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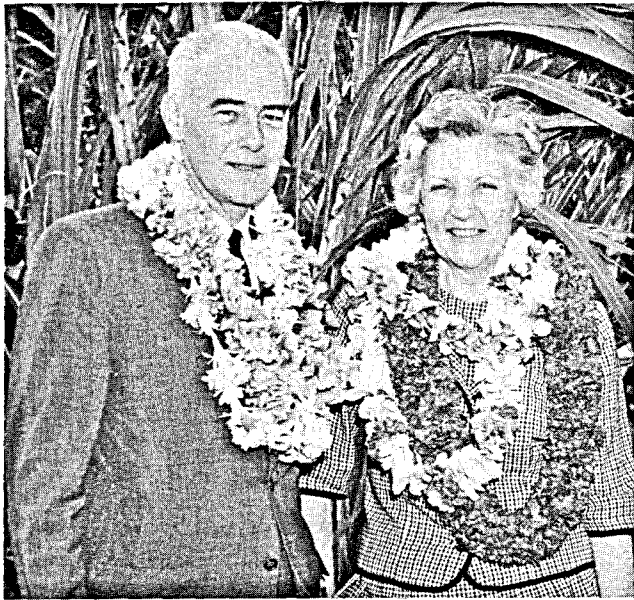

At the invitation of Bishop Creighton, Bishop Goto recently completed a speaking tour of the Diocese of Washington, giving the people an opportunity to learn something of the work in the Diocese of Tokyo. They decided upon this exchange when they attended the Anglican Congress last summer in Toronto.

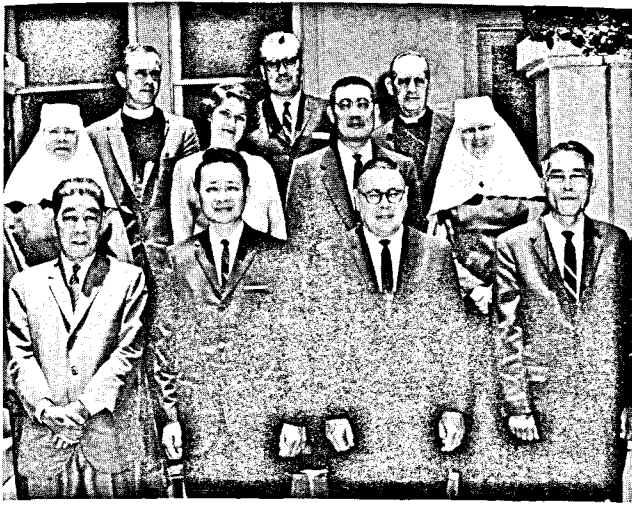

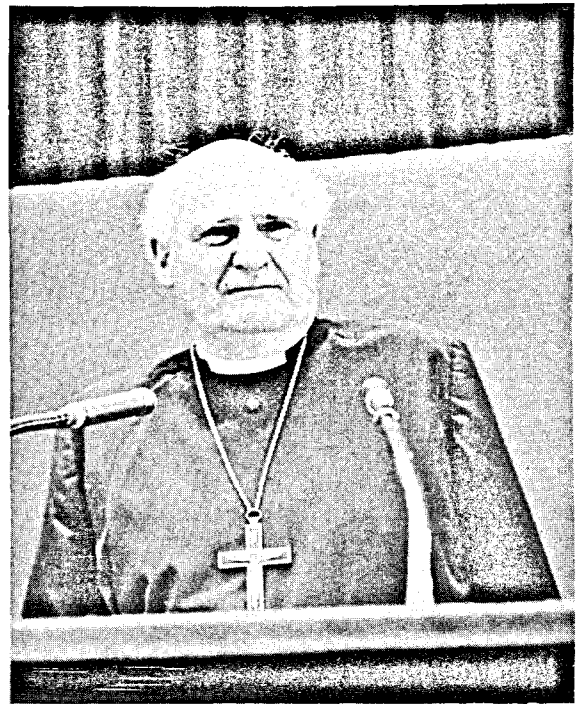

We shall miss the Loweths in this mission field, but wish them Godspeed in whatever they do in the future.

