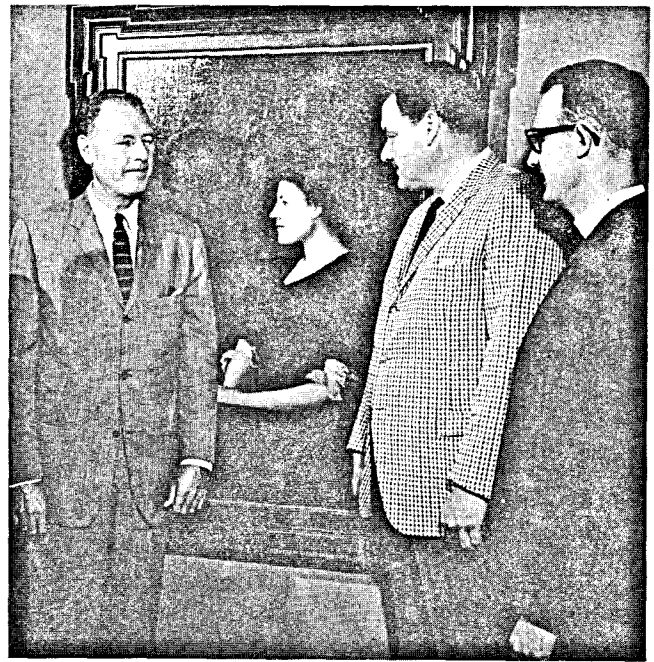

Our Diocesan Schools

October 25th-November 1st has been set aside by the Department of Christian Education and the Episcopal School Association, through its Episcopal School Week Committee, as an appropriate time for Diocesan papers to tell something of our Episcopal schools in each diocese.

It is a matter of deep concern to both clergy and schoolmon that many faithful communicants know so little about the schools of our Church. The Department of Christian Education and the Episcopal School Association believe that Episcopal schools are vital agents of the Church, both educational and evangelical. It is their belief that in the intersection of altar and classroom, there exists a unique relationship that should benefit the development of the whole child.

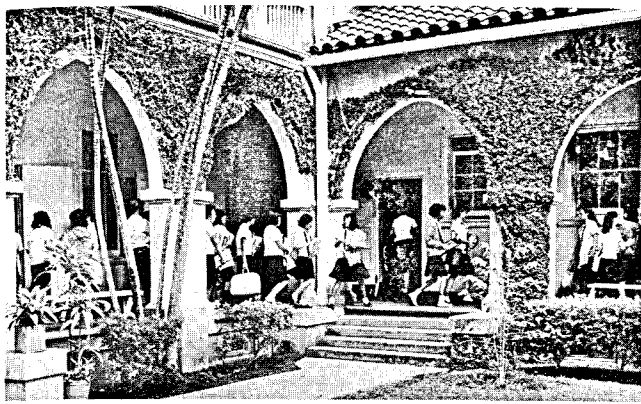
The Anglican tradition has always included schools below the college level; and the more than 70,000 pupils currently enrolled represent a major missionary action of the Episcopal Church. If education is the process by which we are prepared for life and death, then our Churchmen need only be reminded of our schools as one means of meeting our common task. The schools of the Church pursue our corporate ambition of leading and teaching boys and girls so that they may be at home in God's world, and may accept the redeeming work of our Lord Jesus Christ, and put themselves at the service of that Spirit, Who shall lead us in all Truth.

In our Hawaiian Islands we have 14 schools and on Guam one with a total of 191 teachers and 2,848 students. Our largest school is Iolani School for boys, which observed its 100 year in 1963. It has 73 teachers and an enrollment of 1160 boys. St. Andrew's Priory School for girls will observe the 100th year of the coming of Anglican Sisters to establish a school for girls in 1965. Enrollment is 565. In 1902 the first American Bishop, the Right Reverend Henry Bond Restarick assumed the head of the school and in 1918 the Sisters of the Transfiguration took over its jurisdiction and over the years have maintained a high standard of education. The Hawaii Preparatory School, a boarding school for boys from grades seven through high school, was established in 1948, at Kamuela, on the Island of Hawaii.

