Yale Man To Head Seabury Hall

The Venerable Roger Madden Melrose, Archdeacon of Maui and rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Wailuku, Maui, has accepted appointment as Headmaster for Seabury Hall, the school for girls, soon to be opened on Maui by the Episcopal Church. This announcement was made by the Right Reverend Harry S. Kennedy, Episcopal Bishop of Honolulu, who also revealed that he expects to announce the name of the Director of Studies for Seabury Hall very shortly. The Reverend Mr. Melrose has been on the planning committee for the new school since its inception and has been the key figure in its development.

He was born on November 23, 1924, the son of Mr. Samuel H. Melrose and the late Mrs. Melrose of Seattle, Washington. He received his early education in Seattle, B.A. from Washington State, received his Master's degree at Yale University, and in 1959 obtained the degree of Bachelor of Divinity at Church Divinity School of the Pacific. On December 5, 1959, he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Kennedy. Married to Charlotte Anne Miller at St. Andrew's Cathedral, Honolulu on July 8, 1947, they have four children, Kenneth, Jeffrey, David and Anne Maile. Mrs. Melrose is a graduate of Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts.

Plans are proceeding rapidly toward the opening of Seabury Hall in September of this year. As previously announced, it will provide boarding facilities for girls in the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th grades and will accept boys as day students as space is available. Applications are being received at Seabury Hall, P. O. Box 95, Makawao, Maui.

Seabury Hall To Construct Dormitory

Seabury Hall, on the Island of Maui, has announced that plans have been drawn and construction let for a two story dormitory to accommodate sixty girls and two house mothers.

Convocation In Taiwan

The 3rd Annual Convocation of the Missionary District of Taiwan was held on January 11th in Taiwan. The Right Reverend Charles B. Gilson, Suffragan of Honolulu, presided.

Bishop Gilson has reported with enthusiasm about the events that are taking place in Taiwan. He ordained to the Diaconate Mr. M. C. Chia on Friday, January 10th.

The new St. Paul's Church, in Kaohsiung, where the Reverend Patric Hutton is Vicar, will be dedicated on the afternoon of Easter, even though it may not be completely finished. They also have a new vicarage at St. Paul's and at All Saints Church, Kangshan, where the Reverend John Liu is Vicar.

A new clinic building has been erected at Chading. We have a new piece of property and church at Chiayi, where the Reverend Samuel Chen is Vicar and where Miss An-veng Loh is an important missionary worker.

Twentieth Anniversary Of Consecration Observed

The Bishop observed the Twentieth Anniversary of his Consecration as Bishop of Honolulu at a Holy Communion service in St. Andrew's Cathedral, at 10:30 a.m., on January 11th. He was Celebrant and was assisted by: The Venerable John J. Morrett, the Reverend Canon James G. Long, the Venerable Roger M. Melrose, Archdeacon of Maui, the Venerable Gerald P. Loweth, Archdeacon of Hawaii, and the Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Honolulu.

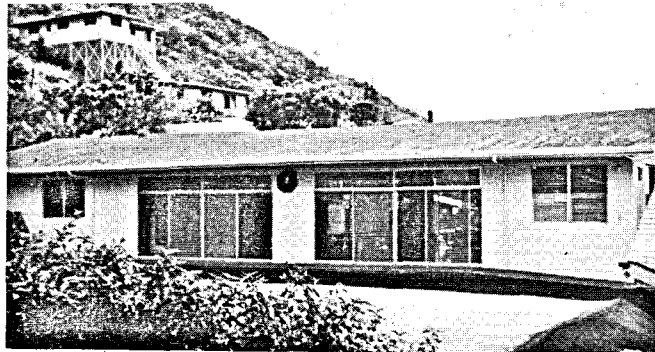
An offering was presented from all congregations in Hawaii for the advance work in the Diocese.

