



Highlights of the 58th Annual Convocation

The 58th Annual Convocation is a thing of the past—the most memorable of our Convocations, so far as interest and attendance were concerned. The Opening Service found the Cathedral packed to overflowing; the banquet was the largest in our history.

The Opening Service was an inspiration to all present. The music was outstanding.

The Right Reverend James A. Pike, Bishop of California, was our main speaker. All of his talks were outstanding and impressive. Other guests and speakers were the Right Reverend Lewis B. Whittemore, Retired Bishop of Western Michigan, the Reverend Canon Charles P. Gilson, of Taipei, Taiwan, and the Reverend Canon Richard H. Baker of Guam.

Emphasis of the Convocation centered on 1962, when the Church in Hawaii will celebrate its 100th Anniversary. Visitors from all over the world will be invited for this celebration. The District is continuing plans and working toward self-support.

The following Committee Chairmen were appointed: The Very Reverend James S. Cox, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, Financial Campaign; The Reverend Canon Paul R. Savanack, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, Plans for the 100th Anniversary Celebration; The Reverend Robert Sheeran, Chaplain of St. Andrew's Priory, Wills and Bequests; the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, Rector of St. Clement's Church, Honolulu, Fund Raising Campaign for the Church Divinity School of the Pacific.

The new mission in the Kahuku area, on the Island of Oahu, was received into the District.


The District now has eleven men of various racial extractions studying for the priesthood in our mainland seminaries, and eight postulants who will enter seminaries next year. We are attempting to raise a ministry of men from our islands.

Eight new clergymen were introduced to Convocation. It was announced that the District is 80% self-supporting.

The Reverend Timoteo P. Quintero reported on the rapid growth of the work among the members of the Philippine Independent Church, who are living in Hawaii.

Distinguished Service Crosses for outstanding work in the District were awarded to Mrs. C. Montague Cooke, Jr., Mr. Kunichi Sakai, the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, and the Reverend John J. Morrett.

For the 16th straight year all parishes and missions have paid their assessments and quotas in full, and all of them accepted increased assessments for self-support in 1960.

The Churchwomen in Hawaii accepted the following Specials for 1960: The Bishop's Discretionary Fund, \$2,926.37; Aid to Seminary Students \$1,197.56; Camp Pecusa, on the Island of Maui, \$750.00; St. Barnabas Church, Ewa Beach, \$662.00.

The statistical reports for the District show 11,198 Communicants and 17,736 Baptized members in Hawaii.

The next Convocation will be February 4-5, 1961.

Convocation elected the following to the Board of Directors of the District: Mr. Arthur G. Smith, Mr. Herman V. von Holt, Mr. Carter Galt, Mr. William Richardson, Mr. Jack S. Williamson, the Very Reverend James S. Cox, and the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler.

The members of Convocation and the District were especially grateful to Canon Gilson, of Taiwan, for his wonderful description of our work there. He is one of the great missionaries of our day.

Ordained to the Priesthood

The Reverend Burton A. MacLean, Headmaster of Iolani School, was ordained to the Priesthood on Saturday, February 20th, at St. Alban's Chapel, Iolani School.

Second Episcopal Church Will Be Built in Kailua

A second Episcopal congregation will be formed in the Kailua area about June 1.

Land for the church has been purchased on Kailua Road, directly across from the proposed Windward Oahu hospital. The Reverend Iver J. Torgerson Jr. will be the minister

in charge of the new work. He is now associate rector at St. Christopher's Church, Kailua.

St. Christopher's Church, the first Episcopal work in this area, was started by St. John's by-the-Sea, Kahaluu. St. Christopher's has since sponsored the formation of churches in Waimanalo and Kaneohe.

Construction on the site will not begin until a mission has been formally established and has had a chance to lay its own plans. The church will operate independently of St. Christopher's but will receive help in the early months.


Quiet Day to be Observed at St. Andrew's Priory


Meals will be served at the Priory. Call 57-239 to make meal reservations.



Groundbreaking Service for St. John's-by-the-Sea Mission

Groundbreaking services were held at St. John's-bythe-Sea on Sunday, February 14, 1960 following the morning service. The entire congregation led by the crucifer,
Arnold Newalu, American and Christian flag bearers, Barry
Newalu and Vernon Yee, and the choir gathered at the
corner marker on the wide expanse of lawn overlooking
Kaneohe Bay. The groundbreaking was for the Charles
Hookano Memorial Hall in honor of the dedicated layreader of St. John's, Charles Hookano, who died about four
years ago. His quarter century of service to St. John's received wide publicity through an article published in the
December, 1951 issue of FORTH.


Through a gift of \$8,000 from the United Thank Offering of the General Division of Women's Work of the Church, this building has been made possible. At the annual meeting of St. John's the members of the mission pledged an additional \$3,200 to permit additional work on the building so that its use can meet the needs of the whole mission and community.

The building will be a Butler frame, 32' x 60', with a blue aluminum roof and concrete floor. Toilet and kitchen facilities will be installed so that the whole mission can gather for fellowship under one roof and protected from the prevailing winds and rain that come in off the Bay. Completion of the building will come by the first of April and dedication services will take place at that time.




