### **Congratulations On A Job Well Done**

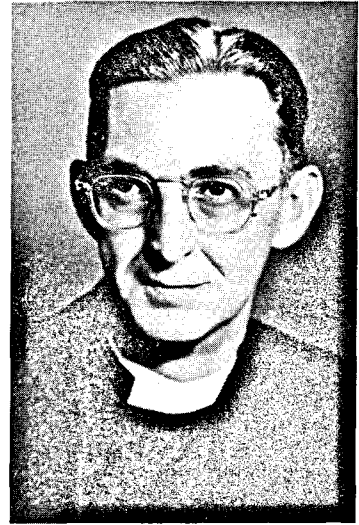

### Cuban Refugee Family Sponsored On Maui

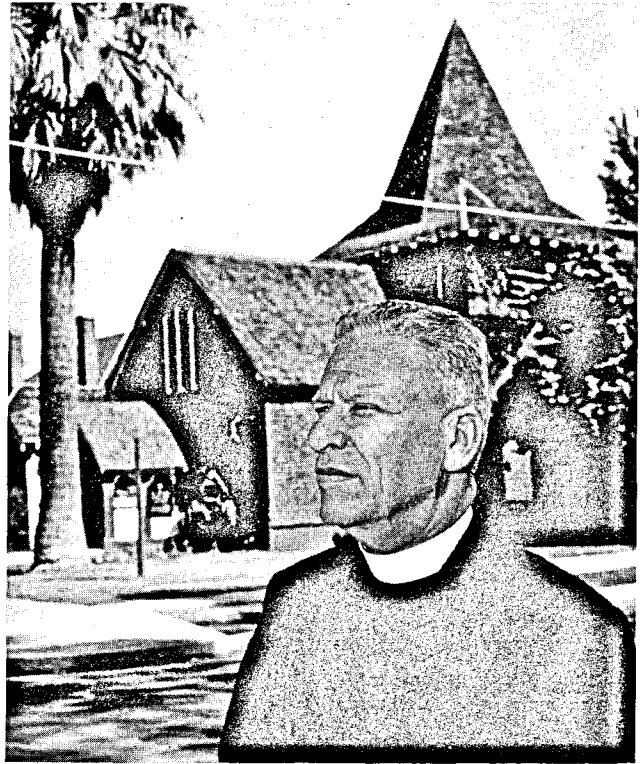
Mr. and Mrs. Mario Rivero and baby Maria, a Cuban refugee family sponsored by the Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui, are pictured above on their arrival at the Maui Airport on Saturday, May 26th.

They were met at the Airport by a large delegation from the parish. Many children were there to present leis to the baby.

A home and job were found before the Riveros arrived and members of the parish furnished the house from beds to baby bottles and food. Commander Gerald Thompson was chairman of the project. Help came from the entire community. Though there is a great un-employment problem on Maui, Mr. Rivero has been offered three jobs since his arrival, in addition to the one already for him, stated the Venerable J. William Anderson, Archdeacon of Maui and Rector of Good Samaritan Church.

The Rev. Canon Lester J. Maitland

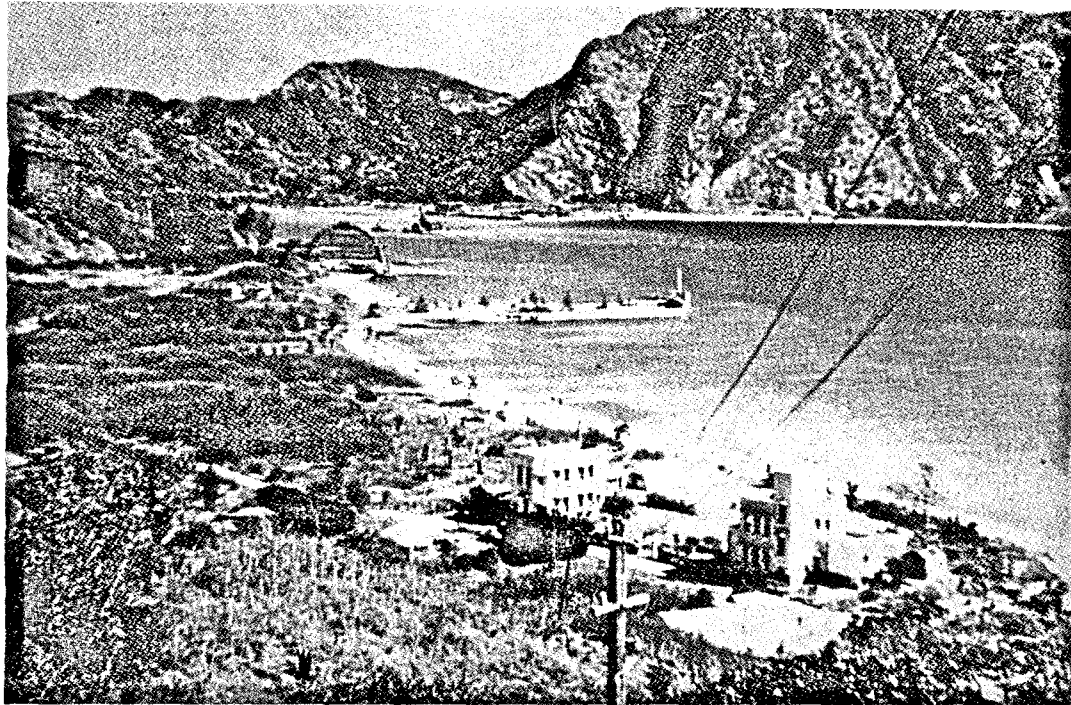
### Former Pilot Becomes Canon Of St. Andrew's Cathedral