Our larger Parochial schools are Epiphany, Holy Nativity, St. Mark's and St. John the Divine, of Guam. Nursery and kindergarten schools are maintained by St. Clement's, Holy Trinity, St. Elizabeth's, St. Andrew's Cathedral, St. Christopher's, St. Luke's, and Emmanuel, on the Island of Oahu; St. Augustine's, Kohala on Hawaii; All Saints, Kapaa, Kauai, and Grace Church on Molokai.

On the Island of Maui we opened Seabury Hall, at Makawao on September 21st as a boarding school for girls from grades seven through ten. Grades eleven and twelve will be added in 1965 and 1966 respectively.

The graduates of our high schools enter colleges and universities throughout the United States and do well in their academic studies.

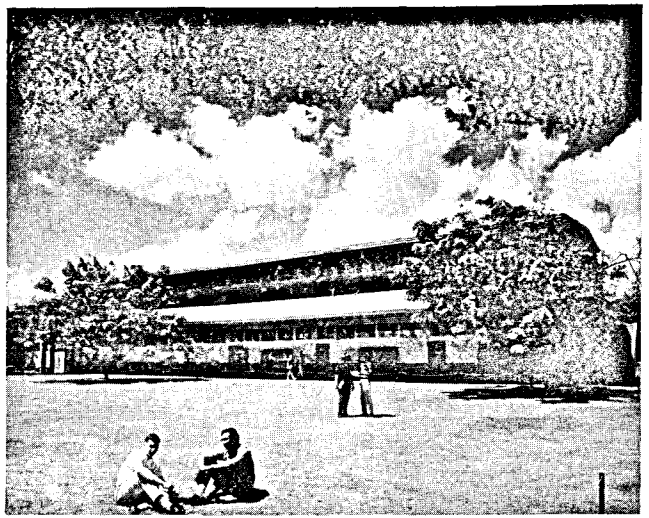
This summer the University of Hawaii, Department of Speech, Summer Speech Institute for High School Teachers and Students ended July 31st. Fifty-one students and twenty-one teachers representing high schools on all the islands, in Washington, in California and Japan, participated.

Sylvia Mei-ling Yee, for St. Andrew's Priory, entered and received the rating of Excellent. The instruction was at a freshman-sophomore college course level training.

A Statement From The Presiding Bishop On Church Schools

The Christian tradition embraces schools dedicated to keeping the sovereignty of God as the fundamental fact of existence at the heart of education. Such Episcopal Schools are a missionary arm of the Church. They make a genuine contribution to the teaching ministry and under the guidance of the Source of all truth assist an increasing number of the Church's children to grow in mind and in grace into Christian citizenship.

In a troubled age the effective voice of the Church is commensurate with the commitment and education of its members. While there is no simple answer nor single system capable of resolving all problems in education of the Christian young, the Church does bear the responsibility for providing an arena for raising any academic question and the context for interpreting the significance of answers.



Boys at Iolani School enjoy fellowship on the campus.

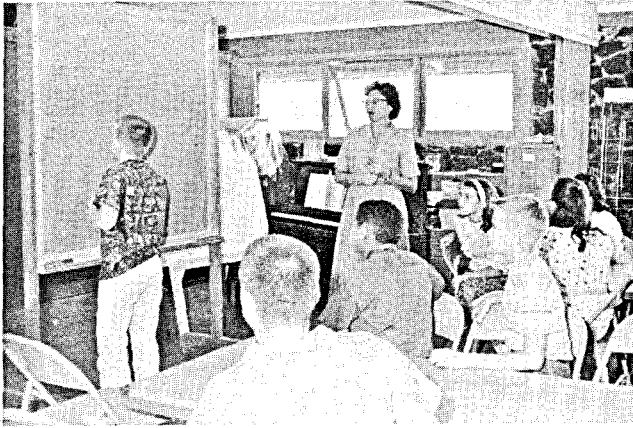
The schools of the Church represent a dedicated effort to meet this need.

