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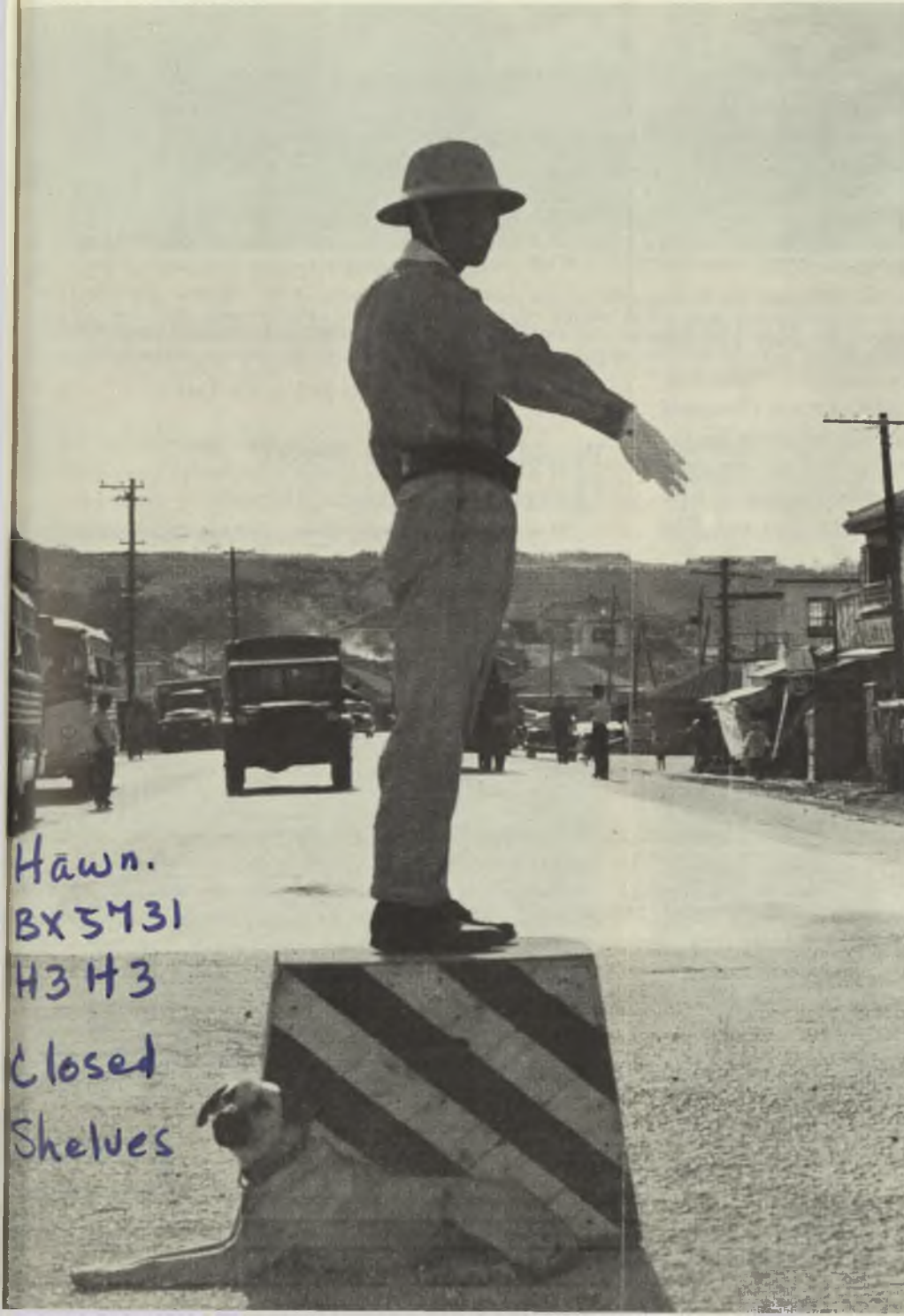

