Next Steps in Our 100th Anniversary

August 25th to September 9th The Reverend Dr. Albert T. Mollegen, of Virginia Seminary, and Mrs. Mollegen will be with us as guests for a lecture series and Clergy Conference. The Reverend Messrs.: W. Edwin Bonsey, of St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, and Iver J. Torgerson, of Emmanuel Church, Waimanalo Junction, are in charge of the arrangements for their visit. The Mollegens will visit our neighbor islands and have conferences. Monday to Friday, August 27th to the 31st, Dr. Mollegen will have lectures each evening in Tenney Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral. He will preach at St. Andrew's at the 11 a.m. service on Sunday, September 2nd. Beginning that afternoon until Wednesday, September 5th, the clergy will meet at Mokuleia for a Conference, to be conducted by Dr. Mollegen. He is known as one of the great preachers and speakers in our Church.

Marking Bishop Staley's Arrival in Hawaii

October 11, 1862, the first Anglican Bishop The Rt. Rev. Thomas Nettleship Staley, arrived in Honolulu with his family to start the Church's work. To mark this occasion, The Right Reverend Jno. B. Bentley, head of the Overseas Mission program of National Council, will arrive with Mrs. Bentley to share in this important part of our Centennial Program. They will arrive on Tuesday, September 25th. The Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, is in charge of arrangements for this program.

Bishop and Mrs. Bentley will make short visits to our neighbor islands to see something of the Church's work and to preach.

Sunday, September 30th, will be a most important date for all of our Church members. This will be our **DAY OF DEDICATION** in all churches.

Wednesday, October 3rd, there will be a Clericus Meeting, at which time Bishop Bentley will speak. He will preach at the 11 o'clock service at the Cathedral on Sunday October 7th.

Lord and Lady Fisher

The Most Reverend Archbishop, Lord Fisher and Lambeth, Dr. Geoffrey Francis Fisher, and Lady Fisher will arrive on October 4th to share in our celebration. They will be at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel during their twelve-day stay in the Islands.

Lord Fisher will preach at St. Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday night, October 7th, at 7:30 p.m. Monday night, October 8th, there will be a banquet at the Hilton Hotel Dome, where he will again be the guest speaker.

Thursday, October 11th, will be **ANNIVERSARY DAY**. There will be a special program at St. Andrew's Priory, to be in charge of the Reverend Robert Sheeran. All churches will have services of Holy Communion and special celebrations. There will be a luncheon with the Oahu Clergy, at which time Lord Fisher will speak informally. The Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii will entertain Lady Fisher at a luncheon.

At 6:30 p.m. there will be a reception honoring Lord and Lady Fisher in the Cathedral Close.