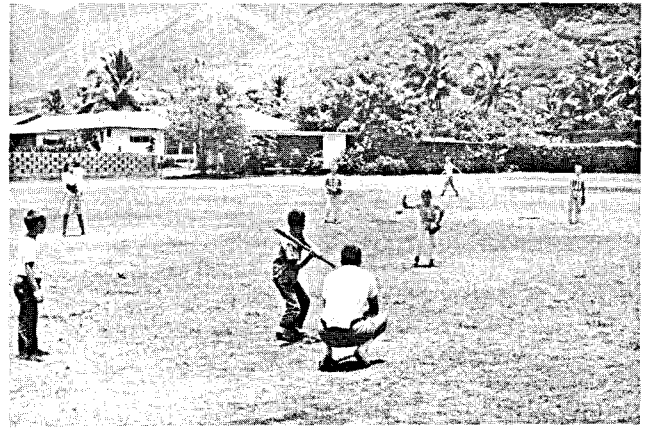

\$325,000 Priory Expansion Program

Our Church Diocesan school for girls, St. Andrew's Priory, will soon complete 100 years of successful operation. Although the Priory is unsurpassed academically, accreditation is threatened unless funds are provided to:

- a. replace and renovate certain worn out buildings and
- b. construct additional educational facilities.

Next month, when \$325,000 is pledged, several new classrooms, a Student Service Center, and a complete Physical Education plant including a modern gymnasium will be constructed.

Since this is our school, each church will want to participate. Besides the effort among our own churches, a soliciting organization is planned for potential large gifts, for parents, for teachers, and for the alumnae.

The Bishop is active Honorary Chairman, Mr. Larry Ronson is the overall General Chairman. Serving on the Executive Committee are the Messrs Zadoc Brown, William O. Bush, K. L. Ching, Richard Ching, Stephen A. Derby, Bayard Dillingham, Carter Galt, Herman Hosoi, Thomas K. Kamioka, Malcolm MacNaughton, John M. McClucas, Larry Ronson, Arthur G. Smith, James Tabor, Herman V. von Holt, and Kelvin Wong. The Reverend E. Lani Hanchett and Mrs. Mark A. Robinson are also on the committee.

Our Clerical Deputy is the Reverend Claude F. Du Teil, of St. Christopher's Church, Kailua. The Reverend E. Lani Hanchett, St. Peter's Church, is our Clerical Alternate but will not attend. Lay Delegate is Mr. Hugh Shearer, our Vice-Chancellor and a member of St. Andrew's Church. Mr. K. L. Ching, of St. Elizabeth's Church, Honolulu, is Alternate Lay Deputy.

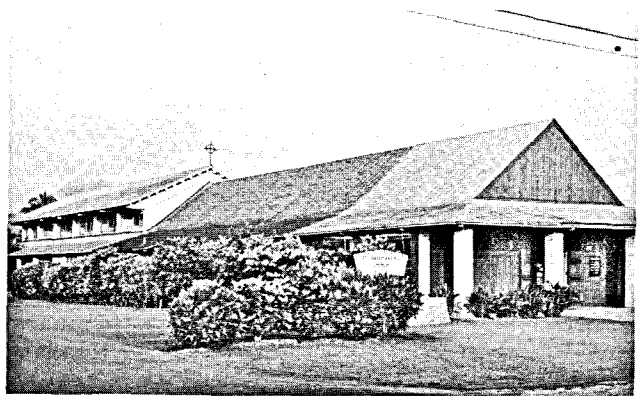

Bishop Lewis Of Olympia Dies

SEATTLE—The Right Reverend William F. Lewis, Bishop of Olympia, died Sept. 6 of leukemia. The 62-year-old bishop had been ill for the past year.

Bishop Lewis became diocesan Jan. 1, 1960. He served parishes in New Jersey, Montana and Vermont before being elected bishop in 1942.

Bishop Lewis will be remembered by many in Hawaii with affection, since he was our Convocation guest in 1957 when he was then the Bishop of Nevada. Our deep sympathy goes to his family.