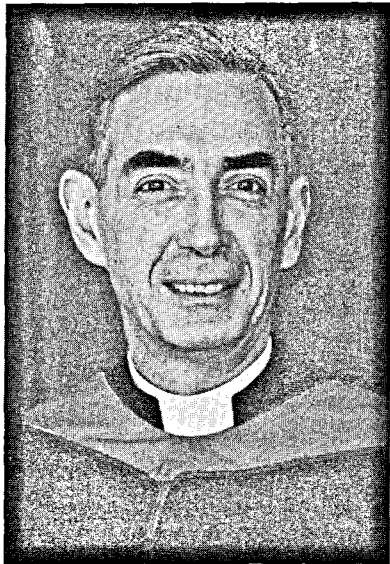
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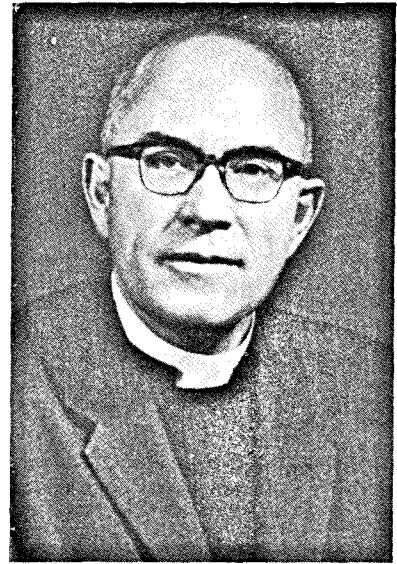

School Of Theology To Be Held

The Episcopal Church is sponsoring a "School of Theology" to be held at Iolani School on the afternoons of June 27-July 1. The lectures will be given by the Reverend Dr. Massey H. Shepherd, Jr. and the Reverend Dr. Frederick Schilling. We are also planning to have two evenings just for the laity on June 29th and 30th at Tenney Hall, St. Andrew's Cathedral.

Dr. Shepherd is Professor of Liturgics and History at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. Dr. Schilling is the Canon Theologian of the Diocese of Olympia and sometime lecturer at various seminaries throughout the country.

The titles of the lectures will be as follows:

Dr. Shepherd—Theology and Liturgy

2. Liturgy in the New Testament
3. Liturgy and Mission
4. Liturgy and Unity
5. Current Trends in Liturgy

Dr. Schilling—The Relevance of the Bible Today

1. The Problems of Communication and Relevance
2. The Bible as the Word of God
3. The Gospel according to St. Mark
4. The Gospel according to St. Mark
5. The Prologue to the 4th Gospel

All clergy and interested laity from all denominations

are invited to join in this School of Theology. A brochure will be coming out in the near future listing more details on the School and on the Lectures.

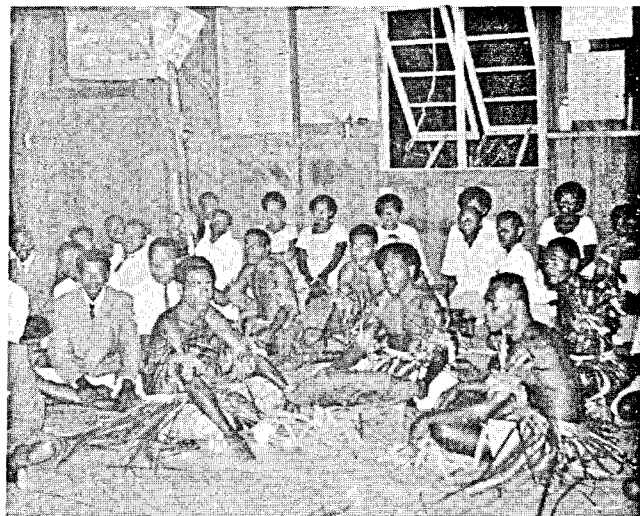

Two students, Deborah Jones and Belinda Wong, from St. Andrew's Priory, Honolulu, and Robert Oda

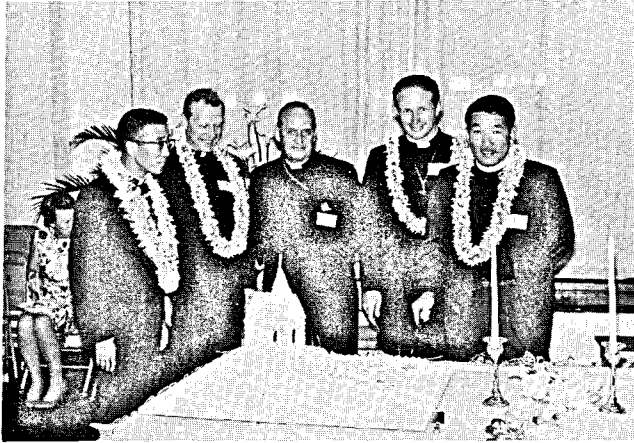

The Venerable Charles Crane, of Kauai, and Diocesan Chairman for MRI, came to Honolulu for the gathering. It was a most profitable meeting for everyone.

