Consecration Dramatic Event As Convention Drew to a Close

For the first time in thirty years the consecration of a bishop took place at General Convention on September 28th when the Reverend Canon Charles P. Gilson was consecrated in the Cathedral of St. Paul, Detroit.

On September 29th, 1931 at the General Convention held in Denver, Colorado, two bishops were consecrated: The Right Reverend Jno B. Bentley, D.D., now Vice-President of the National Council and director of the Overseas Department, and the Right Reverend Efrain Salinas y Velasco, D.D., now retired Missionary Bishop of Mexico.

The Presiding Bishop, the Right Reverend Arthur Lichtenberger, D.D., was chief consecrator of Canon Gilson, who will be Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu to serve in Taiwan. He has been missionary-in-charge at Taipei since 1958.

For the first time in the history of the Episcopal Church prelates of the Philippine Independent Church and the Polish National Church of America joined in the apostolic laying-on-of-hands for such a consecration. They were the Most Reverend Isabelo de los Reyes, Supreme Bishop of the Philippine Independent Church and the Right Reverend Francis C. Rowinski of Chicago, Bishop of the Western Diocese of the Polish Church, which was already in full communion.

Co-consecrators with Bishop Lichtenberger were the Right Reverend Harry S. Kennedy, D.D., the Right Reverend William Payne Roberts, D.D., retired Missionary Bishop of Shanghai, who ordained Canon Gilson to the Diaconate.

Presenting Bishops were the Right Reverend John Boyd Bentley and the Right Reverend John S. Higgins, Bishop of Rhode Island, in whose diocese Canon Gilson served before going to Taiwan. Preacher was the Right Reverend Anson P. Stokes, Jr., Bishop of Massachusetts. Litanist was the Right Reverend Thomas H. Wright, Bishop of East Carolina.

Attending Presbyters were the Reverend John J. Morrett, of Holy Nativity Church and our Clerical Delegate to Convention, the Venerable Richard S. K. Yoh, Clerical Delegate from Taiwan. Also participating were the Right Reverend Benito Cabanban, Suffragan Bishop of the Philippines, epistoler, Bishop Ogilby, Missionary Bishop of the Philippines as gospeler, and the Right Reverend Richard S. Emrich, Bishop of Michigan, as master of ceremonies.

Bishop Gilson is married to Dorothy Alice Jenks, whose sister is Mrs. Robert Mitchel, a member of Calvary Church, Kaneohe, Oahu. The Gilsons have two sons, Charles P., Jr., who is manager of The American Express Company, London, England, and Benjamin, a medical doctor serving with the United States Navy in Japan.

We rejoice in the election of our Suffragan Bishop and pray that God will abundantly bless his episcopate.

Flash Notes On General Convention

Mr. Clifford Morehouse, Vice-President of Morehouse-Barlow Company, New York City, publisher of books and supplies for the Episcopal Church, was the second layman of our Church to be elected President of the House of Deputies, succeeding the Reverend Canon Theodore O. Wedel, of Washington, D.C., who had presided over the three previous triennium meetings.


Unity and Concordats

The House of Bishops, without a negative vote, passed the resolution accepting the United Presbyterian Church's invitation to unity talks and calling for full communion with the Philippine Independent Church, the Spanish Episcopal Reformed Church and the Lusitanian Church, Catholic, Apostolic, Evangelical. The House of Deputies concurred.

United Thank Offering

At the Missionary Mass Meeting, presided over by our Bishop and where over 16,000 were in attendance, the United Thank Offering of the women of the Church was announced, amounting to \$4,339,190.18. Hawaii's contribution to this amount was \$17,552.04 and Okinawa \$1,085.57.

Other Missionary Bishops Elected

The Very Reverend R. Gonzales-Agueros, D.D., dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral in Havana, was elected Missionary Bishop of Cuba, and the Reverend Dillard H. Brown, Jr., bishop coadjutor of Liberia to serve with the Right Reverend Bravid Harris, who has been bishop of Liberia since 1945. Mr. Brown is rector of St. Luke's Church, Washington, D.C., with 1,122 communicants.

Church of Lanka Gets Go-Ahead

Both Houses concurred in the resolution concerning the Church of Lanka—that we anticipate thankfully recognizing the Church of Lanka, if organized on the basis of the proposed Constitution, as a province of the Church Universal, holding the Apostolic Faith and possessed of true bishops, priests and deacons. Full communion would be recognized if a concordat similar to the Bonn Agreement between Anglican and Old Catholics were the basis for this, and that certain anomalies and contradictions in the proposed practice of the Church of Lanka will be satisfactorily resolved.