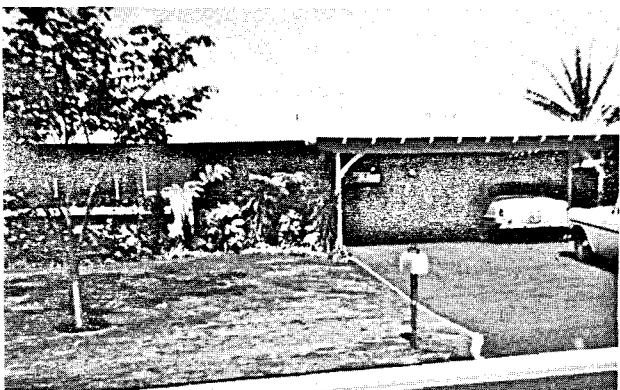

St. Christopher's, Kailua—residence for Associate Rector



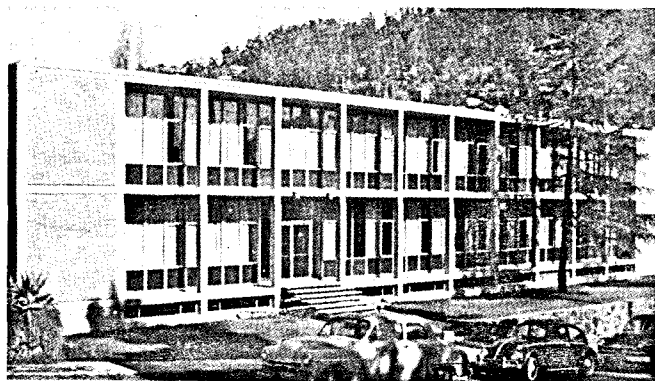
Good Samaritan, Honolulu—Parish Hall



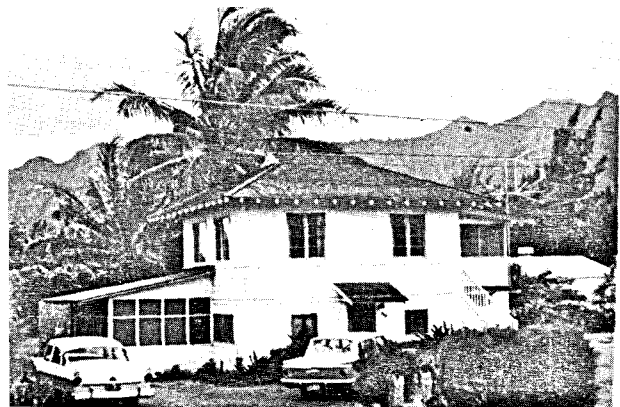
Emmanuel Vicarage—Olomana Village, Oahu



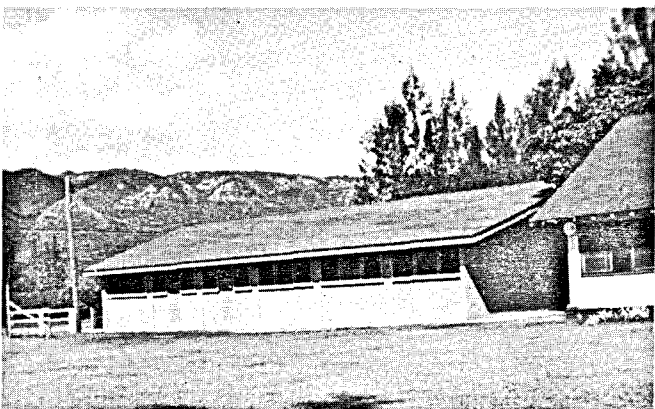
Philippine Independent Church — Vicarage for the Reverend Jimoteo P. Quintero.

