Bishop Leaves For Far East

Bishop Kennedy will include Saigon in his semi-annual visit to the Far East. General Paul Harkens, American Commanding General in Vietnam, has invited the Bishop to visit this area. He will hold services of confirmation on Palm Sunday.

The Reverend Walden Pell, our Church's missionary in Saigon, has prepared a class for confirmation. He has three missions for Americans living in Vietnam.

One of our Church's Chaplains, Elmore W. Lester, has just been assigned to Saigon.

The Bishop will visit our Chaplains in Korea, Japan, and the Philippines. He will also visit our missions in Okinawa, Taiwan and Guam. Holy Week and Easter he will be in the Philippines and Guam.


The Reverend William Hio, our missionary on Okinawa, has been appointed Missionary-in-Charge, succeeding the Reverend Canon William C. Heffner. He will handle the administration of all the mission work and continue supervision of the Nago Craft Center.

Chaplain Edward Mize, Colonel in the United States Army, stationed on Okinawa, will be in charge of the Bishop's military visitations. He was recently canonically transferred to our Diocese of Honolulu.

The Bishop will return April 24th, having spent five weeks in his journey and traveling over 25,000 miles.

Ground Breaking Service

With the entire student body of over one thousand boys, and the faculty, looking on, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, the Most Reverend Arthur C. Lichtenberger, D.D., turned the first shovelful of earth for Iolani's new Physical Education facilities. The second shovelful was turned by the Bishop of Honolulu and President of the Board of Governors', the Right Reverend Harry S. Kennedy, D.D. The bishops were assisted by the Reverend Burton A. MacLean, Headmaster, and the Reverend Kenneth Cosby, Bishop's Chaplain. Also taking part in the ceremony were Messrs. Garfield King of the Development Committee and Hung Wo Ching, Chairman of the Campaign, as well as the Architect, the Contractor, and selected members of the faculty.

The work, now begun, is made possible through completed Building Campaign which raised in cash and pledges the sum of \$611,465.48 for the construction of a modern athletic plant consisting of a modern gym, swimming pool, locker buildings, tennis courts, and a track. It is expected that all work will be completed by October.




Laymen Plan Events

The Bishop's House was the scene of the first meeting this year of the KEYMEN of the Episcopal Laymen of Hawaii. Twelve parishes and missions were represented. Diocesan Keyman Elmer Hutchison presided. The function of the laymen in his own congregation was discussed, and suggestions and plans for effective laymen's work on the parish and diocesan level were made. It was pointed out that though manual labor is necessary, and this usually falls upon the shoulders of the laymen, it is necessary to keep in mind that unless such manual labor stems from loyalty to Jesus Christ and His Church, it has little value in the life of the individual.

It was suggested that each church have either a Men's, (Continued on Page 8)

Women Present Diocese With Alms Basin

A beautiful "Thank-Offering" alms basin was presented to the Church in Hawaii by the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii at the 60th Annual Convocation in February.

The basin, of local manufacture and design, is constructed of koa and monkey-pod woods. Designed to be symbolic of the origins and practices of our Church, it is intended to be used by the congregations of our Diocese for the Ingathering of the United Thank Offering and other significant services in the various churches of the Diocese as well as for Diocesan Services.

The alms basin has twelve sides which represent the twelve Apostles. Occupying the center of the basin is a magnificent carving of the Last Supper—done in the Holy Land on mother-of-pearl. Around the lip is a golden replica of the Diocesan Seal, and in silver the symbols of the four Evangelists—a man, a lion, an ox, and an eagle; three celtic crosses representing our descent from the ancient Churches in England, Scotland and Wales; and four other crosses which represent not only our heritage from Western Europe, but the sacraments of Holy Baptism, Holy Communion, Confirmation, and Holy Matrimony.

Congregations wishing to use the Diocesan Alms Basin should make application to the Bishop's Office.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper

Not content with that, while the last of the pancakes were being eaten the cooks mixed and rolled out 300 hot cross buns for the Ash Wednesday Children's Service. Chairman of the supper was Mrs. A. W. Harrington.