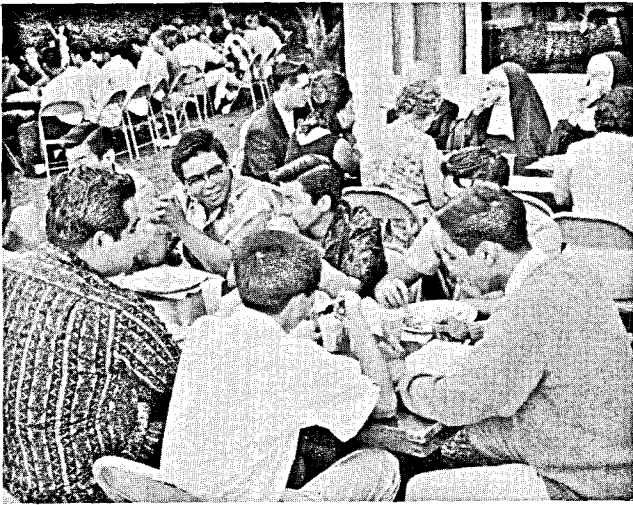
Convocation Date Has Been Changed

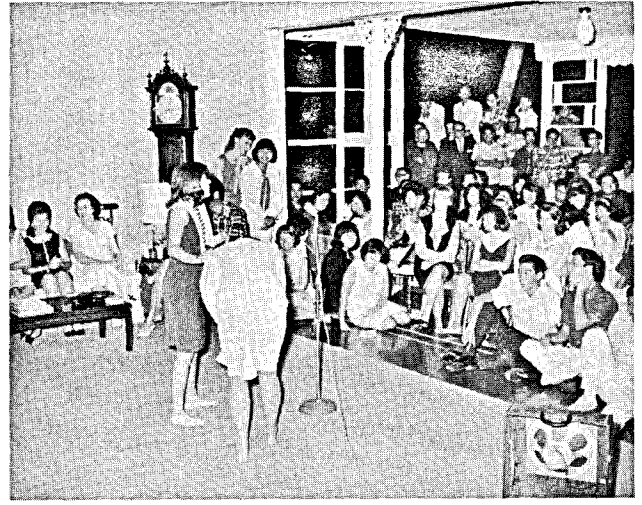
We feel that this is a tremendous opportunity for us and know that it will mean much to all of our people to have His Grace as our guest speaker at Convocation.

Becomes Archdeacon of Okinawa

The Rev. Canon William A. Hio, missionary in charge of our work in Okinawa, was made Archdeacon by the Bishop recently, in recognition of the excellent work he has done for our Church there.

Bishop Gilson Going to Okinawa

The Rt. Rev. Charles P. Gilson, who was elected Suffragan Bishop of Honolulu three years ago, but has been living in Taiwan, will be going to Okinawa to assist with our work there. He and Mrs. Gilson plan to take up residence following General Convention.

He will be in charge of All Souls Church, as well as to be responsible for all Episcopal duties in Okinawa.

He will be succeeded in Taiwan by Bishop James Wong, at the present time Bishop of Jesselton, North Borneo. The date of Bishop Wong's arrival in Taiwan has not been determined.

Many of our Church people in Taiwan regret having Bishop Gilson leave, after his years of devoted service for the advancement of our Church's work in Taiwan. He will be of tremendous help to Bishop Kennedy in our work on Okinawa. The people there are delighted to have a bishop in residence.

Bishop Wong's going to Taiwan is in keeping with the National Church's policy of having Nationals, both bishops and clergy, in charge of our Church's work overseas.

Armed Forces Director Visits Honolulu

The Rev. Robert J. Plumb, Director of the Armed Forces Division of National Council, Mrs. Plumb, and daughter spent four days in Honolulu visiting at the Halekulani Hotel. The Rev. J. W. Anderson, his wife and five children, will spend the summer visiting their families on the Mainland. He is Vicar of Grace Church, Molokai.