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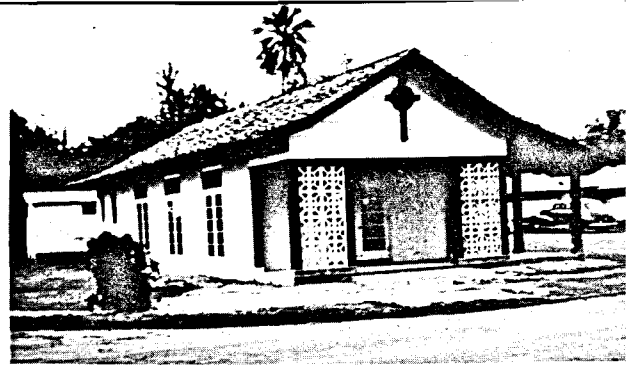

Emmanuel Church, Enchanted Lake—new parish hall and classrooms

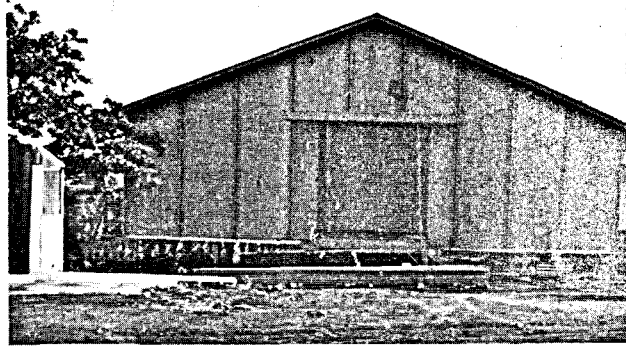


St. Thomas' Chapel, Hanalei, Island of Kauai

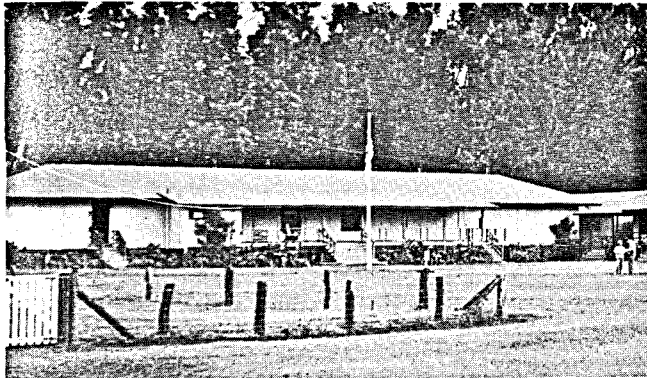

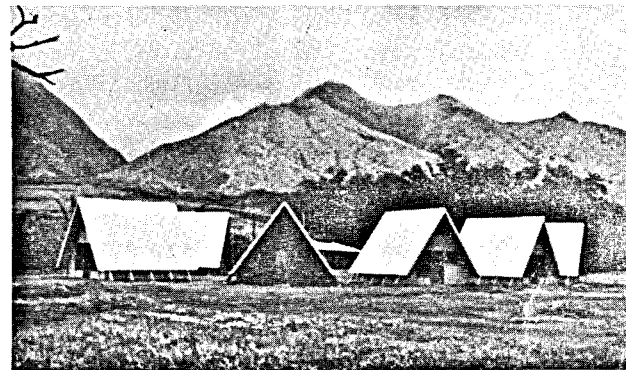

Holy Spirit, Waipahu—buildings being rehabilitated for chapel and classrooms.



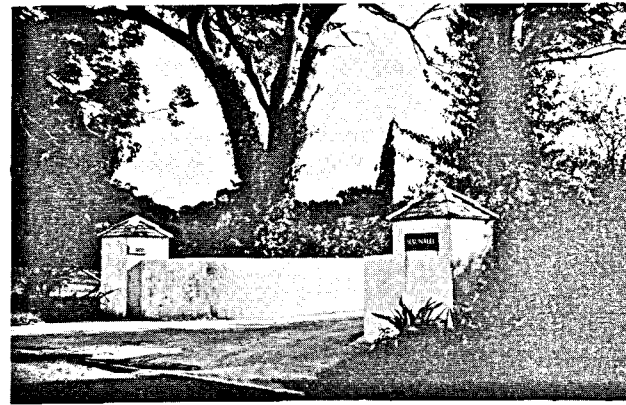

To Be Ordained On Septuagesima

The Reverend John Paul Engelcke, of Canterbury House and Assistant at St. Clement's Church, Honolulu, will be ordained to the Priesthood by the Bishop, on Sunday, January 26th, at St. Clement's Church, at 10 a.m.

