





Hilo Hit Hard by Tidal Wave


Everyone has read of the devastation caused by the tidal wave that recently hit Hawaii, and more especially Hilo. Our Holy Apostles church was not damaged in any way. We did have one member of the mission lose his life, and many families were left homeless.

The Venerable Gerald P. Loweth, Archdeacon of Hawaii and Vicar of Holy Apostles Church, worked very hard in the cleaning up process and search for lost victims. He was in charge of the morgue and did much to give comfort and assistance to those who suffered the effects of the wave. Our prayers are with these people. We know it will be many months before Hilo will recover from the damage.

To Start New Mission

Under the direction of the Reverend Claude F. Du Teil, the Reverend Ivor J. Torgerson, Jr., will start services for a new mission on the Windward side of Oahu, about July 24th. The services will be held in the Maunawili School, near the Olomana Housing area. We sincerely hope that this mission will grow so rapidly that we can begin to make plans for the building of a chapel on our plot of land at the Waimanalo Junction.

The Reverend Joseph H. Pummill, Assistant Rector of Trinity Church, Santa Barbara, California, will arrive with his wife and two children, a son eleven and daughter one year, on June 30th. He will become Vicar of St. Mark's Church.






Visiting Clergy

Diocesan Clothing Drive

All the missions and parishes of the Diocese are in the midst of a concerted effort to collect clothing for the refugees of Taiwan. This annual drive will be completed in mid-June. Capt. Steere, USN, COMSERVPAC, a communicant of St. George's has arranged for clothing from churches on the outer Islands to be picked up and delivered to St. George's for final storage before the Navy takes the shipment to Taiwan.

The refugee problem in Taiwan is severe. Through the work of the Episcopal Church there under Canon Gilson, the clothing will be distributed to villages where the need is greatest. The theme "The clothes they need are in your closet" holds great truth, for many of us can give usable, clean, mended clothes no longer in use. Clothes for infants, children and men and women are needed and ought to be brought to your mission or parish promptly. Blankets are also in great need. Items that *cannot* be used in Taiwan are shoes, hats, ties, bathing suits, or handbags.

Honored By His Congregation

The Reverend Yim Sang Mark, former rector of St. Peter's Church before his retirement in 1952, was recently honored by the congregation of St. John's Church, Los Angeles, California, on the occasion of the celebration of his fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. He is now doing pastoral work at St. John's Church, assisting the clergy there.

The Reverend Mr. Mark, a native of China, was ordained by the Bishop of Aukland in 1910. He became rector of St. Peter's Church in 1928, going there from Tonga. He had gone there with the Anglican Bishop of Honolulu, Bishop Willis, to help start an Anglican Church there. He attended Iolani School in Honolulu, having come to Hawaii with his parents from China, at the age of six. He started his "retirement" work at St. John's in 1954.

We are pleased his people honored him on this memorable occasion in his life.

St. John's Craft Shop, Okinawa

The Reverend William Hio, seeing the needs of many widowed women in and about St. John's Church, Nago, Okinawa, started a tiny craft shop in one of the rooms of the Church, helping needy women to earn a little money in order to feed their families.

Through showing them how to help themselves, he has also taught them the influence of the life of our Lord. It has been an amazing work that he has accomplished with these women. He now has over 100 women making beautiful gifts for the Craft Shop. Their sales have extended throughout the United States. The women can make up to \$2.00 per day, which is a very good wage in Okinawa.

He learned to weave so that he might teach them. He now has twenty-five looms busy all day. The stoles, skirts, mats that are woven are most attractive. Through their small profits they have built a new craft shop, which was dedicated by the Bishop on his recent visit to Okinawa.

The Reverend Mr. Hio is on furlough in New York this summer, but expects to visit textile schools to gain more ideas for the shop. Women who cannot come to the shop and work are allowed to make things at home, so they can receive an income for their work. It has been a real venture, for which he has been commended by the officials of Okinawa, as well as the Church.



Plans Being Laid for Hundredth Anniversary

"It is more important that we look ahead rather than look behind." This was Bishop Kennedy's opening remark to the Committee for the Hundredth Anniversary at its first meeting, held in early June.

The Committee at present consists of Archdeacon Charles Crane, Kapaa, Kauai, and the Reverend Messrs. Claude Du Teil and Lani Hanchett, of Oahu. As the time for the 1962 observation draws nearer additional members will be added.

Tentative plans have been made for a year-long celebration, probably revolving around four or more major events. The Committee hopes to have activities at Convocation time, mid-Spring, Whitsunday, early Fall, and Advent.

It is hoped that a history of the Diocese, now being prepared by the Reverend C. Fletcher Howe, will be ready for printing by early 1962. A suggestion was made that the Convocation edition of the Hawaiian Church Chronicle be expanded into a special souvenir program edition.
