

Episcopal Centennial Advance Program Ends In Glorious Victory

In the early planning for our Diocesan needs, our committee realized that we should raise at least \$700,000. However, when the representative of the Fund Raising Company looked at our parish and mission budgets, as well as our membership, he thought we should not set a goal greater than \$375,000, so we reluctantly cut back our needs.

Now, with the close of our Campaign, much to the surprise of everyone, we are coming close to the original estimate of our needs.

The success of our campaign proved beyond a doubt what a united effort on the part of every congregation and every member can do when God is a part of our endeavor. All congregations—large and small—dedicated themselves to this campaign for the advancement of our church's work in Hawaii.

From the beginning we have felt that this program was more than an effort to raise money—necessary as money is for the accomplishment of our purposes in the years ahead. From all parts of the Diocese we have been delighted to hear of the new sense of unity, dedication and commitment. We have realized anew our potential strength in Hawaii, and have found out what we can do as together we build for tomorrow.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude that our leaders express their sincere thanks for the hard work and generosity of all of our people. We know that as God blessed our undertaking, so He will guide us in the right use of these funds for the strengthening and extension of Christ's work at home and abroad.




The Reverend Messrs: Roger Melrose, Morimasa Kaneshiro and Reginald Rodriguez repairing tables and painting at Mokuleia.


Work Groups At Mokuleia





In Memoriam

Mrs. Sybil Weber, a member of St. John's Church, Eleele, Kauai, and Diocesan Vice President for Kauai of the Episcopal Churchwomen in Hawaii was taken suddenly by death soon after our Convocation in February. She attended Convocation as a delegate and was elected by the women to attend General Convention in Detroit as an alternate delegate. She was a very active member of the Church and her presence is strongly missed on the Island of Kauai. Our deep sympathy goes to her husband, Mr. Fredrick Weber, and her family.

John Yoji Ogura, a member of St. Mary's Church, was taken by death on April 7th. He had undergone surgery. Miss Hilda Van Deerlin, who knew him from childhood, has written this about him: St. Mary's Church has lost a most devoted, 100% attendant member. He was at various times acolyte, chorister, Sunday School teacher, Lay Reader, Keyman, and member of the Bishop's Committee. When a priest was not available, John took over and carried on.

When a boy five years of age he first found his way to St. Mary's. How happy he always was to be there. When he was older he brought his brothers and sisters with him. He was "big brother" to the children of St. Mary's Home, when it came into existence, and spent many hours helping and amusing them. When World War II broke out, he was most useful and spent every night in the Home, until he joined the 442 Regiment and left the Islands.

While They Wait

Two churches are waiting to erect their buildings for services as soon as possible. One is Holy Apostles Church, Hilo, Hawaii, where we have sold the site of the old Church and have purchased land near the University. Here we will build a church, parish hall and rectory.

Services are now being held in a temporary building, which was the old parish hall and moved to the present site until construction can be started on the new church. The main entrance of the temporary building is reached by way of a boardwalk made from the floor of the old sacristy and choir room floors in Holy Apostles Church. The cross is made of koa from the old church and is about twelve feet high.

Emmanuel Church, Maunawili, Oahu, has converted an old store on the property of the Church, into a temporary chapel. It is amazing what can be done when people are anxious to have a place for worship. These people have worked hard to make a place for worship while they wait for a permanent building.



Entire New Kitchen Equipment



Gift To Build A Rectory

Guam will soon start the erection of a rectory for the Reverend Grosvenor M. Needham and his family through the generosity of a gift of \$20,000 from National Council. National Council has also granted a gift of \$10,000 toward the erection of a parish hall for St. Luke's Korean Church, Hawaii, and interest free loans of \$10,000 each for St. Timothy's Church, Aiea, toward a parish hall, St. Stephen's, Wahiawa, for the same purpose and Emmanuel Mission, Maunawili, toward the erection of a church building. We are deeply indebted to them for these gifts, which will help so greatly in extending our work in the Pacific.


Churchwomen Receive Scholarships

Recipients of the annual Friends of the Library scholarships this year are both Episcopalians. Grace Emiko Kojima, who will receive her B.A. in June at the University of Hawaii, attends Good Samaritan Mission, and has taught in the Sunday School there for six years. She will go to the University of Southern California for her year's graduate work in library science.

Adrienne Ching is from Kauai and a member of All Saints' Church, Kapaa, where her parents are also active members, and her mother teaches in the Sunday school. She has taught school at Laie and is at present doing volunteer work in the Kauai Public Library. Her year's work will be done at either Western Reserve University or Carnegie Institute library school, Pittsburgh.

Okinawa Mission Craft Center To Exhibit In Seattle

When the tenth annual Washington State International Trade Fair opens in Seattle from April 20-30, 1961, the Episcopal Church will be represented by the Okinawa Mission which will exhibit handweaving and hand appliqued articles. St. John's Episcopal Craft Center was founded four years ago by the Reverend William A. Hio, priest-in-charge of St. John's Mission, Nago, Okinawa to give work to needy people. Father Hio started with two workers and two hundred dollars capital making hand appliqued children's clothing. Now the Center is worth twenty thousand dollars and gives full time work to almost one hundred war widows. While most of these workers are church members, membership is not a condition for receiving work.

The Center has been supported from the start by women of the English language church in Okinawa, All Soul's. They have helped with designs and have supervised the sale of the articles. Women of the Church manage a gift shop in the large army base on Okinawa and they supervise a large mail order business which ships by mail to customers in America.

Last year the Center sold over \$40,000 worth of goods and now exports to large American department stores. At the Washington State Trade Fair, St. John's exhibit will be located in the Ryukyu Island section and will feature handwoven skirts, dresses and yard goods, also hand appliqued children's clothing.

The Missions and Supply Secretary of the Church-women of Olympia, Mrs. Donald F. Sebelist, is heading a special committee to assist with the fair exhibit. Members of the committee will man a special souvenir booth at the Fair where items from St. John's Craft Center will be for sale.

Elected Head Of Young Churchmen

Patrick Chai, a member of St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, has been elected President of the Oahu Council of Episcopal Young Churchmen. He succeeds Winston Ching, also a member of St. Peter's, who did a magnificent work in his position as president.
