

During a week in late August, all the islands had a chance to meet and work with Susy Miller, a church consultant who was here to lead us in two different workshops. One, presented on all the islands, was "Welcoming Guests and Incorporating Members." The second, held at St. Andrew's Cathedral on Saturday, August 26, was "From Dream to Reality: A Process for Implementing Change." In addition, Ms. Miller met on Friday evening with people who previously had attended a "Start Up, Start Over" conference with her.

In the first workshop, Ms. Miller departed from the usual instructions on "how-to" welcome and incorporate people into our churches. Instead, she invited the participants to reflect on what has helped them to feel welcome when they have ventured into an unfamiliar group. She also touched on related topics: how our church appears to someone who has never seen it before, and if there is anything that would keep a stranger from feeling welcome; whether our churches are visible to the public; and our attitudes toward welcoming the stranger in our midst.

In the second workshop, on change, Ms. Miller made the participants "work hard," as everyone was saying. Again pushing us to open our minds and think in new ways, she asked each of us to focus on a change that we wanted to make in our congregation or in our life over the next 60 days. She then led us through some steps in how we might implement that change. The first step, however, was the hardest for many: to determine what problem we were trying to solve, and whether our proposed change truly addressed the problem. In many cases, the "problem" turned out to be a personal need that one was seeking to address.

Subsequent steps involved thinking about such issues as necessary training, materials needed, who might be involved, and whether one could "try out" the change for a specified period of time to see whether it would work. Some of the "changes" mentioned that individual participants were working on were wearing nametags on Sunday, moving the altar, and starting a small-groups program in a church.

If you were not able to attend the workshops, talk to someone in your church or region who did. They were challenging, informative, and well worth the effort.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On Friday, October 27, we will begin the 32nd Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Hawai'i with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist and the Ingathering of the United Thank Offering. The Rt. Rev. Rustin R. Kimsey, Retired Bishop of Oregon, will preach and will be the chaplain for our convention.

The theme for our annual meeting will be "Discerning our Ministries from a Theology of Abundance." The Vocations Subcommittee of the Commission on Ministry recommended that 2001 be a "Year of Discernment," a time for discerning our ministries as lay and ordained members of our diocese. By our baptisms, we are each called by Christ to ministry. Our Committee on Stewardship Education has been emphasizing a theology of abundance in their stewardship training programs. We have been blessed by God's abundant love for us and by the gifts that we have been given. Good stewardship accepts with gratitude the overwhelming abundance that we have been given. We are called to use these abundant gifts for and in the ministries to which we have been called by Christ.

Schedule Change in Bishop's Visitations

In late August, Bishop Chang sent a letter to all congregations; excerpts follow.

Since 1997, I have followed a 12month visitation schedule in order to visit the forty congregations and other diocesan institutions annually. This schedule has not provided any flexibility for rescheduling visits, since every Sunday was scheduled with a visitation. I have been invited to be a consecrator of other bishops but have declined due to my visitation schedule. For example, in 2000, a General Convention year, I will have had only one free Sunday. That was the result of a visitation being cancelled. But I had to do two visitations on one Sunday to make my annual visit to every congregation.

Beginning in January 2001, I will initiate a 14-month visitation schedule to the congregations of our Diocese. With this 14-month schedule, I will have visited all congregations of the Diocese between January 2001 and February 2002. This will provide me with greater flexibility for changes as the needs arise.

Each month there will be three scheduled Sunday visitations. The "free or unscheduled" Sunday will be available for not only rescheduling visits, but for meetings with congregations and leaders when ministry issues

need to be discussed, such as parish vacancies, and for informal "drop-in" visits with congregations. It will also provide me with "Sabbath time" on a regular basis each quarter.

With this 14-month schedule we will need to be much more intentional during my visits with a congregation. Better preparation for the visit will be essential. I will continue to meet with the Vestry or Bishop's Committee but would like to meet different ministry groups of the congregation, such as the Bible Study group or Daughters of the King. I would especially like to meet with youth, young adults, and newcomers to the congregation. I will also expect to spend time with the clergy and their family at some point during the visitation.

Who Are Your Heroes?

₩ Hawai'i Episcopal Men's "Retreat"

The weekend of September 8-10 was very special for 35 Episcopal brothers from several churches in Hawai'i. We were secluded from the hustle-bustle of daily life, and "retreated" for a special journey with God and our brothers in Christ. We traveled to Camp Mokule'ia on the beautiful North Shore of O'ahu.

The theme for this first men's retreat in 40 years (according to Bishop Chang) for the Diocese of Hawai'i was "Heroes." Special guest speaker, lecturer, and grand storyteller was the Right Reverend Joe Bruno of Los Angeles. Bishop Bruno, an imposing figure of a man at six-feet, seven-inches tall and 300 pounds, is a former lineman for the NFL Denver Broncos and a former "cop." Bishop Bruno is a "real guy" just like the rest of us, and his heart is full of the Lord and much aloha.