MRI Companionship With Okinawa

The purpose is to explore the meaning of the MRI Document in relation to our own situations in relation to the Church in Hawaii; and to begin to examine our own needs and what we have to offer others.

Our MRI Diocesan Chairman, the Venerable Charles T. Crane, Archdeacon of Kauai, is especially anxious that we evaluate what the Okinawa Seikokai has to offer to others, especially to the Diocese of Honolulu.

We must begin at home by making each member of the Okinawa Seikokai aware of the meaning of MRI through sermons, sessions with each mission's Bishop's Committee. (It is recommended that this be led by a priest other than the mission's own priest; a visitation from Bishop Goto, of Japan, leading discussion groups and lectures for both laity and clergy, and a Youth Conference next spring at All Soul's Church, Naha, with the theme of MRI.)

Each mission should write the name of its companion parish or mission so that the members might exchange letters. We should establish a prayer list with each parish, clergyman, church worker, and institution in the Diocese of Honolulu, and exchange programs of students, clergy and laity.

It is our hope to send students to Honolulu who would contribute to the life of the Church here through the talents of the student, but would also give the Church in Honolulu an opportunity to exercise their need to give. On the other hand, we would like to have a Japanese-speaking child from Honolulu attend school in Okinawa. We would have the opportunity to give and share through this child with the Diocese of Honolulu the culture of the Ryukyus.

It is hoped we can work out an exchange of clergy and/or laity, mainly for the purpose of making a testimony to the common faith which we share. We feel that among the Okinawa Christians there are those with outstanding faiths, that if shared with others would probably be the most important thing we can offer.

We would like to sponsor a work camp in the Ryukyus that would provide the opportunity for six to ten young Christians from Honolulu to join with the same number of young Okinawan Christians in a special project.

A meeting was to be held in Okinawa on May 15th with two representatives from each Bishop's Committee plus a woman from each congregation. The leadership of this meeting held at All Souls' Church, was under the direction of Mr. S. Oyama and Mrs. M. Kenjo. The clergy leaders were the Reverend Messrs: Furman C. Stough and Paul Nakamura. The findings of the meeting will be presented to the MRI Committee for further evaluations and study.

A REALLY first-class summer camping program is promised this year for youngsters who attend the Episcopal Church camp at Mokuleia, a program which will be conducted during the summer months for children in grades 3 to 9 under the direction of the Reverend Guy Piltz, chairman of the Diocesan Division of Camps and

Conferences. This will be the only Church camp held in the Islands this year.

SOME OF the special attractions offered at Mokuleia this year include:

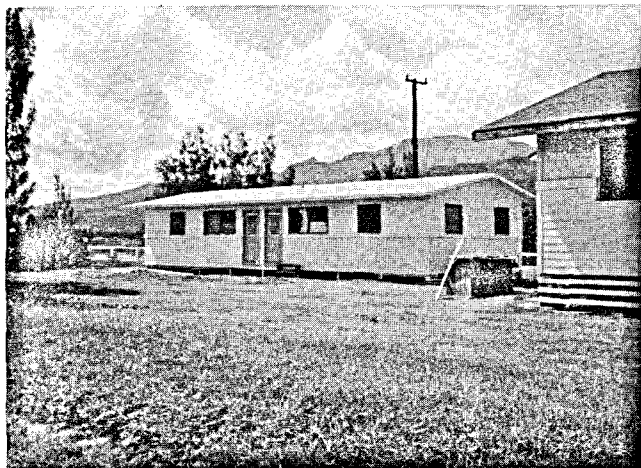
1. A newly-remodelled dormitory and the addition of several small group cottages. These changes and additions will greatly increase the comfort and convenience of the camp.

