

34th annual convention scheduled Oct. 25-26

Come and join us at the 34th annual Meeting of the Convention on Friday, Oct. 25 at St. Andrew's Cathedral and Saturday, Oct. 26 at the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel.

Registration for the convention begins at noon on Friday at St. Andrew's. The annual meeting will convene at 2:30 p.m., following a 1 p.m. Eucharist. Bishop Richard S.O. Chang will address the convention, speaking on "The Mission of the Church." The convention will recess at 5:30 p.m., followed by a reception at the cathedral.

On Saturday, registration begins at 7:30 a.m. at the Sheraton Waikiki. The convention reconvenes at 8 a.m. in the Maui Ballroom of the hotel. Convention exhibits open that morning.

The convention banquet will be held at noon in the Kauai Ballroom, and the convention will reconvene at 2 p.m., with a scheduled adjournment at 4 p.m.

Observers and guests are welcome at the convention, but registration is required. You may register on the day of the convention if you are an observer or guest.

Remember to adhere to all deadlines by looking at the information mailed out to all delegates and clergy.

Discerning ministry and vocation

Dear Friends in Christ,

There were many unexpected events during our sabbatical. We had planned informal visits with Dee's English cousins from Devonshire. But upon our arrival in London we were invited to the ordination of the Rev. James Morrish to the priesthood at Wells Cathedral in England (see photo, page E). James is son of Dee's cousin, one of fourteen ordained to the priesthood on that Saturday afternoon.

The entire day was filled with unexpected and memorable experiences. Wells Cathedral was one of the places visited by Queen Emma on her tour of England to raise funds to build our own Cathedral Church of St. Andrew. We met several generations of the Morrish family who came for the ordination service. Unfortunately our train back to London prevented us from attending the party celebrating James' ordination.

Given the number of

ordinands, each was allowed to invite two priests to join the bishop for the laying on of hands. I found it very interesting that a number of the ordinands invited the priest who had invited them to consider ordination as their vocation or who had supported them during their time of personal discernment.

As we rode the train back to London, I reflected upon my own vocation and those persons who were part of my faith journey. Kenneth Bray, Margaret Monterio, Shunji Nishi, Arthur Ward, David Coon, James Cox and Harry Kennedy were all part of my pilgrimage beginning with my conversion from Buddhism in 1951. Each was an important presence in my life as I came to know Christ. Each planted seeds of vocation.

Through personal witness each encouraged and supported my vocation quest.


In our baptism we are each asked to discern our vocation and ministry in service of Christ and God's world. Individually and corporately we are called to identify persons for ordained ministry. Be bold to ask and encourage vocations.

Is there someone in your congregation whose gifts and skills for ministry and faith are appropriate for the ordained ministry? Will those gifts and skills advance the mission and ministry of the Good News of Jesus Christ? Every baptized person participates in this ministry of invitation and discernment. It does not lie solely with the ordained. Begin with your own ministry discernment.

May your faith in Christ compel you to invite others to discernment of their vocations.

Candidates for diocesan offices

Here are some of the candidates for various offices, to be elected at the 34th annual convention of the Diocese of Hawai'i. Because of print deadlines, not all nominees will appear

Standing Committee

To be elected: 1 clergy, 1 lay person, each for four-year terms.

The Standing Committee serves as the Bishop's Council of Advice. Performs duties as specified by the General and Diocesan Convention. Serves as the Ecclesiastical authority when there is no bishop. Meets once a month, and occasionally, on call. The Committee meets at St. Andrew's Cathedral on the third Friday of each month. Travel expenses for neighbor island members are paid by the Diocese.

Nominees:

Mary W. Schulz (lay). A communicant at All Saints on Kaua'i. Previous church and



community service positions: Diocesan Council, Vestry, Stewardship Chair and Program Chair, all within this diocese.

"My past diocesan and parish services have focused my interest toward the Standing Committee. Several years as president of

Serenity House on Kauai (drug and alcohol rehab) added to a perspective which should lend credibility to this position. My goal is to max my assistance to the Bishop and diocese."

Secretary of Convention

To be elected: 1 person, can be clergy or lay

The Secretary of Convention records minutes, enters them in the Journal and, under the supervision of the Bishop, attends to the publication and distribution of the journal, and performs other duties as prescribed in the diocesan Constitution and Canons. Serves as chairman of the Committee on Convention Plans for planning the agenda and making physical arrangements for the Convention. Maintains various directories of Diocesan officers, commissions, departments, etc.

Nominees: None at press time.

Diocesan Council

To be elected: 2 clergy, 5 lay person, each for 3 year terms; 1 lay person for a 1 year term.

The Diocesan Council exercises the power of the Convention and performs planning and policy making between meetings of Convention. Oversees the policies, programs, mission, and budget of the diocese and may initiate new work. Also is the legal corporate body of the Episcopal church in Hawai'i and, as such, is responsible for the business and property of the Church. The departments of the Council are: Formation, Mission and Support.

If elected, Council members are expected to:

- · Attend a working retreat weekend (November 2002)
- Attend all department meetings unless excused by the department Chairperson.
- Attend all Diocesan Council meetings except when excused by the President.