Iolani to Vie in Olympic Trial

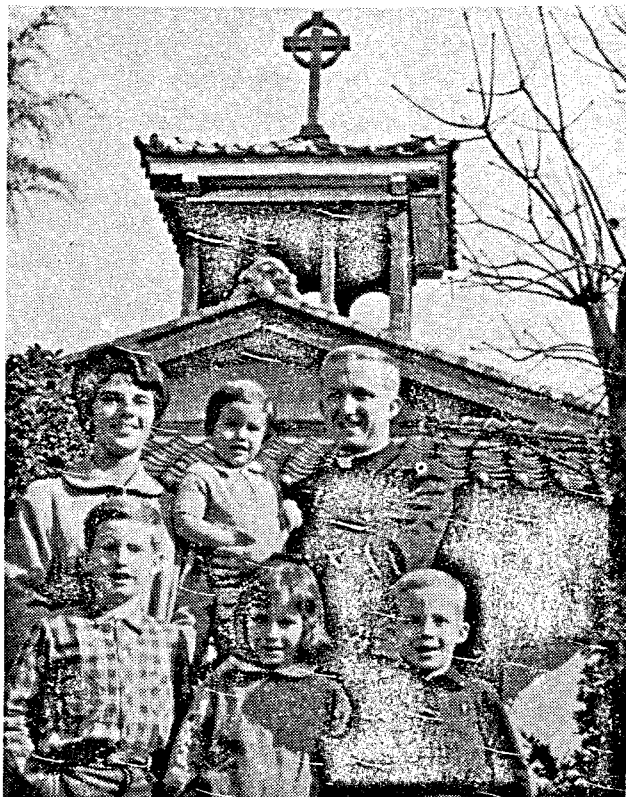
Iolani School's varsity heavyweight crew will compete in the United States Olympic Rowing Trials in New York August 26-29th. The Red Raider oarsmen will vie in the four with coxswain event.

Headed by Coach Jim Rizzuto, who was a co-captain of the Rutgers varsity crew in 1960, six oarsmen and a coxswain will make the trip to New York for the elimination. Two of the oarsmen will be alternates.

Refugee From Cuba Wins School Diploma

Fernando George arrived in Honolulu in October 1961 with his wife, Noelia and two daughters, sponsored by St. Mark's Church, and could speak only two American expressions that he knew, "thank you" and "good morning." On May 24th the 44-year-old Cuban received his high school diploma with 400 others at Farrington High School. He had to struggle diligently day and night to learn English, and says it is still difficult to pronounce. Now that he has his high school diploma he hopes to attend the University of Hawaii. He is employed by the Honolulu Iron Works.

He expressed deep gratitude to St. Mark's Church, and to the Rev. Joseph Pummill for all that has been done to give his family a new start in life. He says, "I will never forget the kindness shown us by this wonderful congregation."

Attend School in Japan

The Reverend Edmond L. Browning, of All Souls Church, Okinawa, his wife and family have been spending some time in Kobe, Japan, learning the Japanese language so that they can return to Okinawa and give their full time to the Japanese speaking people. Their desire to do this proves their devotion to the Okinawan people.

While in Japan the Brownings have enrolled two of their four children in St. Michael's International School, which he declares is doing "one of the most creative pieces of work in the Church today with almost impossible resources."

The principal of the school is Miss Leonora E. Lea, a woman of "almost 70" and an Anglican missionary. Her father was a bishop in the Japanese Church. She was born in Canada, raised in Japan, and taught in England and Japan. She returned to Japan to work and was interned during the war.

The school attracts the international community—children of mixed marriages, broken homes, and children who cannot afford to go to any of the high priced private schools in Japan.

Key Laymen Outline Program

Under the leadership of our Key Layman, Fred H. Overstreet, the keymen of Oahu were invited to the Bishop's residence on June 1st for a supper meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to revive the activity of the Church keymen, with the aim of expanding it. The Reverend Paul M. Wheeler has been elected the Chaplain-for the Keymen.

