Remember the saints in your life

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

At the 38th Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Convention, we elected the V Bishop of Hawai'i and the XI Bishop in the Hawaiian Islands. The canonical process that requires the consent of a majority of bishops with jurisdiction and a majority of Diocesan Standing Committees is now underway. God willing, the Presiding Bishop along with other bishops will ordain the bishop-elect to the Episcopate on Saturday, March 10, 2007. On that day I will resign my jurisdiction as the IV Bishop of Hawai'i, becoming the Resigned Bishop of Hawai'i so that I can begin my retirement on April 1.

I write these words with some nostalgia as I sit in my office looking across the parking lot towards St. Andrew's Priory School. Written words remind me that the transition between episcopates moves forward. The Church in Hawai'i continues its life of mission and ministry during the transition and into a new and exciting future with the next Bishop of Hawai'i.

Even with a strong sense of moving forward, there is remembering of the past, so that we can learn from our history and those who have gone before us. As I look at Transfiguration Hall of the Priory, I can again picture the Sisters of the Transfiguration sitting on the balcony overlooking Queen Emma Square. I will always be in awe of the Sisters' dedicated commitment to the Priory and its mission, and the perpetuation of Queen Emma's vision for the education of young women. They are the

icons that remind me that service requires faith in Jesus.

I remember Byron Devonish, the first African American in my life, a mentor, and friend. Byron dedicated his life in service to the church. He was my acolyte master, a stern disciplinarian like Father Bray whom he worshipped. Byron was an icon of service at the Cathedral. He helped me understand the place of discipline and sacrifice in a life of service. Long-time members of the Cathedral and St. Paul's Church can tell you about the ways in which Byron served others.

I remember Richard Sloggett, my first and only Senior Warden, at All Saints Church, Kapa'a. Dick was a wise counselor who listened untiringly to a young rector. He was the one who first asked me again and again to reflect upon the question, "How will your decision and ministry proclaim the Gospel and the church?" Dick helped me understand the importance of the community in a ministry of service.

As we enter these months of transition and preparation for our new bishop and celebrate All Saints' Day, I encourage you to reflect upon our past heroes and recognize how their lives witnessed to their faith

Godly Play accreditation training here in January

The Christian Formation Commission is sponsoring an Accreditation Training for adults interested in implementing Godly Play in their congregations. The training will be held on January 11-13, 2007, at St. Andrew's Cathedral. The cost is \$325 per participant, which includes meals, snacks, and materials. Brochures are available upon request. The training involves 18 supervised hours, and The Center for the Theology of Childhood awards a certificate for this

The goal of training is to present Godly Play to adult learners in the same spirit that the language of the Christian People is presented to children. This is because people usually teach as they were taught. Our training is also presented in a way that encourages life-long learning. Practicing one's art is also important, but less because "practice makes perfect" than "practice allows the depth to be discovered" and fluency to be expanded.

Godly Play needs to be learned from the inside out. This certification workshop, therefore, emphasizes process. You will experience a Godly Play class in a beautiful, well-equipped classroom and then reflect on the experience with seasoned trainers who have learned how to guide such discussions. A second major focus is on the

practice of the lessons. Each participant is expected to practice and tell a Godly Play story to a small group of other participants and a trainer. Through this practice, you will gain the experience of knowing that whatever happens in a storytelling situation, you will be able to sustain the story.

A celebration of 100 years of life

One hundred years ago, the population of Las Vegas was 30. The average American worker made \$200 to \$400 per year. The average life expectancy was 47 years. Theodore Roosevelt was President, and Prince Kuhio was Hawai'i's delegate to Congress.

This was the year, 1906, that Anna Sloggett was born. And on September 17, 2006 — her 100th birthday — nearly 500 family members, friends, and former elementary school students gathered on Kaua'i to celebrate with her in a luau at Gaylord's at Kilohana in Lihue. The luau's program, emceed by Anna's son, David Penhallow, included a description of Anna's life. It was punctuated by renditions of tunes popular in the different eras through which she lived. Former students — now well into middle age or beyond, and coming from throughout the islands and the mainland — gave testimonials to her skill, kindness, enthusiasm, and adventurousness as a teacher.

Anna was born in Lihue, the grand-daughter of William Hyde Rice, the last governor of Kaua'i under Queen Lili'uokalani. Although she occasionally as a child and a young adult lived on the Mainland, she spent most of her life on Kaua'i. Most of her teaching career was at Kapa'a Elementary School. She says that her favorite grade was the third grade. She was known for making learning exciting, and she calls herself "the pioneer of field trips."

In 1970, the year she retired after 35 years of teaching, Anna married Richard Sloggett. In the 1970s, her husband was the Senior Warden for a young rector, the Rev. Dick Chang, at All Saints Church, Kapa'a. Anna has been attending All Saints since then.

Anna still regularly plays golf, bridge, and Mah-Jongg, and she recently renewed her driver's license. She danced a hula at the conclusion of her birthday luau. The celebration of her birthday included a golf tournament on September 9 at Wailua Golf Course. (Her team won.)

Funds raised from both the golf tournament and the luau will go to the University of Hawai'i Foundation to establish the Anna S. Sloggett Endowed Scholarship Fund at Kaua'i Community College. The scholarship will support Kaua'i students pursuing a degree in Elementary Education.

Henry Adams once said, "A teacher affects eternity. You can never tell where her influence stops." Judging from the joy among those gathered to celebrate her birthday with her, one knows that Anna Sloggett's influence has reached far and wide, into eternity.
