Thirty-Five Years of Service

Mr. Bing Fai Lau, Business Manager of Iolani School, was honored at a dinner at the Hon Kung Restaurant, on Wednesday, May 6th, at 7 p.m. A 9-course Chinese dinner was served to the large assembly of faculty members, alumni members of Iolani, and friends.

Mr. Lau came to Hawaii as a boy from China, and after his graduation from Iolani School in 1928, joined the staff of the school where he became a much beloved figure in the life of the school. He rose through the ranks to his present position, and few people in the 101-year history of the Iolani have served with such dedication.

The school scholarship program has always been particularly near to his heart, so in recognition of this a cash gift of over \$1,200 was given to him to be added to the Father Kenneth Bray Scholarship Fund.

In addition the Board of Governor's of the school gave him a gift of a trip to attend the Association of Independent Schools meeting in February, to be held in New York. Mrs. Lau will accompany him. He and Mrs. Lau were also given a trip to Kauai for a weekend in any hotel of their choice.

One delightful phase of the evening had been worked out by Mr. James Loomis—that of having the former headmasters of Mr. Lau's years bring him greetings via a tape recording—Mr. William Buttles, now of Kealakekua, Hawaii, Mr. Ralph Monell, Superintendent of Schools in Canon City, Colorado, The Reverend Arthur L. Lyon-Vaiden of Christ Church, West River, Michigan, The Reverend Charles Parmiter, San Miguel School, San Diego, and The Reverend Frederick A. McDonald, Munich, Germany. His two sons and daughter-in-law, on the Mainland, also sent their greetings.

President of the Alumni, Mr. Roy Chung, The Bishop, and the Reverend Burton A. MacLean, Headmaster of Iolani, paid tribute to Mr. Lau.

The Chapel was filled to capacity with the boys of the upper high school grades of the school and friends of the Ordinand. The Reverend Richard A. Kirchhoffer, Jr., Vicar of St. Stimothy's Church, Aiea, preached the Ordination Sermon. The following clergy assisted with the service: Burton A. MacLean, Headmaster of Iolani, read the preface to the Ordinal, David P. Coon, Registrar of the school, read the Epistle, Keith McPherson, Chaplain at Iolani, read the Litany for Ordination, Joseph H. Pummill, Rector of St. Mark's Parish, the Gospel. The Reverend Arthur Ward, Vicar of St. Alban's and Chaplain at Iolani, presented the Ordinand. The Reverend John P. 

Seabury Hall News

The benefit dinner-dance at Seabury Hall on April 4th was a tremendous success and realized \$1,500 for new books for the school library. Combined with the many gifts of books made to the school this money will insure that we will start September 1964 with an excellent assortment of reference books for the students and faculty. The dinner-dance was such an outstanding event on Maui that it is to be an annual event.

The Venerable Roger M. Melrose, Headmaster, and his wife left for the Mainland on April 6th to visit the Annie Wright Seminary in Seattle, Washington and the Bishop's School in La Jolla, California to gain information and orientation for the opening of Seabury Hall. The heads of these schools were extremely generous in making every bit of information and experience available to them.

A new brochure for Seabury Hall has won acclaim. It was designed by Mr. Lee Radner and is truly a work of art, as well as an informative leaflet. Mr. Melrose said, "As a matter of fact, the brochure is so attractive that the dean of my theological seminary (The Church Divinity School of the Pacific) who ranks as an internationally known New Testament scholar, asked that if the board of the seminary fired him, could he be considered for a position as a master in English."

The dormitory is well under construction and the temporary Headmaster's home is nearing completion from additions and renovations.


The first Board of Trustees meeting was held on Maui, May 2nd, with the Bishop presiding.

Applications are now being received for the school. Much interest has been shown in entering the fall term. We can accept only 60 boarding school members. There will be boy and girl day students in grades 7 through 10.

Seabury Hall is open to any girl who wants what Seabury has to offer. First of all the applicant must have a desire to go to college, for Seabury's aim is to prepare its students to do college level work. This means the curriculum is geared to the solid subjects of mathematics, English, literature, languages, history, art and music. To be competitive at the college entrance level there must be a solid preparation in the "front line" courses.