Parishes and Missions are to be visited by the Keymen and a schedule of Host Dates was submitted. The Keymen will invite at least two members of their church to accompany them on these visitations.

In addition a program of special events was set up:

September 27—5:00 P.M.: Bishop's Quiet Half-day for all Laymen on Oahu at St. Clement's Church. Buffet Supper will be served.

November 6, 7, 8: Camp Mōkuleia, Lay Conference with the theme "Our Ministry in Metropolis." The following clergy from National Council will lead the Conference: Robert N. Rodenmayer, George Lee (who will speak on Urban work) and Samuel Van Culin.

November 10: Holy Nativity Church, a Barbecue and Variety Show.

November 29: At the individual churches, Men and Boys Advent Corporate Communion.

February 20, 1965—St. Andrew's Cathedral, 8:00 A.M.: Washington's Birthday Holy Communion for Men and Boys, followed by breakfast.

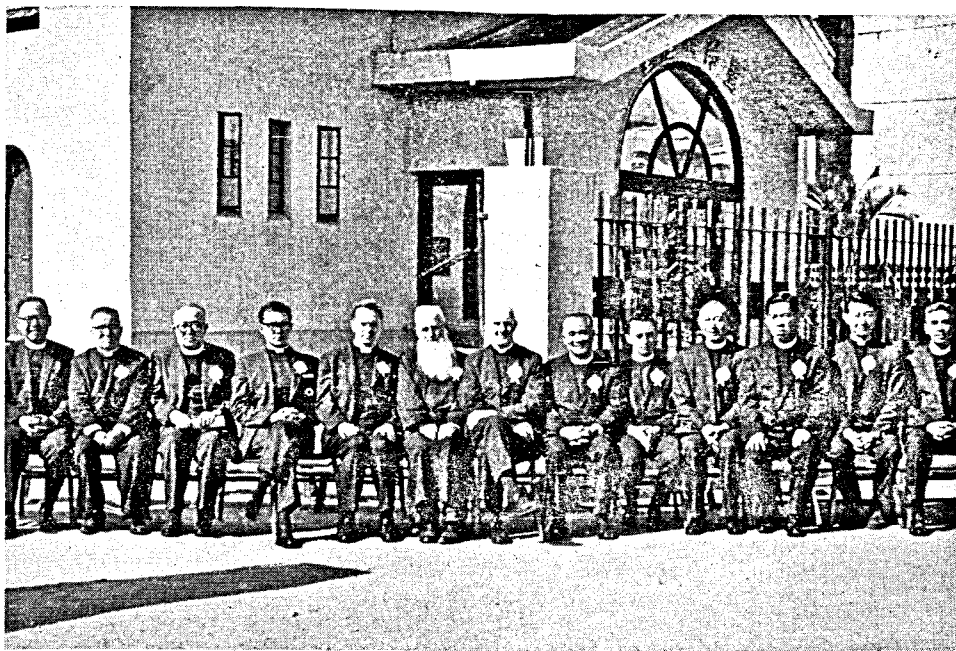
Notes on General Convention

The 61st General Convention of the Episcopal Church will be held in St. Louis, Missouri, October 11-23, 1965. The meeting of the Overseas Bishops will convene on Friday, October 8th. The Rt. Rev. George L. Cadigan, D.D., Bishop of Missouri will join with his clergy and people as hosts. The Convention Headquarters will be at the Sheraton-Jefferson Hotel. The Triennial Meeting of the Episcopal Churchwomen will be held in the Gold Room, the House of Bishops and the House of Deputies will meet in the Kiel Auditorium, the Bishops in Assembly Room #1 and Deputies in the Opera House.

The Opening Service will be on Sunday, October 11th, in the Auditorium.

The Rt. Rev. Jno B. Bentley, retiring Vice President of National Council and Director of the Overseas Department, and Mrs. Bentley will be honored on Saturday evening, October 10th, at a dinner given by the Overseas Bishops and their wives. The Rt. Rev. Irvine Swift, of Puerto Rico, is in charge of the arrangements for this dinner and our Bishop will be Toastmaster.