If you miss three (3) consecutive meetings (unexcused), the Council may declare that your lack of attendance has created a vacancy.

The Council meets monthly at St. Andrew's Cathedral at 12:30 p.m. on the third Saturday of each month. Most departments meet at 9:00 a.m. on the day of the Council meeting. Travel expenses for neighbor island members are paid by the diocese.

Nominees:

The Rev. Alison M. Dingley (clergy). Interim rector of St. Stephen's Church. Previous church and community service positions:



Diocesan Council; Commission on Ministry; Hawaii Advisory Committee on Drug Abuse and Controlled Substances; Board of Directors, Institute for Criminal Rehabilitation.

"I am completing a one-year, unexpired term on Council and

believe I have only begun to be effective. I would like to continue on Council in order to be able to contribute the planning and organizational skills I have developed over the years to the Diocese's process of mission development."

Frank G. Embree (lay). A communicant at Emmanuel Church in Kailua. Previous church



and community service positions: Former Planned Giving Officer for the diocese; Cochairman of Diocesan Stewardship Committee; Area Representative of Episcopal Church Foundation; St. Andrew's Chapter member.

"After five years of working as Planned Giving Officer for the Diocese, I have met and worked with many of you in various parishes. Many of your concerns and needs have been addressed to me, so I feel I can help solve some of these problems by being a member of council. I am still quite interested in stewardship and planned giving."

Cathedral Chapter

To be elected: 1 clergy, 1 lay person, each for two-year terms.

The Cathedral Chapter serves as the Vestry for St. Andrew's Cathedral Parish. The Chapter is comprised of The Bishop; the Dean of the Cathedral and ten (10) lay persons elected by the Cathedral congregation. In addition, two (2) clergy and two (2) lay persons for two year terms, one of each, each year, elected by the Convention form the Diocese at large.

The Chapter meets on the third Thursday of the month at 4:30 p.m. Travel expenses for neighbor island members are provided.

Nominees:

The Rev. Alison M. Dingley. (clergy). Interim rector of St. Stephen's Church. Previous church and community service positions:



Diocesan Council; Commission on Ministry; Hawaii **Advisory Committee** on Drug Abuse and Controlled Substances; Board of Directors. Institute for Criminal Rehabilitation.

"With my training in Interim Ministry, in addition to experience

in secular organizational development, I have skills that may be valuable to the Chapter as the Cathedral begins this phase of its corporate life. As Pastor of a small rural church I bring an important perspective to the Chapter's deliberations."

To be elected: I lay person, five-year term. **Nominees:** None at press time.

A happy day in Kona

Christ Church breaks ground on new community center

Christ Church Episcopal in Kealakekua celebrated the ground breaking and blessing in preparation for construction of its Community Center at the church.

The congregation raised nearly \$900,000 to build the center, which will house a wide variety of community service programs in Kona.

"We are thrilled to begin construction of our center," said campaign co-chair Sherwood Greenwell.

The Blessing included both Anglican and Hawaiian traditions and concluded with a large circle of participant ringing the painted perimeter of the planned center; singing "Hawai'i Aloha."

The Rev. Carol Arney, rector of Christ Church, officiated at the blessing. She was joined by Kahu Billy Paris, who provided the Hawaiian blessing.





Remembering 9/11

On Sept. 11, the Cathedral Close of St. Andrew's held a "Day of Remembrance" for people of all faiths, one year after the terrorist bombings on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Both the Cathedral and Parke Chapel were open for the entire day for those who sought a quiet place. On the altar in Parke Chapel was this arrangement, created by Marilyn Howard, who describes the piece thus:

The dark base and the latticework patterns represent the wreckage of the Trade Towers after the attack. There are three crosses in the patterns reminiscent of the cross found at Ground Zero and planted there. The white lei represents both the offering of the children of Hawaii in lei sent to the workers, and God's gift of love and grace in the midst of that horror. The ti-leaf lei represents the "aina of Hawaii. The charred driftwood indicates our island state with its many beaches. The whole arrangement is subservient to the cross, both in size and placement. This is a "one day" specific arrangement, created specifically for this Day of Remembrance.

Maui Ministry 2002

The Episcopal parishes of the Maui region will sponsor Maui Ministry 2002, a two-day shared ministry weekend, November 1 and 2 in upcountry Maui.

The Rev. Phillip Roderick of the Diocese of Oxford, has accepted the invitation to be the keynote speaker for this two-day event. He is scheduled to speak on the topic "Attraction, Need, Desire: How can everyday Christians discover a delight in God, gold in the shadow and blessing in the mess of things?"

The weekend will begin with a Liturgy for All Saints' Day at St. John's in Kula, at 6:30 p.m., followed by a potluck featuring multi-cultural main dishes. Other highlights of the Friday evening program include a labyrinth walk, a youth lock-in, "talk story," meditations, compline and Taize prayers. Saturday's program starts with a youth sunrise service at Haleakala Crater tentatively scheduled about 5:30 a.m. (leaving St. John's at 4:30). Workshops during the day will be on topics such as "Writing through the Spirit," "Polarity Management/ Decision Making," and "Harry Potter and the Gospels."