The Reverend Lester J. Maitland, who made his name famous in 1927 when he was the first to fly across the Pacific in 1927, returned to Honolulu on June 6th from St. Peter's Church, Red Bluff, California, to become Canon Pastor of St. Andrew's Cathedral.

The Reverend Mr. Maitland was a lieutenant in the Air Force when he made his historic flight with Lt. Albert Hegenberger in a tri-motored Fokker plane that landed at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii. He was the pilot and Hegenberger the navigator. Cheered on their way by a hundred thousand cheering people who jammed the sidelines at Dusty Bay Farm Airport, Oakland, California, on June 28, 1927, they landed twenty-six hours later in Hawaii. This was just a month after Charles Lindbergh made his historic flight across the Atlantic.

He was the oldest combat aviator in the United States during World War II and flew many bombing missions over Europe. He was commanding officer at Clark Field in the Philippines when the Japanese bombed it. He moved U.S. Air Force troops to Baatan after the fall of Manila and later was transferred to Australia.

### To Minister On Chi Chi Jima

Isaac Aisako Ogasawara (ne Gonzales), a native of the Bonin Islands, has been studying in Japan so that he might return to his people as a minister of the Church. He was recently ordained priest in Japan and will leave for Chi Chi Jima on July 4th.

His grandfather was a priest of the Anglican Church and started the work of the Church in the Bonin Islands. He was the son of a Portuguese father and Hawaiian mother, and studied for the ministry in Osaka, Japan, and married a Japanese. Their son was also married to a Japanese, Isaac being one of two children. The Gonzales family is very prominent in Chi Chi Jima. Isaac went to Japan in September, 1943, and entered the sixth grade. He has been there until now, under the guidance of Bishop Isaac Nosse, of South Tokyo.

Chi Chi Jima is far to the north of Guam and about 650 miles southeast of Japan.

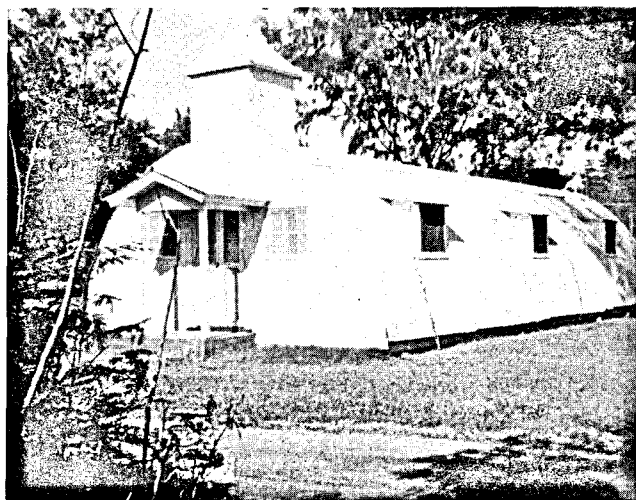
Until World War II the island people were essentially English-speaking people with an infiltration of the Japanese language because of the nearness to Japan. In 1944 all persons native to Chi Chi Jima were evacuated to Japan. In 1946 when many returned, they found the island decimated and all buildings leveled to the ground.

The United States Navy is in charge of the Bonin Islands and has cooperated in the arrangements for the Rev. Mr. Gonzales to return to serve his people.