There will be five banquets during the meeting—

Ecumenical, Departments, "Feed the Hungry," Provincial and Seminaries.

The important business of Convention will be in the selection of a new Presiding Bishop to take over the work of Bishop Lichtenberger, who feels that because of his health he must relinquish his duties.

Christ Church Cathedral, which claims to be the oldest Episcopal parish west of the Mississippi, will be host to the Convention, in the year that St. Louis celebrates the bicentennial of its founding. Organized in 1819 by a group of laymen, it has been an important part of the St. Louis scene ever since. In 1859 the church moved to its present location and in 1888 became the cathedral. Two Presiding Bishops of the Church have been chosen from this cathedral—Bishop Lichtenberger and the Rt. Rev. Daniel S. Tuttle, who served from 1903 to 1923. The Convention last met in St. Louis during Bishop Tuttle's term in 1916.

The three great services will be the opening service, the corporate communion of the women of the Church, and the Presentation of the United Thank Offering, and the Missionary Mass Meeting. The Rev. Canon M. A. C. Warren, D.D., sometime General Secretary of the Church Missionary Society and presently on the staff of Westminster Abbey, will be the preacher at the last meeting.

Famous Wedding Recalled

Retired Bishop of Delaware, Arthur R. McKinstry, paid a recent visit to San Antonio and recalled an interesting occasion in his ministry. When he was rector of St. Mark's Church, he remembered his friend, Postmaster Dan Quill called him on November 17, 1934, with the frantic request that two friends of his wanted to be married and had only one day in which to tie the knot.

Bishop McKinstry said, "I can't marry those people on such short notice. Who are they, anyway—friends of yours?"

Indeed they were. The young lovers were Lyndon Baines Johnson and Miss Claudia Taylor. The groom was a fledging congressional aide to Rep. Richard M. Kleberg at the time. He called Mr. Quill and said he was coming to San Antonio to be married and to take care of everything.

When the couple arrived at 6 P.M.—Bishop McKinstry had weakened to perform the marriage—Mr. Johnson asked Mr. Quill if he had purchased the ring, which he of course had forgotten. Mr. Quill rushed to Sears, Roebuck & Co., plucked ten rings from a counter, explaining he would be back with nine of them. With ten witnesses present, the ceremony was performed at 8 P.M. in St. Mark's Church.

Haiti Ousts Episcopal Bishop at Gunpoint

The Rt. Rev. Charles A. Voegeli, Bishop for twenty-one years of Haiti, was recently forced to leave his adopted country at gunpoint. While local officials gave no reason for their action, unofficial comments indicate that Bishop Voegeli had lost the friendship of President Francois Duvalier, a controversial figure both in international politics and in the religious world.

Bishop Voegeli has asked the U.S. State Department not to protest to the Haitian government since it might jeopardize his return to Haiti. He hopes that this may be brought about. He is now in New York City.

Check-Up

- (1) Is my faith in God based on personal experience, feelings, vague hopes, or mere convention?
- (2) How much time do I give each day regularly to prayer?
- (3) Am I taking the time and trouble necessary to read

and understand my Bible so that I can apply it to life as I have to live it?

(4) Are there any inner dispositions of pride, irresponsibility, laziness, jealousy, malice, or resentment which I am consciously allowing in my life and doing nothing to overcome?

(5) Am I giving in fellowship, prayer, and service to my local church as much as I expect to get out of it?

(6) Am I criticizing my vicar/minister, and/or other Christians, instead of trying to help them?

(7) Is there any wrong relationship with anyone I should put right, even if I do not think I am in the wrong with regard to it?

(8) Am I too "bossy" and possessive, or touchy, in relationships with others?

(9) My money—do I spend too much on myself for cosmetics? tobacco? films? papers? meals? clothes?

(10) Have I asked God to show me what I should give to the work of His Church?

(11) Am I evading taking up any definite work for God by such false excuses as lack of ability, time, etc.?

(12) Have I tried to win anyone for Christ during the last six or twelve months and am I regularly trying to witness for Him?