The Rev. Roger M. Melrose, Vicar of St. John's-by-the-Sea Mission breaking ground for the parish hall.

Clothing Gift From Hawaii Fills Needs of Entire Village

The two tons of clothing collected in our Diocesan Clothing Drive last summer have arrived safely on Taiwan and have been distributed there under the direction of the Reverend Richard Yoh. Following is the letter of thanks from the Reverend Canon Charles Gilson, in charge of our work on Taiwan, received before Christmas by the Reverend W. Edwin Bonsey, Diocesan World Relief Secretary: "The big shipment of clothing arrived last week, and has all been distributed.

"This, without any question, is the greatest thing that could have happened for our people right at this particular time. It has provided needed clothing for a whole good sized village, plus a good bit left over which we distributed to a few other scattered needy people.

"There's just no way we can adequately thank all the people who had a part in this. Please do the best you can in acting as our 'middleman' in trying to express our gratitude.

"Thanks to all of our and your friends the shipment was delivered right to Dick Yoh's door where it was sorted and distributed.

"Incidentally, the lumber from the crates is priceless! We're having four prayer desks made from it, and several other miscellaneous pieces of church furniture.

"Have yourselves a wonderfully happy and blessed Christmas—as you all will, I know, knowing how many people you have made happy."

Beloved Retired Clergyman Called by Death

The Reverend E. Tanner Brown, rector of St. Clement's Episcopal Church from 1931-49, died early Saturday morning, January 23rd.

Dr. Brown retired from the ministry in 1951. He was 76.

His long service at St. Clement's established him as an Episcopal leader in Honolulu. During his 17 years as rector, St. Clement's built a new church, parish house and rectory.

He had been president of the Honolulu Rotary Club, Honorary Canon of St. Andrew's Cathedral and Archdeacon of Oahu.

Dr. Brown resigned from St. Clement's in 1948 to become rector of a new parish, St. Mark's, in Palo Alto, California.

Born June 18, 1883, in Waverly, Illinois, Dr. Brown received a Doctor of Divinity degree in 1937 from Illinois College.

Survivors include Mrs. Brown; a son, Alden Tanner Brown, of Berkeley, California; a daughter, Mrs. David D. Thoma, of Kailua and seven grandchildren.

Appointed to Hawaii

The Reverend Reginald D. Rodriguez, former rector of St. Thomas' Church, Clarkdale, Arizona, arrived in Honolulu on February 9th with his wife and children, Diane, Dennis and Mary Ann. He has been appointed Vicar of Holy Trinity Church, Honolulu.

The Reverend Mr. Rodriguez was born on the Laguna Indian Reservation in New Mexico. He graduated with honors at Arizona State College, Flagstaff, where he made a fine record for himself, and was President of the Glee Club. Following graduation, he taught at Holbrook High School, specializing in music.

He graduated with high commendation from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. His bishop says of him, "This young man had made a tremendous impression around the Bay Area in San Francisco while assisting at services and teaching Sunday School during his seminary days."

He was ordained Deacon in June 1957 and priest in December of that same year.

St. Andrew's Cathedral Windows

It has been a long time since we have reported on the progress of the Stained Glass Windows but the Congregation will be happy to know that all but one of the large aisle windows have been taken as memorials and all but twelve of the clerestory windows.

The Clerestory Windows, in which are reproduced the simple but colorful seals of various Dioceses of the Church, tell the story of our Cathedral's connection with the worldwide church. The English and American Dioceses reflect our origins in the past and the Dioceses of the Pacific Basin express our present living unity with the church's active 20th Century life. There are 47 of these windows. All have been taken except 12 on the Waikiki side. The cost of each window is \$200.00.

The Aisle Windows are being done in the same style as the original windows of the Cathedral. There are 8 altogether. The 4 on the Waikiki side illustrate Bishop Restarick's explanation of the Church's position that belief comes "from God as He reveals Himself in Nature, in the Church, in the Bible, and in Spiritual Consciousness. All of these have been taken except the Bible which will be represented in the "Bible" window by the Four Evangelists with symbols of the Law and Prophets. The 4 windows on the Ewa side being nearest that portion of the Great West Window showing the arrival of the Church in Hawaii will show that the Church has brought to Hawaii the Prayer Book, Holy Baptism, Holy Communion, and Victory by the Cross, He lanakila ma ke kea. All of these four have been taken. The cost of each aisle window is \$2000.00.

Two of the Aisle Windows are of special interest. The Victory Window is being given by the Iolani Guild in memory of Kamehameha IV. The Spiritual Consciousness Window is being given in memory of Father Bray as a joint memorial by the Young People of the Cathedral and the old boys of Iolani School who played football under the coaching of Father Bray. They have so far raised \$1347.00, leaving \$653.00 to be raised. Perhaps members of the Cathedral would like to help in this cause. If so, send your contributions to the Cathedral Office. Mark it "Bray Window."

In Memoriam

Mrs. Lawrence was a devoted member of St. Andrew's Cathedral, Daughters of Hawaii and the Honolulu Academy of Arts.

The Very Reverend James S. Cox officiated at the burial service.

Is Our Church Costing Too Much?