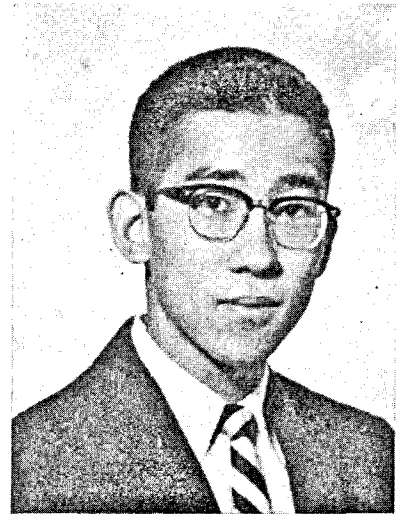

## Two Ordinations To Diaconate Held

The Right Reverend George R. Millard, D.D., Suf-fragan Bishop of California, acting for Bishop Kennedy, ordained to the Diaconate John Liu and Thomas Yoshida, recent graduates of The Church Divinity School of the Pacific on Saturday, June 9th, in San Francisco.

The Reverend Mr. Yoshida, after attending the Out-going Missionary Conference in Greenwich, Connecticut, will return to Hawaii to be assigned by the Bishop to assist on the Island of Kauai. The Venerable Charles Crane plans to have him take services at Christ Church, Kilauea, St. Thomas Church, Hanalei, and to be in charge of the Youth Conference Center at Hanalei. He will assist with the camp sessions this summer on Kauai. He plans to arrive the latter part of June.

The Reverend John Liu will be transferred to the Missionary District of Taiwan, where he will be assigned his duties by the Right Reverend Charles P. Gilson, Suf-fragan Bishop of Honolulu, in residence in Taiwan. He will stop in Honolulu enroute to Taiwan.

## Seminarians To Be Ordained Later

Mr. Albert J. Collins, who has been attending the Church Divinity School of the Pacific for the past year, will be assigned in charge of the Kohala Missions on his return from seminary in late June. His ordination to the Diaconate will be at some later date.

The Reverend John Chung, who has been attending The Church Divinity School of the Pacific for the past six

months, will be assisting the Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, at St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, until his ordination to the Diaconate. He has been a minister in the Korean Christian Church, and desires to become an Episcopal priest.

Mr. Delbert Westling, who has graduated from the Theological Seminary of the Southwest, in Austin, Texas, will be Assistant at St. Christopher's Church, Kailua, when he returns from the Outgoing Missionary Conference in Greenwich.

## On Furlough

There will be quite an exodus in early summer with clergy and their families going on furlough.

### Graduates Receive Awards

The Bishop annually gives an award for the senior who is outstanding in Christian Education at Iolani School for boys, St. Andrew's Priory School for girls and the Hawaii Preparatory Academy. Those receiving them this year were Vernon Ho, Iolani, Duncan MacNaughton, the Academy and Willette Mew Sim Ah Cook, St. Andrew's Priory.

### Unique and Different

The Reverend Andrew Otani, who in World War II started work with the older Japanese on the Island of Kauai, and was instrumental in their becoming members of the Church, has not lost contact with them.

There are only nine members of the Issei (Japanese-speaking) members of St. John's Church, Eleele, Kauai remaining, since all the others have died or moved away. But these nine have through the years kept contact with the Reverend Mr. Otani, who is Vicar of Good Samaritan Mission and in charge of the Japanese American Church and Social Center in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Good Samaritan Mission is an inter-denominational congregation, although supported principally by the Episcopal Diocese of Minnesota.

Tape-recordings of the voices of the members of St. John's Church and those of the Reverend Mr. Otani's congregation are exchanged. The members of St. John's send greetings to Mr. Otani and his group and sing some hymns together. In return, Mr. Otani's group send personal greetings, plus Mr. Otani's sermon. It makes for a most enjoyable evening for the members of St. John's, as well as giving them a sense of the outreach of the Church to people who share their same background, though living in an area so remote to them. Mr. Otani has often remarked about how much his members enjoy this means of contact.

It has been a very fruitful venture for both congregations.

In 1943 he was recalled to the United States to organize and train the 386th Bomb Group. He retired in 1945 with the rank of colonel. He became Michigan's Civil Defense Director in 1955 with the rank of Brigadier General in the Michigan National Guard when he resigned to study for the ministry. The development of nuclear weapons played a great part in leading him into the ministry. "I watched the A-bomb and felt definitely it could destroy civilization. I think a flier acquires a point of view, a philosophy peculiar to himself. He looks down from the skies and sees how infinitely small are men and their works and how little enduring, while the vastness and agelessness of the mountains testify to God's handiwork. I have served Mammon; now I wish to serve God."

His decorations include the Silver Star, DFC with oak leaf cluster, and Air Medal with oak leaf cluster.

His wife, Kay, and her mother will join him later. They will be in residence in Queen Emma Square at least for the present.

We welcome them into our Diocesan family and know that they will mean much to those whom they serve.
