St. Barnabas' Sets Sail

"...for [Barnabas] was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith. And a great many people were brought to the Lord. Then ... when he had found [Paul], he brought him to Antioch. So it was that for an entire year, they met with the church and taught a great many people, and it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called Christians" (Acts 11:24, 26).

We the people, of the Episcopal Church of St. Barnabas, have looked anew at our patron saint's legacy to us, a legacy of mission and ministry. A while back, our new Vicar, Father Bob Fitzpatrick, challenged us, as a congregation, to renew our Baptismal vows daily. He asserted that we are commissioned to minister to those outside the walls of the church. The past few months, our congregation has been filled with the Holy Spirit, and like Barnabas (an island boy), we have set sail for the Lord. Our renewed vision was validated when the Bishop's Committee attended the annual Leaders Conference on February 24, where Bishop Chang called us as a Diocese to renew our Baptismal vows.


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He called us to be mission, not maintenance oriented, to be senders as well as receivers, and to share our resources with one another as a Diocese. He reaffirmed our Christian theology of an abundant God.

We are sailing a small fleet of canoes at St. Barnabas, while preparing for the building of a big one (wa'a nui), that will be a base from which we will journey with our Lord Jesus Christ for the rest of our lives. The present fleet is at Makakilo Recreation Center, where the outriggers are being rebalanced. In ancient times, a canoebuilding expert (Kahuna Kalai Wa'a) was consulted before venturing to the forest for selection of the best tree for a canoe. The quest could not begin without appropriate prayers. Our Kahuna Kalai Wa'a, is the Lord, and He has stirred us to a special vision. The vision is this: five years from now, there will be a congregation of 200 members strong, and ground will have been broken for a church complex. We need help in fulfilling the vision! In the months ahead, we may be asking for hymnals, for prayer books, for people, or for money, and we will be visiting with all of you, to discuss everything in greater detail. The next five years, we will fervently pray and prepare. We ask all of you to pray with us as we embark on this Christian adventure, throughout the ahupua'a of Hono'uli'uli.

Sunday worship is in recess at Makakilo Recreation Center. The Alpha program, our newest wa'a in the fleet, began with the blessed occasion of the Baptism of Baby Kaeci Yadao, on February 25 and will continue through Pentecost. We are so excited. Exhilaration is the word! Our entire membership has enrolled in Alpha, even a few newcomers! We are enthused and encouraged as we learn more about who we are and where we are going as Christians.

We have already ventured out into our ahupua'a in new ways. By the time



Church Leaders Conference

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
A Little Leaven

Bishop's Letter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The March issue of *The Hawaiian Church Chronicle* described the reordering of the Diocesan Council and the budget process. In my previous two letters I shared briefly my vision of a diocese that is "mission-oriented" and of a diocese where ministry is shared by all the baptized. The third and final part of my vision is a diocese that encourages, enables, and nurtures all members to live the baptismal covenant in the church and in the world.

The Baptismal Covenant begins with our affirmation of faith. We are asked, "Do you believe...?" Our response is "I believe..." It is from this foundation that we live the promises of the covenant. It is this faith in God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, that we live as disciples of Jesus Christ who calls us to follow. We cannot focus only on "living the covenant," and neglect the "faith of the covenant." Living our baptismal covenant should be as much a part of our life as faithful disciples as breathing.

In baptism we are made one with Christ who calls us and with each other. As the Church in Hawai'i we need to encourage, enable, and nurture each other as we strive to be faithful to the promises of our baptism. Christian The Right Rev. Richard S. O. Chang



What's So Good About Good Friday?



St. John's, Kahalu'u, Seeks Choirmaster



ground might be Episcopal, Mainline Protestant, or Roman Catholic.

At present there are 30-40 youth involved, perhaps half from unchurched backgrounds. Most are junior youth, but we plan to add senior youth in the fall. The youth minister needs to be a person who lives out their faith on a daily basis, but is willing to set reasonable boundaries regarding youth behavior, personal times, etc. These churches are spread out geographically, the youth minister must have a driver's license.