The Lenten Season at St. Christopher's began with a Service for Children, Holy Communion both in the morning and evening, and a study program on the faith of the Church, using "Journey in Faith." Ash Wednesday week ended with a World Day of Prayer program with the combined choirs of St. Christopher's and Emmanuel (St. Christopher's offspring) Churches singing Gounod's motet, "Gallia."


Priory Students To Be On Goodwill Mission

Two students of St. Andrew's Priory, the Church's school for girls in Honolulu, were selected to be among twelve high school students who will represent the Honolulu Y.M.C.A. on a good-will mission to Hiroshima this August. The girls, Karen Takiguchi and Wendy Terada, are both in the Senior class at the Priory.

Honolulu and Hiroshima consider themselves "sister cities," share common interests and are striving for closer relationships in all areas. Last year a number of young people from the Hiroshima Y.M.C.A. visited Honolulu.

The girls will be in Japan for three weeks and will stay in the homes of Hiroshima families. The purpose is to cement the bonds of friendship between the two cities and the two nations. They will do this on a "personto-person" basis through their contacts with individuals and families in Hiroshima.

Both Karen and Wendy are active in school and Church, as well as in the "Y" program. Both are members of St. Andrew's Cathedral, where Karen is the Secretary (Continued on Page 8)

The Bishop Visits Christmas Island

The Bishop returned on March 5 from Christmas Island where he held services for both the British and American forces there. This was The Bishop's seventh trip to Christmas Island. He goes at the invitation of the Royal Air Force, who have military and civil jurisdiction, and the Bishop of Polynesia who has ecclesiastical jurisdiction.

Christmas Island is manned by the Royal Air Force, and is the site of British Atomic and Nuclear testing.

Many Americans are now on the Island preparing for the forthcoming American nuclear tests.

Bishop Kennedy celebrated the Holy Communion and held a service of Confirmation for the RAF in their chapel—St. George's—a lovely coral church built by the Royal Engineers; he held a service for the American troops in St. Nicholas' Chapel which had been abandoned at the end of World War II, but has been rehabilitated and refurbished for the American Servicemen. He also broadcast over the Island's radio station to all the troops, and he spoke to the Royal Engineers.

The Bishop of Polynesia would have to travel from the Fiji Islands to Honolulu, then on to Christmas Island. This is why he asks the Bishop of Honolulu to make regular trips. It is a six-hour flight, by Royal Air Force, from Hickam Field, Honolulu, to Christmas Island.

Iolani Crews Win Honors

Iolani's crews have swept the Ala Wai Canal clean of all opposition in the rowing meets this season, and are now looking forward to rowing against West Coast teams in Seattle this June.


On February 24th Iolani beat Punahou in all four races. On March 3rd the Iolani crews beat Kaimuki, and on March 14th Iolani took four out of four from McKinley. The big event of the rowing year is the "Regatta," when all four schools compete for the cup, which Iolani won.

Iolani has five crews this year. In the Varsity class a "heavyweight" and a "lightweight" (lightweights are 155 lbs. or under); and in the Junior Varsity class one "heavyweight" crew and two "lightweight" crews. None of the five crews have been beaten. The coach is Mr. Robert Lalime, a sixth grade teacher at Iolani, who in his college days rowed for Rutgers.


Four complete crews will go to Seattle as soon as school is out to row against the Seattle Junior Crew Rowing Commission, which is composed of a number of the Seattle High Schools, a team from Oakland, California, and one from Vancouver, B.C. The team will leave Honolulu on June 8th direct for Seattle where they will stay in the University of Washington dormitory. They will have ample time to visit the World's Fair, as well as practice, before the races on June 15 and 16, which will be held at the University of Washington boat house on Lake Washington. In Honolulu only four-man shells are used, but in Seattle

they will race both four and eight-man shells. The boys will return to Honolulu on June 17.

Each boy is responsible for his own expenses. To help the boys with pocket-money Mr. D. R. MacKay of Volkswagen Hawaii has arranged for the crew to clean-up the new cars as they come off the ship and before they go on display.
