## In Retrospect

We are often reminded that to look back is dangerous—one should press forward in thought and action. But our fourth phase of the Centennial Program cannot pass without looking back and recounting for history the perfectly glorious three weeks we enjoyed in honoring the arrival of the first Anglican Bishop, Thomas Nettleship Staley, to Hawaii, October 11, 1862.

### *Bishop and Mrs. Bentley Arrive*

First, was our great joy in welcoming The Right Reverend John B. Bentley, head of the Overseas Department and Vice President of our National Council, and Mrs. Bentley. Even though their arrival was late at night, many were at the air terminal to welcome them in true Hawaiian fashion. Their presence for the two weeks they were with us was a real delight. Though they could not stay through the entire program of festivities, they were with us long enough to give us much in the way of inspiration. All of our islands enjoyed having them as visitors. Everywhere they went they made a host of friends.

Bishop Bentley preached at St. Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday morning, October 7th. Lord Fisher of Lambeth was in the procession for the service and had the blessing and benediction.

The clergy were privileged to confer informally with Bishop Bentley. The Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii honored Mrs. Bentley at a delightful luncheon at the Haiku Gardens, Kaneohe. A dinner at the Reef Hotel gave the Bentleys an opportunity to meet the clergy and their wives, the senior wardens and their wives, and the heads of the Churchwomen and Laymen.

We are ever indebted to the Bentleys for sharing in this occasion, knowing so well that it was a tremendous effort for them to come so far and do so much in such a short time.

### *Lord and Lady Fisher*

The arrival of the Most Reverend Archbishop Lord Fisher of Lambeth and Lady Fisher was the beginning of a most wonderful experience for all of Hawaii. No better ambassadors of the Anglican Communion could have come to us to represent our tie with the Mother Church. From the moment they stepped off the plane until they waved Aloha, it was a gay round of excitement and joy. So many were present to welcome them at the Airport that they were literally smothered with leis! And they loved them!

A man of great stature, with a humble spirit, Lord Fisher won the hearts of young and old, rich and poor, regardless of race or creed. His infinite interest in everyone found him not the least perturbed when he was due to be in a receiving line, at a service, or what-have you! His friendliness often found him lagging behind chatting with a small boy, an elderly woman, or an interested student.

Dedicating the new gymnasium at Iolani School, he became so intrigued with the boys that he requested to return the next day to have a class for the junior and senior students. Having been a schoolmaster, this appealed to him. Settling himself in the classroom he ordered the teachers and clergy to leave the room. Soon one could hear bursts of laughter and clapping as he "instructed" the boys. They reported it was a tremendous experience.

To his 11 a.m. engagement to preach at St. Andrew's Cathedral on Sunday, October 14th, he added another preaching engagement at St. Peter's Parish, at 9 a.m., by his request. That evening he held an informal seminar for the laity in Tenney Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral.

At a luncheon at the Halekulani Hotel, the clergy were afforded a real opportunity to know him better through their question and answer period. At the same time Lady Fisher charmed the Episcopal Churchwomen of Hawaii with her very splendid talk in Tenney Hall. She was honored at a luncheon following her talk.

### *The Banquet*

The banquet on Monday evening, October 8th, honoring Lord and Lady Fisher, was a wonderful experience for the many who gathered for the occasion. The Very Reverend John J. Morrett, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, excelled as Master of Ceremonies. Lord Fisher's wit, mingled with his words of wisdom, held everyone at his command.

Dancing and singing, especially arranged for the occasion by Miss Phyllis Shields, was part of the evening's program, as was dancing by some of St. Andrew's Priory girls and music by Renny Brooks and his group.

Unexpected was the awarding of the Bishop's Distinguished Service Cross to Mrs. Nyet Chin Kong, wife of the late Reverend Yin Tet Kong, Vicar of St. Peter's Church, Honolulu, for twenty-seven years. Since 1899 she has been a wonderful missionary among her people. Lord Fisher requested that he might present the cross for the Bishop. The Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, Rector of St. Peter's Church, and Chairman of the fourth phase of the Centennial Program, was also given a cross by the Bishop for his outstanding work in the Diocese. We rejoice in the awarding of these crosses to such well deserving people.

### *Thursday, October 11, 1962*

The actual date of the arrival of Bishop Staley was observed on this day. It opened with a service in St. Andrew's Cathedral, at 9 a.m., at which Lord Fisher was



celebrant for the Holy Communion service, part of which he read from the English Prayer Book. He was assisted by the Bishop, Dean John Morrett, the Reverend Canons Lester J. Maitland and Eugene B. Connell and the Reverend Robert Sheeran. The Right Reverend Lyman Ogilby, Bishop of the Philippines, read the Epistle.

Following this service Lord Fisher went to St. Andrew's Priory School where he spoke to the girls and enjoyed a coffee hour.

#### *Other Distinguished Guests*

Dr. Paul Callaway, Organist and Choir Master of Washington Cathedral, Washington, D.C., arrived on October 9th to give an organ recital on the 11th honoring Lord and Lady Fisher, following a large reception that was held for them in Queen Emma Square. In the receiving line with Bishop and Mrs. Kennedy were Lord and Lady Fisher, Dr. Callaway, Bishop Lyman Ogilby, Bishop of the Philippine Islands, and Bishop Lloyd R. Craighill, Retired Missionary Bishop of Anking, and Mrs. Craighill, who were enroute to visit their sons in Tokyo and Tainan, Taiwan.

The organ recital given by Dr. Callaway was something everyone will long remember. The Cathedral was filled to overflowing. It was a thrilling experience to hear such an outstanding program given by such a great artist. We are ever in his debt for coming to Hawaii for this special occasion. A hurried trip for him, but it was we who were left breathless.

#### **Statement From the Presiding Bishop**

There seems to be widespread misunderstanding of my statement with respect to the crisis over Cuba in the course of a press conference here on Saturday, October 27th. Headline writers have attributed proposals to me which I in fact did not make and even such a respected journalist as Arthur Krock of the New York Times has alleged that I made "a proposal that President Kennedy repay Turkey's faithful and courageous alliance with a trade of its security for our own." I did not say this. I made no proposals.


I released a statement at the start of the press conference in which I said this, and I quote: "As fellow Christians we stand with the President in the loneliness he must feel as he faces the awesome demands of his calling. At the same time we affirm that the Gospel transcends power politics. We Christians know and believe that the will of God is the reconciliation, not the overthrow and destruction, of men and races. As our bishops have repeatedly affirmed, war as a method of settling international disputes is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ."

In response to a reporter's question on the proposed exchange of Cuban missile bases for those in Turkey, I replied that "this seems a reasonable solution" but I had previously stated that "we do not know the actual facts" and later repeated that the President "must have more



Mrs. Taylor wrote the Bishop, "A few days later, in a flash, I decided to sell them and turn the proceeds over to some place where God's work was being done. I advertised it on a radio and in the newspapers and everybody knew that a leper colony on Okinawa would be receiving the results of the sale." As a result she has sent to the Bishop's office almost \$1,200 for this important work. So one suggestion has made many grateful hearts, because God worked through good, Christian people.

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information (than any of us) on which to base his decisions." When I was informed of President Kennedy's demand that work on the Cuban missile sites be discontinued and the weapons made inoperable before any proposals could be discussed, I added this remark to my earlier statement: "The reply as explained by the President certainly seems to be a reasonable one. The President's decision must be based on actualities. We still hope and pray that this matter may be settled by negotiation." The situation is so complex, requiring intimate knowledge of the facts and recognition of our NATO allies, that I rely fully on the judgment and actions of the President in these serious negotiations.