No Aid to Parochial Schools

Members of both Houses concurred in their resolution against aid to parochial schools. They also concurred in recommending that the Church Pension Fund study the problem of providing major medical policies for all the clergy of the Church, and the problem of pensions for Deaconesses, women church workers and other lay workers in the Church. They went on record as approving increases in pensions for widows and clergy.

No to Amendment

The House of Bishops voted not to adopt the "Book of Propers for Minor Holy Days." This book, which would

constitute an amendment to the Prayer Book, was approved by the 1958 General Convention, subject to action in the 1961 Convention.

No Women in House of Deputies

The House of Deputies strongly opposed any change in references in the canons of the Church which would permit election of laywomen in as Deputies.


Clergy Conference

The Reverend Joseph Pummill will be the Chaplain during the Conference and The Venerable Gerald P. Loweth, of Holy Apostles Church, Hilo, Hawaii, will be the moderator. He will be assisted by the Venerable Charles T. Crane, Archdeacon of the Island of Kauai, The Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, Rector of St. Clement's Church, Honolulu, the Reverend Edwin Bonsey, Vicar of St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, The Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, St. Peter's Church, the Reverend George Hayashi, Good Samaritan Church, Honolulu, and the Reverend Norio Sasaki, St. John's Church, Eleele, Kauai.

Theme of the Conference will be "Journey in Faith" which will be the particular theme for the diocese during Lent, in connection with our 100th Anniversary.

This will be the first venture of a series of educational programs planned by the Cathedral and it will be an excellent opportunity for the laity to take part in systematic courses of study. Surely all of us who are interested in furthering our understanding of our Faith, the Church, its History and Teachings and Practices will wish to attend. Plan now to set this Monday each month and bring your friends with you.



We are deeply grateful to Dr. Bishop for helping us on Maui.


St. Andrew's Thanksgiving Market


St. Mark's Church, Honolulu, will have a Fair on Friday, November 3rd. You will find many gifts you have been waiting for at this Fair.

St. Christopher's Church Sponsors Displaced Couple

Mr. and Mrs. Willem Vis arrived on September 14th under the sponsorship of St. Christopher's Church, Kailua. They are another Dutch Indonesia couple sponsored by one of our churches, arriving here from Holland.

Mr. Vis, a native of Holland, met his wife, Pauline, and wanted to marry her, but could not afford to do so in Holland because housing and advancement of employment are so limited in the most overcrowded country in Europe, and he could offer her no real future. When word came that St. Christopher's Church would sponsor them they were married and had a short honeymoon in France, before coming to Hawaii. They are thus still on their honeymoon and starting a new life together in a new land. He is employed by the Honolulu Iron Works.

Other churches which are awaiting the arrival of Dutch Indonesian families are Calvary and St. Timothy's, which are sponsoring their second families, Epiphany and St. John's-by-the-Sea. The Ewa Community Church has asked the Episcopal Church to help them sponsor a family and now await their arrival. St. Mark's Church is the ground breaker in sponsoring a Cuban family which fled from the tyranny of that country.

Besides helping directly with resettlement, churches can help in world wide relief by setting aside the Thanksgiving offering for the Presiding Bishop's World Relief Fund.




Iolani School To Have New Gymnasium

Iolani School for boys, where we have over 1000 boys enrolled, has completed final plans for a new and much-needed gymnasium. Lemmon, Freeth, Haines and Jones, Architects, have drawn the plans for the proposed new gym.

This is just one part of a half-million dollar project which also includes a swimming pool, six tennis courts, separate locker rooms for interscholastic and intramural sports, and major improvements on the track field.

The New York firm of Ward, Dreshman and Rinehardt have begun the financial campaign with Mr. Edward Pike as campaign manager. The main sources of funds will come from parents, alumni, friends and local business firms and foundations.

The last part of the improvements will be that to The Father Bray Field, lengthening it to meet the track and field rules, and an addition of three lanes to the present five lanes, in order that Iolani may host interscholastic track

meets. Bleachers to seat 1200 people are to be constructed. The Reverend Burton A. MacLean, Headmaster, is most optimistic that the campaign for funds will prove successful.

Church Sponsors Radio Programs

This surprising, stimulating series covers a range of problems from adoption to alcoholism, from divorce to delinquency, and has in its distinguished cast Raymond Massey as host, Bill Shipley as announcer, Walter Abel, Faye Emmerson and many other names familiar to stage and screen.




Son Born to Okinawa Missionaries