Seabury will offer a college preparatory curriculum, small teacher-pupil ratio, and a Christian community life.

Droughts, floods, hunger and disease are early lessons for Korea's 2½ million slum occupants and for the mind of a child there is no reason for such suffering.


Born after the Korean War, many of these children cannot see that bombed cities and burned forests mean refugees and floods for years to come.

Becomes First Bishop of Columbia

The Reverend David Benson Reed, Vicar of St. Matthew's Church, in Rapid City, South Dakota, was consecrated the first bishop of Columbia, South America, on Saturday, April 25th, in Trinity Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma, by our Presiding Bishop, Arthur Lichtenberger, assisted by The Right Reverend Reginald Heber Gooden, Bishop of the Panama Canal Zone and the Right Reverend Joseph M. Harte, Bishop of Arizona.


Just prior to his election, at the annual meeting of the Bishops in Little Rock, Arkansas, the bishops designated the entire 440,000 mile area of the Republic of Columbia as a new missionary district of the Episcopal Church.

Bishop Reed began his ministry as an Episcopal priest in Columbia. He is only 37 years of age. He is married and has four children.

Greek Orthodox Church Observes Easter

Little Pigs for Market


The church in Miyako Island is in the pig business. This is one of the projects of the Okinawa Mission to assist ex-lepers to settle outside of the leper colony. Already the church has assisted three families to make the adjustment to live on the "outside." One family is in the chicken business, one has a taxi, and one is now raising Landrace hogs, breeded from registered stock that originated in Denmark and came to Okinawa via Iowa. Mr. Shinzato, who is in charge of the pigs, hopes to raise enough money to buy them from the church this Fall when both pigs will have their first litters. This breed which is new to Okinawa is in such demand that Mr. Shinzato has already sold "rights" to ten unborn pigs and is using the money to buy feed. Canon Hio has written to the Reverend Peter Shinjo, our priest-in-charge of the church's work in Miyako, that he has heard of selling stocks short but that this is the first time that he has heard of selling pigs short. Father Shinjo wrote back a letter to assure the Canon that we need not worry about covering our short position since the pigs were innoculated for every possible disease and would surely come through in October.

Episcopal Centennial Advance Program

Our Episcopal Centennial Advance Program over the past three years has blessed the Missionary Diocese of Honolulu. It has stirred the imaginations and lifted the sights of the members of our Church family.

The Advance Fund, although not completed, has been a tremendous success. We are seeing the fruits of that endeavor all around us in the construction of new churches, parish houses and vicarages, as pledges are being paid.

We are thankful that because of what you have given




Mr. Herbert H. P. Ma, of Taiwan, Lay Deputy elected to General Convention, Mrs. Ma, and children.

and will give, we are in a much stronger position to do our work for God, by providing better facilities to reach out in new ways and new locations with greater effectiveness.

There is approximately \$145,000 still to be paid. We believe that our churchmen will see that their payments on their pledges are paid in full. The three year period ended in April, but we will most certainly extend this period to enable those who are in arrears to complete their payments. The Board of Directors has issued a request that an extension of time be given.

Losses by deaths and removals also make it imperative that all those in arrears complete their payments to enable us to fulfill our commitments. These obligations are important, and should be treated as a solemn obligation to our Lord and His Church. Christians do not withhold from God what they have promised to God.

All ECAP treasurers and the clergy are urged to diligently go over their pledges and take the necessary steps to complete the job. We commend St. Stephen's Church, Wahiawa, and Emmanuel Church, Enchanted Lake for completing their pledges 100%.

for World Relief.

In the overall program of the United Clothing Appeal, four categories of articles are requested:

- 1) Clothing in good condition and ready to wear, pressing unnecessary.
 - 2) Bedding in good condition.
 - 3) Shoes—Men's shoes, especially work shoes.
- 4) Miscellaneous—Yard goods and yarn, soap, sewing kits, health aid kits, medical kits (do not send sample or prescription drugs).

Certain items are specifically not requested:

Clothing or bedding requiring cleaning, laundering or repair;

Evening clothes, high heeled or open-toed shoes, hats, extra belts, pocketbooks, ties, bathing suits, bulky bedding such as mattresses or pillows.