The Preface to the Ordinal will be read by the Reverend C. Fletcher Howe. The Reverend Canon Wai On Shim, D.D., will be the Bishop's Chaplain and will read the Gospel. Preacher will be the Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, Rector of St. Peter's Church. The Reverend William Reeves, Chaplain at Iolani School will read the Epistle, and the Reverend Keith McPherson, also of Iolani School, the Litany. The Ordinand will be presented by the Reverend Paul M. Wheeler, D.D., Rector of St. Clement's Church.

A reception honoring the Ordinand will be held following the service, in the parish hall.

Receives Injuries

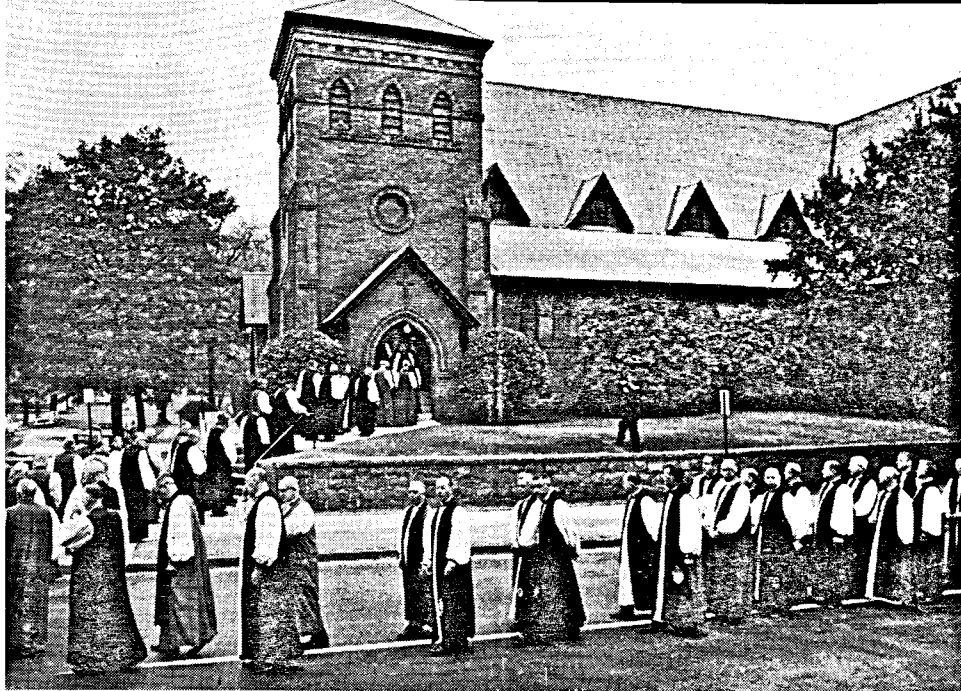
St. Andrew's Cathedral Now Has A Fine Library

On January 6, the library at St. Andrew's Cathedral opened for business. A committee has been working for over a year reorganizing the existing collection, re-cataloging and cataloging new material. With a gift of \$500 from the Women of St. Andrew's, Room 6 (opposite Tenney Hall) was painted, equipped with shelves and necessary furniture acquired. A generous gift from Iolani Guild of St. Andrew's provided many up-to-date reference books, including the Interpreter's Bible, Interpreter's Dictionary of the Bible, an unabridged dictionary, Bible Atlas and many other useful titles. The Misses Mary and Renney Catton, and others, donated books on religion and some historical material on the church in the Islands. It is hoped to build a good collection of Hawaiiana, particularly the history of the church. A steel filing case will house material in clipping form, reports, pamphlets, etc. on every phase of the church and its work in the Islands. Current books will be added as funds permit. Religious periodicals are available as well as some popular magazines.

