Bishop Kennedy Names Top Leaders For Advance Program Campaign

Bishop Kennedy has named two laymen, a laywoman, and two priests to top leadership in the coming Episcopal Centennial Advance Program. Mr. Rudolph A. Peterson has accepted the post of General Lay Chairman, and Mr. Carter Galt has been named as the Chairman of the Diocesan Special Gifts Committee. Mrs. Robert E. White will serve as Chairman of the Diocesan Women's Committee. The Reverend John J. Morrett will act as Diocesan Clerical Chairman, and the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler has been designated as Chairman of the Public Relations Committee and Speakers' Bureau. Mr. Peterson is President of the Bank of Hawaii; Mr. Galt is a retired Vice-President of the Hawaiian Trust Company and a member of the Diocesan Board of Directors; Mrs. White is a former President of The Churchwomen and the present Treasurer; the Reverend Mr. Morrett is Rector of the Church of the Holy Nativity and Chairman of the Department of Evangelism; the Reverend Mr. Wheeler is Rector of St. Clement's Church and Chairman of the Departments of Stewardship and Youth.

K. L. Ching; Clerical, the Reverend Robert Sheeran; Women's, Mrs. William K. Jarrett.



Special Convocation On February 6

The diocesan capital fund campaign has been designated the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program, commemorating the coming of the 100th anniversary of the Episcopal Church in the Hawaiian Islands. The campaign will be inaugurated at a Special Convocation with an afternoon and evening session, to be held at Tenney Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral on Monday, February 6. Regular Annual Convocation Delegates will attend plus special representatives from each parish and mission. Plans and procedures for the campaign will be presented for action and adoption. The schedule calls for all local parish and mission canvasses to begin March 19.

Bishop Burroughs And Mr. Rude To Speak

The Special Convocation which will kick off the Episcopal Centennial Advance Program will feature the Right Reverend Nelson M. Burroughs, Bishop of Ohio, and Mr. Chester A. Rude, Vice-Chairman of the Board of the Security First National Bank of Los Angeles, and former General Lay Chairman of the Diocese of Los Angeles Episcopal Advance Fund.

Mr. Rude will speak at the afternoon session on "The Voice of Experience." Bishop Burroughs will give a special address to the delegates and special representatives at the evening dinner session at the Sheraton Meeting House.

Island Rallies To Be Held

Following the Special Convocation, Island Rallies for all church members, and local parish and mission dinners will be held to bring information, inspiration, direction and a workable plan to each congregation. Preceding each Rally, a workshop session and dinner will be held for Rectors and Vicars, Parish Chairmen, Committees, and workers. Bishop Kennedy and the General Lay Chairman, Mr. Rudolph A. Peterson, will address each Rally.

Campaign Week

During the week of March 19 to 26, all Episcopal Church families will be visited and invited to share in this great effort for our Diocese. With each Church member giving prayerfully and sacrificially, we shall be able to celebrate appropriately a glorious victory on Easter Day.

Campaign Officially Authorized

The campaign is the outgrowth of a study made by a committee under the direction of the Very Reverend James S. Cox, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral. After hearing the committee's report, the 1960 Annual Convocation accepted it and authorized that a capital funds campaign be conducted in the spring of 1961, concluding on Palm Sunday. The Convocation also stated that this campaign have priority over any other campaign being considered between the fall of 1960 and the spring of 1961.

First Diocesan Campaign

This will be the first diocesan capital fund raising effort since the establishment of the Church in the Islands.

A minimum goal of \$375,000 has been set. This will provide for diocesan endowment looking towards eventual full diocesan status, missionary expansion, conference center and camp development, and the start of a new school for girls on Maui. It will also help provide for an increased ministry for our Church by participation in the expansion of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific.

He will also address the Episcopal Young Churchmen at their banquet on Friday night, and the Junior Episcopal Churchmen of Hawaii Saturday noon at their luncheon. Both will be held at the Reef Hotel.

Bishop Burroughs will address the Special Convocation dinner at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel, Monday night, at 6:30 p.m.

A reception honoring our guests of Convocation will be held in Davies Hall, following the Opening Service of Convocation.




Extend Sympathy

Installing organ in St. Andrew's Cathedral

It Takes An Artist To Do It

Have you ever seen an AEolian-Skinner organ before it was put together? To look at the parts strewn out in a big room you would first wonder whether a drainage system was to be installed in a Cathedral, or what—with pipes ranging from 16 inches to the size of a small pencil—4,121 of them.

The new organ being installed in the Cathedral of St. Andrew, Honolulu, is being done by Mr. Lawrence L. Schoenstein and his son, Terrence. They are representatives of the Company in San Francisco, and are the fourth generation of their family to do this intricate and important work, Mr. Schoenstein's grandfather having come from Germany to install organs for this company.

The organ is custom made for the Cathedral. Mr. Schoenstein will do the final voicing of the instrument so that it will perfectly fit the acoustics of the Cathedral. The novice, when he views boxes and boxes of parts put in order with such titles as "Ped Mix," "Liebel Ged, GT Violone, Ant Gl Teu (18)," "S. W. Harm Fl, S. W. Acuta III R. K. S., Ch Block Fl (Top end)" becomes bewildered and confused. Straight pipes, curved pies, rubber-looking pipes—where they will go "round and round" to make the melodious sounds of chimes, bells, organ tones for choirs and such demanding tones as are necessary for playing the correct interpretations of such composers as Bach, Men-(Continued on Page 8)

Holy Nativity Church, Honolulu, recently sent in an interesting assortment of coins for the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief. There were over 5,000 coins, weighing over 35 pounds. dolssohn, Brahms, Handel, Stainer, Devorak and others. Mr. Schoenstein and his son have the secret. Mr. Schoenstein says this is the second time his son has installed an organ with him, so he hopes that he will become a traditional part of the family and join the AEolian-Skinner Company as an organ builder. It is a fascinating skill, but one that brings great pleasure to the many privileged to hear their finished task. All organs of this company are custom built for the individual church or institution purchasing them. The Cathedral organ, upon completion, will cost \$110,000. It has four manuels, six divisions, fifty-one stops, and seventy-one ranges.

It has been a privilege to have Mr. Schoenstein and his son working at the Cathedral. They have had to be athletes, as well as artists, to get the parts up a small ladder to the organ loft, where they are installing them.