2. A revised camping program which makes provision for even the youngest camper to enjoy an overnight at Keaiwa Heiau State Park, Aiea. Such conveniences as running water, sanitation facilities, prepared camp sites and a well-marked and well-maintained trail for safe and easy hiking are provided. Older campers will have the opportunity to 'rough it' in the hills behind Mokuleia on single and double overnight pack trips. Camping in all instances will be tailored to suit campers of all ages and capabilities.

3. Crafts and Christian education will be closely related in the camp program. Campers will be able to work on individual and group craft projects, using materials taken from nature, and which relate to those subjects being covered by the chaplains in their teaching.

4. The camper-counselor ratio will be 10-to-1, providing an experience of small-group living. The groups will be arranged according to age, interests and previous experience of camp life.

ALL COUNSELORS will be required to have thorough training before the beginning of the camp sessions, including leadership training, physical training and instruction in trail and camping skills, water safety and first aid, as well as craft work and Christian education.

Notes From The Synod Of The Eighth Province

May 3rd the Synod of the 8th Province of the Pacific met in Portland, Oregon, and approved a major reorganization of itself and its function alignments. By nearly a unanimous vote, delegates adopted a plan of reconstructing that, in its final form represented a compromise of differing viewpoints of the Synod's House of Bishops and the special committee that had been reviewing the problem for the past year under the chairmanship of the Archdeacon of Olympia, The Venerable Rudolph Devik.

Annual sessions of the Synod are abolished. A newly constituted Provincial House of Deputies and the present House of Bishops will meet canonically every three years just prior to and at the place of the Episcopal Church's triennial General Convention.

In working out the ultimate form of reorganization, the joint conference committee recommended five basic

objectives as the "minimal beginning goals" for the province:

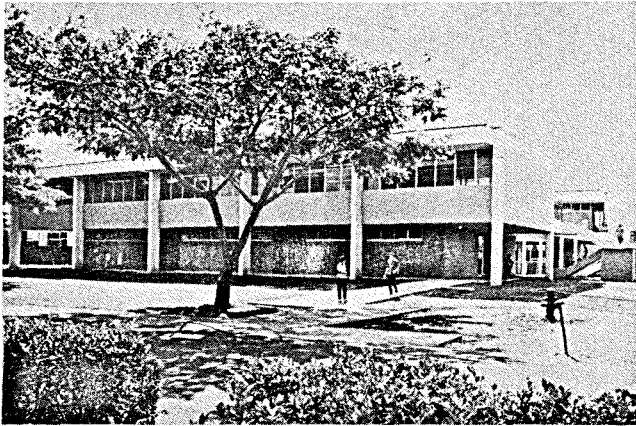
1. To provide communications among the jurisdictions of the Province of the Pacific regarding common concerns and problems;
2. To establish means for coordinating the efforts of the constituent jurisdictions of the province;
3. To provide channels for creative interaction among the dioceses of this province in meeting common concerns;
4. To explore ways of carrying on productive work at the regional level in furthering the ecumenical dialogue in the West and the areas of interchurch cooperation within the province, and
5. To provide a framework for meeting the minimal canonical business and action called for by the National Church's canons.

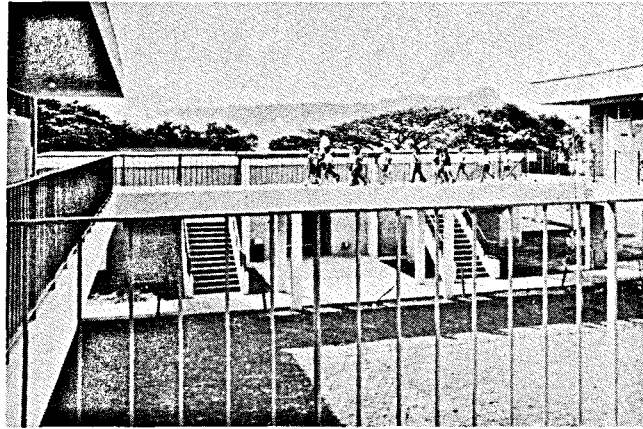
The whole Diocese is grateful for the twelve years of his priesthood in our midst. We pray that God will watch over him and provide for his every need.
