is being brought to Honolulu to further her studies at the University of Hawaii, in preparation for her return to Taiwan as a teacher. She will come here around the middle of August.

Filipine Independent Church Priest To Hawaii

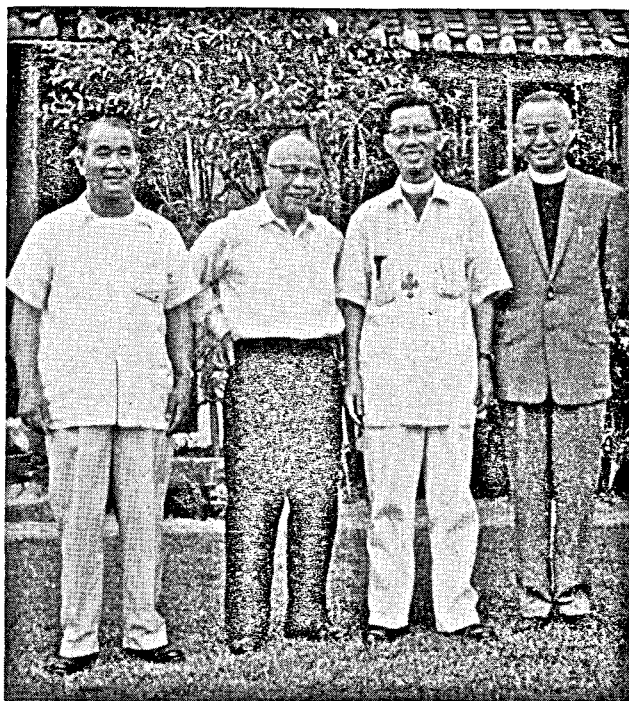
The Filipino Independent Church is sending their first missionary outside the Philippines. Bishop de los Reyes, Supreme Bishop of the Filipino Independent Church and the Rt. Rev. Francisco Pagtakhan, Bishop of the Zambales, are sending the Reverend Timoteo P. Quintero, his wife and infant son to Hawaii to minister to the many thousands of Filipino people—many of whom are communicants of the Filipino Independent Church.

The Filipino population is the fastest growing racial group today. We now have 12% of these in our racial population.

Bishop de los Reyes contacted many Filipino Independent Church communicants when he was in Hawaii for General Convention in 1955 and has been anxious to find the right priest to begin this work.

It will first mean making a survey of all the islands and using our church buildings for services.

The Rev. Mr. Quintero arrives in Honolulu this summer to begin his work. He is a graduate of St. Andrew's Theological Seminary, Manila, was ordained May 16, 1954, by The Rt. Rev. Alejandro Remollino, and is thirty years of age. He was born in Santa Maria, Pangasinan, Philippines.

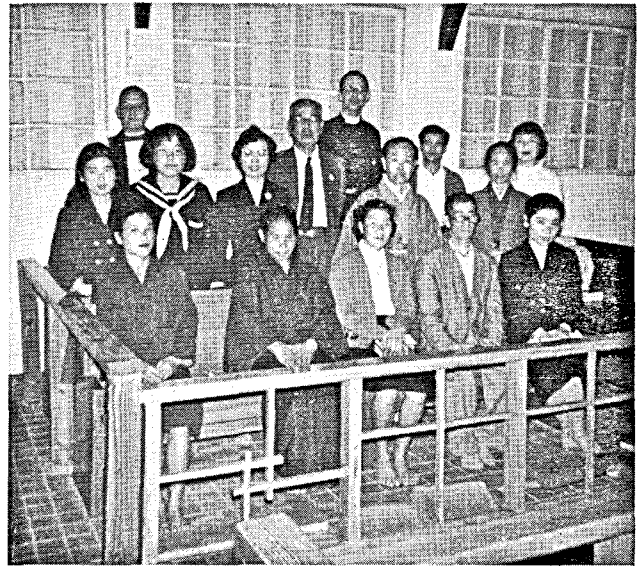