The clergy are especially urged to use the library's resources at any time, and if the library is not open, may obtain a key from the office, or contact Mrs. Birnie at 553-295, or Mrs. Chaffee at 991-810. Library hours, for the present will be: Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturdays, 9-12 a.m., and Sundays from 9 a.m. until after the last service. Any one in the diocese is welcome to use the library, or to come in and read or browse. Books may be charged out for two weeks, with the privilege of renewal.

Friend Of Hawaii Called By Death

The Right Reverend William Proctor Remington, senior Bishop of the Church, died in La Jolla, Calif., on December 19, 1963, at the age of 84. He attended our 50th-90th Anniversary celebration in 1952 and the General Convention in Honolulu in 1955.

He served as a bishop in three jurisdictions before his retirement, Suffragan of South Dakota, Bishop of Eastern Oregon, and Suffragan Bishop of Pennsylvania. He held the STD degree from the University of Pennsylvania and D.D. from the Virginia Seminary.

Iolani And Punahou Schools Share In Gift

The H. R. Company of Hilo, Hawaii, the partners of which are Lowell S. Dillingham, Ben F. Dillingham, C. W. Carlsmith, and Donn W. Carlsmith, have conveyed to Iolani and Punahou Schools one-half interest in and to 35 acres of land situated in Holualoa 1st, North Kona. A detailed appraisal of the property is in process, but the company has been assured that the value will not be less than \$5,000 per acre, making the undivided interest worth at least \$87,500.

In making the gift, the partners felt that this parcel would be more desirably developed as one tract. Each school is given free course to partition its interest at any time.

Iolani School is greatly indebted to these men for making such a substantial gift possible.

What Do You Know About A Seminarian?

Clergy don't "just happen." God may call them, but it takes three years of expensive graduate training in theology before these men are prepared to practice their vocation.

It costs approximately \$2,887 per year to educate a seminarian. Of this amount the student pays about \$990. For each student a seminary accepts, it must plan to raise \$1,000 over and above the income it receives from tuition, fees and endowments.

After four years of college expense, the resources of the average seminarian are extremely limited. The majority of seminarians have part-time jobs; many borrow large sums; 84% receive scholarship aid. The difference between what a seminarian can pay and what his priestly education actually costs is great.

We have seven men in seminary from Hawaii—in three seminaries—five in the Church Divinity School of the Pacific, Berkeley, California, one in Virginia Seminary, Alexandria, Virginia, and one in Seabury-Western, Evanston, Illinois. Your help in training them to come back to Hawaii and serve in this mission field is needed. Remember Theological Seminary Sunday on January 26th with your offering and prayers.

The Presiding Bishop's Message

for Theological Education Sunday January 26, 1964

Our theological seminaries are centers of learning, the life-line of the ministry, forums where the issues of our time are seen and discussed in the light of the Christian revelation. About 350 men are prepared for ordination each year in our seminaries. Adequate leadership demands sound preparation.

No one of our theological schools receives any financial assistance from the national Church. No seminary student pays his own way; in fact, he pays about one third of it. The other two thirds must be made up from other sources, and maintenance costs continue to rise.

Theological Education Sunday falls this year on January 26. It is an annual opportunity for all Church people to make an act of faith in the future leadership of the Church, and to express that faith through generous financial support. I commend this cause to your prayers and to your giving.

Interesting Figures

The 1964 Episcopal Church Annual states that the Diocese of Massachusetts has the most baptized members: 140,144. Second is the Diocese of Los Angeles with 136,992. Of communicant strength the Diocese of Los Angeles tops the list with 91,014 and New York is second with 88,420.

The largest parish shows St. Philip's, New York City with 3,999 communicants and Christ Church, Greenwich, Connecticut is second with 3,961 communicants. Number three is Trinity Parish, New York City, with 3,918.