After a fantastic meal of mahi mahi served up by Camp Mokule'ia's great kitchen staff, we gathered in the lodge meeting room for fellowship and music lead by brothers Dave Del Rosario and Bill Daugherty of Calvary Episcopal Church in Kaneohe. Our "icebreaker" to get to know each other was very interesting. Constantio "Tante" DelaCruz from St Paul's Episcopal, asked each person to take some toilet paper from a roll-as much as we wanted. Tante gave us no guidance. Some people took lots of paper; some took very little. When the drill was complete, we each had to tell the others a sentence about ourselves for each sheet of toilet paper we took. There were some long...and some very short introductions. We then played "guess the Bible book/character" based on signs on our backs. No clues were given as each brother asked his fellow brother questions to determine the

Bishop Bruno then gave a presentation on who he is and was—as a Christian and as a man. He leads over 100,000 Episcopalians in Southern California and was installed as Bishop Coadjutor in January 2000. He used a Frisbee to symbolize the balance we need in our lives, and we discussed our roles in life: Christian, father, husband, brother, worker, provider, etc. He asked us to think about the heroes in our lives for discussion groups on Saturday.

Saturday was another gloriously beautiful Hawaiian day as the men began with another great breakfast and music fellowship. We then had a lengthy talk from Bishop Bruno on heroes, and he discussed several heroes in his life. We also discussed what constitutes a hero. Breaking into five small groups, we each discussed our personal heroes, unsung heroes, and asked if Jesus is considered a hero today in the U.S. These discussions were prayerful, heartfelt, and very insightful. After lunch – yes, it seemed we ate a lot (because we did) - free time was had by all. Some completed a "ropes course" - a team obstacle course complete with ropes and walls - while some more sane brothers golfed at nearby Kalakaua golf course. Others took time for mediation and maybe even a nap.

Saturday evening, we again ate a fantastic dinner of roast beef and all the fixings, then gathered for our last talk by Bishop Bruno. He told lots of stories, which were heartfelt, sad, and even funny — always with the theme of the human spirit, which he calls "hS" and the relationship to the Holy Spirit.

Sunday morning was a quiet, reflective time with Eucharist celebrated by Reverend Sarge Edwards and Bishop Bruno. We ended the service with individual prayer for anyone who asked for it and dedicated ourselves to coming back in September 2001 for the next retreat.

We all took individual benefits from the retreat and I'll share my results. I was reinforced that God loves all of us unconditionally, which is still a neat thing to me. Jesus was a regular guy when on the earth, faced with all the daily stresses and frustrations/joys of daily life that we all face now. I learned to try to treat everyone like I would treat Jesus if I met him, especially when meeting new folks. I also was reinforced that my life is controlled by God, not by me as a human, as God has a plan for us. I am so very thankful to be loved by God and I love him.

Our special thanks to Bishop Jon Bruno for taking the time from his busy schedule to meet and fellowship with the Episcopal men of Hawai'i. Also thanks to all the organizers: Bruce Fink, Tante DelaCruz, Clint Marantz, Dan Ching, David Seth, and Phil Geissal. Phil and the Camp Mokule'ia staff were great hosts.

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"New Beginnings, New Beginnings, Working Together, We'll Make A Fresh Start..."

So begins the theme song for our upcoming New Beginnings Weekend, which will be held on December 8–1 0 at Camp Mokule'ia. What is New Beginnings (N.B)? N.B. is a unique weekend especially designed to respond to the issues, concerns, and needs of teenagers in grades 7–9 (plus mature 6th graders). It was created in the Diocese of Central Florida by adults and young people to help participants grow in their love of themselves, of others, and of our Lord Jesus.

Here in Hawai'i, this will be our third N.B. Weekend. As the spiritual director for this program, I have to tell you as soon as one weekend begins to come to a close the teens are already asking when the next one will be held. Having been involved in youth ministry as a priest for over 21 years, I have never seen anything quite like this program. It is the catalyst for personal change and growth, for the birth of new church youth groups, and for the healing of broken relationships.

The weekend is led by high school youth and adult team members. Each

congregation who sends youth must send an adult sponsor to experience the weekend along with them. This helps with the transition after the weekend is over from diocesan experience back into the local church. Including youth and adult team, along with adult sponsors and youth participants, we will have space for a maximum of 140 people, The last weekend had a waiting list, so I urge everyone to watch for the registration forms and to register early (neighbor-island air coupons will be made available upon receipt of registration). The registration deadline is set for November 17, and for the first time we will be holding 40 slots open for first-time participants up to November 7. After the 7th any unfilled spaces will be released to repeat attendees. If you have come before, you know how important it is to get on the registration list as soon as possible.

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The Durable Powers of Attorney

Last week I ran across an article on "Durable Powers of Attorney" and would like to share some of the suggestions with you. The durable power of attorney gives someone else the legal authority to handle your affairs in case you become incapacitated. An attorney has to write this document and there will be a charge. However, if you think about it, this is the best way to take care of bills and other legal matters that may affect you if you are unable to do them yourself. The choice of the person you would name as agent is up to you but should naturally be someone you trust. It is a good idea if you take the document to your financial institution to see if they accept the wording. Another suggestion is to review the document every few years to see if you still want the same person you selected before.

New "Autobahn" Dedicated at St. George's