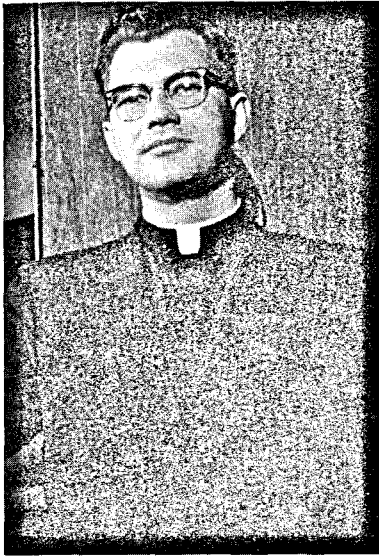
Mr. Paul Calloway to Give Organ Recital

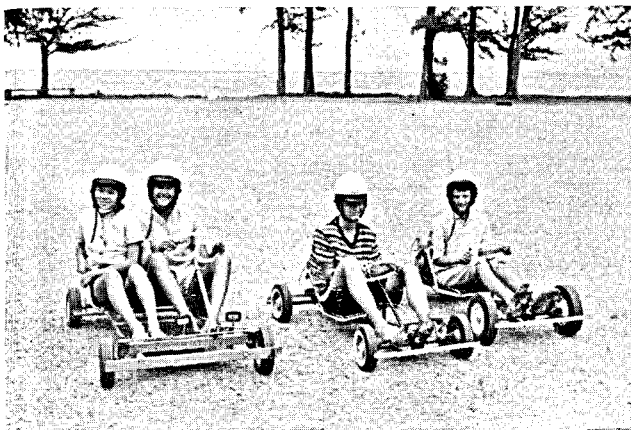
Stewardship Program

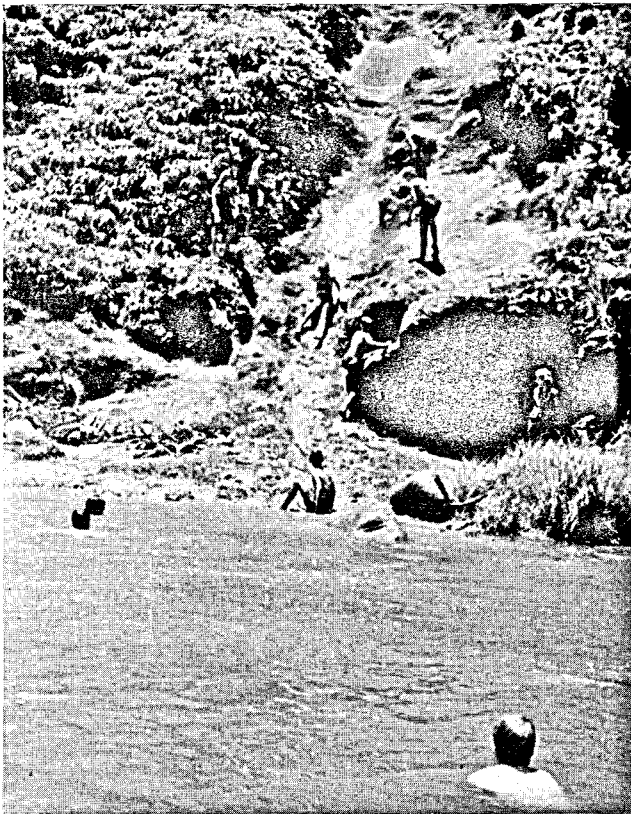

We are indeed more than grateful to all who shared in making the periods such a success.

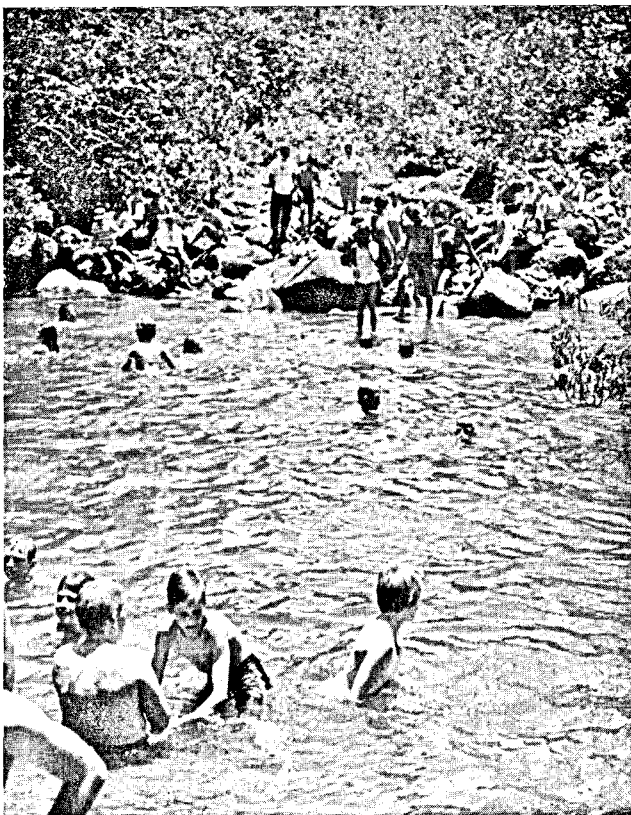

The Most Reverend Reginald C. Halse

Archbishop of Brisbane

The Most Reverend Reginald C. Halse, D.D., Archbishop of Brisbane, Queensland, Australia, stopped in Honolulu for three days enroute from England, where he had been Knighted by Queen Elizabeth.

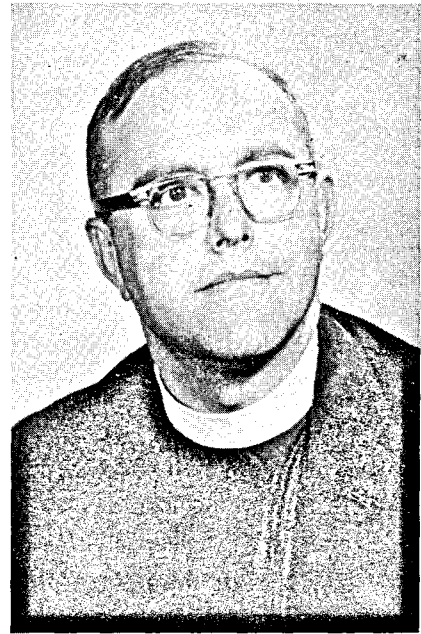

Iolani Oarsmen Participate In Prep Regatta

Twenty-one Iolani School oarsmen participated in an interscholastic regatta in Seattle, Washington, June 16 and 17. The "Red Raider" crews—varsity and junior varsity heavyweight and lightweight classes entered the regatta as the undefeated Hawaii State champions and the State record holders. The 21 boys contracted with the Volkswagen agency to wash new cars in order to raise funds for the trip, which cost the boys in the neighborhood of \$300 each.

They were quartered at the University of Washington, and used the University shells for their races. Despite the fact that the boys were rowing in an 8-man shell for the first time, they turned in a creditable performance and finished a close third in the feature race, competing with three Seattle high schools and a crew from Oakland. In the heavy junior varsity event, Iolani came from behind at the last minute and nipped the Seattle Junior crew with a winning time of 6:06. Iolani also won the lightweight JV race by trouncing the Seattle Junior Crew by a 7-length margin.
